

PROPOSED AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENTS: BAY OF HOLLAND & MILL BAY, STRONSAY

Cooke Aquaculture Scotland Ltd (CAS) are proposing the development of two Atlantic Salmon sea farm sites at the Bay of Holland and Mill Bay, Stronsay.

Each site will comprise 16 x 100m circumference cages (radius 16m) arranged in two groups of 8 cages with a boat style feed barge at each site. The individual sites will have maximum biomass capacity of 2038.3t of Atlantic Salmon per 22 month production cycle.

The sites will be subject to rigorous environmental assessment prior to the submission of planning applications to the Orkney Islands Council for consultation. These are to be submitted alongside discharge and production consent applications to SEPA and Marine Scotland as the regulators for such activities.

Both sites will reflect a considerable financial investment of over £3m per site for equipment. Local facilities will also be supported during the ongoing process of running and maintaining the sites. CAS also support the development of highly skilled employment, locally, on the more rural isles of Orkney. Each site is anticipated to create 4 full-time, permanent, site operative positions (8 total). An overall site manager will also be required.

For additional information and the opportunity to discuss these proposals further, representatives from Cooke Aquaculture Scotland including directors, a local site manager, human resources and the environmental unit will be available at an open consultation event to be held at:



RECORDS OF A BYGONE AGE

The late Jim Work of Holland and Daisybank had gathered together quite a collection of Stronsay-related hand written stories, reports and notes that he had recorded over the years and also numerous newspaper cuttings about Stronsay. I was fortunate to be given some of these by Catherine and Myra Work and find many of them fascinating reading. I would like to share some of these records and memories of bygone Stronsay with readers of the Limpet over the coming months and hope you will also find this look back to an era long past to be of interest.

With the shows now all past, Stronsay's 'Massive Weekend' done and dusted and the nights drawing in I thought it would be relevant to start with a report about the first ever Stronsay Cattle Show held 130 years ago. I don't know if this was from a newspaper report or a report recorded by the Agricultural Society but it seems to have been a very successful day.

Stronsay Cattle Show 1888

The first annual cattle show under the auspices of the Stronsay Agricultural Society was held on Thursday at Samson's Lane. The weather was most propitious, the day being one of the finest of the season, and the turnout of spectators consequently very large, somewhere about 500 being present. There were nearly two hundred head of stock exhibited, probably the largest, and pronounced by competent judges, to be the finest show of stock ever seen in the county. Messrs O Laughton, Soulisquoy and A Marshall, Berstane, who acted as judges, and whose decision seemed to give very general satisfaction, awarded the prizes as follows:-

There then followed a long list of almost 90 prize winning animals from the farms of Holland, Rothiesholm (now the Bu), Housebay, Sunnybank, Lodge, Boondatoon, Bay, Whitehall, Huip, Midgarth, Samson's Lane, Myres and Airy, with the champion in the cattle section being 'a splendid black polled cow' shown by Wm Stevenson, Holland and the champion in the horse section going to 'a fine Clydesdale mare' being shown by DH Learmonth of Housebay. There were also prizes for sweet butter, salt butter, duck eggs and hen eggs (all these prizes were won by men but I suspect the women may have done the work and the men stolen the glory!) and even a prize for horse shoeing which was won by blacksmith W Slater.

The report then went on to give a few words of encouragement and chastisement that could possibly be seen to be as relevant in our community now as they were 130 years ago!

The show throughout proved a complete success and it is hoped that it may be the means of awakening the farming community of Stronsay out of its present lethargic state regarding Agricultural Society matters. A society composed of only a few members struggling against adverse circumstances can never be of much real benefit, and if we want a successful and useful society in our midst, we can only have it by lending a hand, not standing outside criticising others who are striving to do their best, not even by becoming members in a half-hearted way, but by laying aside self and banding ourselves together, each one determined to work for the good of the whole community.

RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

Starting at the end this month, there have been great signs during the last few days that the bird population is returning to how it was before the Greylag Geese 'invasion' which began in the early 1990s. Many hundreds of duck are now present – including several hundred Wigeon and Teal, there are far more waders – particularly Golden Plover and Curlew - feeding in the pastureland, and perhaps the most significant sign of a return to the pre-1990 spread of species, is the arrival of well over 100 Whooper Swans which breed in Iceland. Between 100 and 120 of this species wintered on Stronsay until the geese commandeered the Lea Shun and Meikle Water lochs. It will be interesting to watch the development over the coming months – the harmless swans had been a welcome part of the island's avifauna for at least several decades. Fingers crossed! (The Whooper Swans differ from the resident Mute Swans in the colour of the bill – yellow and black in Whoopers, orange and black in Mute).

Several birds of prey have been seen this Autumn – including at least 4 different Hen Harriers (one adult 'grey' male), two Buzzards, Kestrel, Merlin, Peregrine, and one lucky observer – Steve Taylor at Ryburn, saw an Osprey flying over towards Papa Stronsay, twice attempting to fish – with no success - in the 'east entrance'.

Autumn migration has been very poor this year with hardly any winds from the east but there have been a few surprises including an American species – Brown-headed Cowbird which we saw briefly here at Castle on 26th Sept. It appeared to be a juvenile and very similar to Skylark re plumage, but had a very different mode of flight. Virtually all the other small migrants present were of continental origin except perhaps the record flock of Goldfinches – 10 – seen near the Rothiesholm school on 10th October (see photo).

A SE wind on 11th-13th worked its magic and many migrants arrived including hundreds of Redwings. 'Bird of the day' on 11th was a Great Grey Shrike near the South school, seen by Ant of Gesty Dishes. More easterlies over the next two days brought in dozens of Chaffinches and Brambling. Many Robins arrived to take up residence for the winter and there were a few surprises – a Barred Warbler in the Airy garden and a Lesser Whitethroat in the gardens at Lower Whitehall. Yet more surprises were to come on 14th with Great Grey Shrike and Wood Pigeon (quite rare here) at Slap, and there was an even more striking 'cluster' at Holin Cottage – Waxwing, Hawfinch, Yellowhammer, and Greenfinch! Ant and Clare discovered a very late Redstart at Leaquoy (see photo) and there was a second bird that day along the road at Bomasty. There have been a few each of Goldcrest, Chiffchaff and Blackcap during the last month but no big numbers of any.

Migration almost came to a halt after the 17th – the last bird of note being the second Yellow-browed Warbler of the year – this time at Slap – enjoyed by our regular visitor Geraldine Guppy from Gloucester. Many Brambling and Chaffinches remain on the island – mainly in the Samsonslane 'tattie-field' and by the roadside at Bomasty Bay. The flock at Bomasty bay are very easy to observe from the car, often feeding in the road and perching on the fences in the area (see photo) and the low wall on the shore-side.

And then came the Swans! A delight to see after such a long absence (see photo). Thanks again for all the calls, John Holloway.

STEPHEN CLACKSON'S LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

Reporting on the work of your councillor in Orkney and beyond

"Hostel residents could face fees—Forthcoming consultation to seek views on proposed new charges."

This was the page 2 headline in *The Orcadian* of the 4th October, in which my contribution at the Policy & Resources (P&R) Committee meeting to the debate on consulting on corporate charges was reported. Four proposed charges stand out as having a potentially detrimental impact on the North Isles' economies and residents if they are implemented, namely:

- Increases to landing fees at Council airfields;
- Increased charges for special (bulky) household waste collection and disposal;
- Introduction of charges for overnight parking of campervans;
- Proposed new charge for Papdale Halls of Residence.

With regard to the last of these, as a councillor I have a declarable financial conflict of interest because I have a child at the Halls, hence I shall not be able to be involved in any discussion on charges for pupils to stay there. It is, therefore, **imperative that North Isles' residents become fully engaged in the consultation themselves**. We were pretty much left out of the "OIC Community Conversations" back in June, and didn't have the same opportunity as other communities in Orkney to "shape our public services". When I brought this up at P&R, the Leader stated that "the message was to protect services in these islands, so we weren't asking them to change their services". However, among the "top 5 issues" for the Kirkwall community is a "review of Junior High School provision on the isles" (and at their "Conversation" on 11th June they also discussed charging for Papdale Halls), so, whatever the Council Leader says, other communities are clearly intent on changing the North Isles' services!

After the Orkney College graduation ceremony, I was presented to the UHI Chancellor, the Princess Royal. We talked about her last having seen me dressed this way (see photograph below) at the University of London Presentation Ceremony at the Royal Albert Hall on the 14th March 1990. HRH observed that my beard had changed colour since then! I am still unsure of the protocol regarding academic headdress in the presence of royalty. As noted in my article "Dr ... Who?" in the June 2011 *Living Orkney* (issue 67, p 50): "In Spain, doctors of philosophy may be seated and cover their heads in the presence of the monarch", nevertheless, to prevent any possibility of committing a *paso en falso*, in the presence of our monarch's daughter I uncovered mine. I was delighted to see on the last page of this year's glossy graduation brochure (as a result of my suggestion—see *Letter from School Place* November 2017) colour illustrations identifying which UHI academic dress belongs to which degree.

Continuing on the University of the Highlands & Islands (UHI) theme, as OIC's representative I attended this year's UHI Foundation Conference at North Highland College's Dornoch campus. In his review, the University's Vice-Chancellor informed us that Orkney College has more PhD students than the two largest UHI academic partners put together, which shows what an intellectual centre we have growing at the heart of Orkney. However, he cautioned that OIC must not let its burgeoning college be undermined by the predatory behaviour of the other universities currently courting the Council. In his introduction, the Rector warned against the modern tendency to believe that perception matters more than reality and the truth is just another opinion.

(In this respect we could all be guided by my old college's motto: "Esse quam videri", which means "be rather than seem to be".)

Other meetings I have attended this month include: a briefing on aquaculture water quality impact modelling, a special Development & Infrastructure Committee meeting (by invitation) for the items on the Kirkwall Urban Design Framework and the Aquaculture Water Quality Impact Modelling Assessment for Scapa Flow; and a Monitoring & Audit Committee meeting. The Community Council Conference was postponed due to a bad weather forecast and will now take place on the 7th November.

At the remembrance service on the 14th October, I laid the wreath on behalf of OIC at the HMS Royal Oak memorial at Scapa. Here is a photo of the commemorative cake
