FLU VACCINATIONS STRONSAY SURGERY 2020

Who is eligible for a flu vaccination?

This year, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the flu vaccination programme has been extended so that more people are eligible than before.

Primarily the flu vaccine will initially be available to those aged over 65 and those with underlying health conditions, such as asthma/COPD, heart or kidney disease or diabetes or who are very overweight. It will also be available to all primary school age children, pregnant women and those who provide hands on health or social care.

There will be a second round of flu vaccinations for those aged 55- 64 who have no underlying health conditions and those who live with people who are shielding.

How will it work?

Because of the increased numbers and the need for social distancing we will be undertaking this year's clinics in the Community Hall, rather than in the surgery so that people can enter and leave by different doors.

People aged over 65 and those aged under 65 with underlying health conditions get slightly different forms of the flu vaccine so we will be providing flu clinics for the two groups on **different days.**

It will be an appointment based system.

What do I need to do next?

Currently you don't need to do anything. Once we have a confirmed date for the vaccine delivery we will advertise the date of the clinic and ask people to phone the surgery to make an appointment. This is likely to be in October for the first group of people and December for the second group.

As usual our nurses will visit those who are unable to get out to give those people their flu vaccine.

DIABETES & FLU VACCINE

Extract from "Balance" magazine, Autumn 2020 edition www.diabetes.org.uk

Diabetes gives you a greater risk of getting the flu. It can make managing your blood sugar levels harder, increase your risk of developing complications such as pneumonia, and increase your risk of urgent admission into hospital. We're urging anyone with diabetes, including children and pregnant women, to get a flu jab to protect against the most common types of flu. As this changes each year, you need a new flu jab annually.

Question: Will the vaccine give me flu?

Answer: No. The jab contains an inactive form of the virus which cannot cause flu. It can take about two weeks for the jab to work, so you may still get the flu. The sooner you have the jab, the sooner you'll be protected.

Question: Where can I get a vaccine?

Answer: Your GP surgery or a participating pharmacy. In light of coronavirus, steps will be taken to ensure this is done in a safe environment. You may receive an invitation or the information may be on a website. Remember, it's free because you need it, so get your vaccination now, before winter starts.

RECOGNISE SYMPTOMS

A new persistent cough, fever, or loss or change in sense of taste or smell means you should immediately begin household isolation. 2



REQUEST A TEST RIGHT AWAY


It is important to get a test as soon as possible. Visit NHSinform,scot/test-and-protect or call 0800 028 2816 if you cannot get online. 3



ISOLATE

Isolate for 7 days from symptom start date, longer if fever continues and 48 hours after fever ends. Others you live with should isolate for 14 days.

GET TESTED

When isolating, you should only leave home to get tested. There are various ways of having this done. 5



GET RESULTS

They should be with you within 48 hours. 6



PROVIDE DETAILS

If you have coronavirus, NHS contact tracers will contact you to confidentially ask who you have had contact with recently. If you don't have the virus, you and your household can stop isolating.

7



NHS INFORMS CONTACTS

If you have coronavirus, the NHS will contact the people you have had close contact with. Your name will not be shared unless you give permission. All data will be held safely and securely. 8



CLOSE CONTACTS ISOLATE

They will be asked to isolate for 14 days from the last time they had contact with you. 9



HOUSEHOLD OF CLOSE CONTACT

If the close confact has no symptoms, others in their household don't need to isolate. If the close confact develops symptoms, they should follow this guide starting from step 1.

If you do not have community or family support and need essential help, call the National Assistance Helpline on 0800 111 4000 (Mon-Fri Sam-Spm) or via textphone on 0800 111 4114. The helpline is for those who cannot leave their home or get the help they need elsewhere.

Orkney is a beautiful place with a rich heritage and a magnificent and diverse environment. The North Isles are a wonderful and special part of this whole.

Last year OIC declared a climate emergency, and we must continue to act to reduce our emissions. We are leading the way in many areas in addressing Climate Change. We are fortunate to be surrounded by abundant natural energy resources of wind and tide (though sometimes they can feel a bit too abundant). At the moment we are very dependant on another resource that has been abundant here, fossil fuels, both in our use of them and our economy's dependence on them. Fossil fuel use will and must reduce and this section of our economy will fade, we must replace it in our economy and our lives with renewables. Fortunately Orkney is already leading the way in wind and tidal energy, and now also in hydrogen and smart energy systems. There is much opportunity here for our economy, for growth and for really good jobs, we must ensure that our isles also benefit. In developing this we must also be aware of preserving our environment and our heritage for ourselves and for the tourists who flock here to enjoy it and who are very important to our economy.

Orkney also is a leader in the use of electric, and other alternative fuel vehicles and this is to be encouraged. The mainland already has public electric charging/fuelling points for these, it is past time there were also public charging points on the isles. We have had electric buses for a while now but marine and air transport are still large contributor to emissions and this must be addressed.

Fuel poverty is high in Orkney generally and worse in the North Isles, and space heating is a major contributor to our emissions. This is due to a combination of poor energy efficiency of some housing, expensive, inefficient heating systems often still using fossil fuels, low wages and a cold, damp climate. Much work has been done in this area and this needs to continue to improve the lives of our residents and to reduce our contribution to emissions

Waste and recycling is a particularly sore point at this present time. With the Covid restrictions closing recycling centres and stopping what collections we had, many folk are fast disappearing under the accumulated recycling. Fortunately the recycling centres are again open but not all residents know this or are easily able to access them. This really needs sorting out immediately.

RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

Although most of the interesting and unusual sightings here on Stronsay are discovered around the farms and dwellings – and particularly in the gardens – there are some amazing records of birds seen on and around the shoreline in Whitehall Village over the years. The Great White Egret on the beach alongside the play-park by Raymond Dennison in June this year was a classis example of 'birds might turn up almost anywhere'. Several other rare species in the UK have been recorded from that small stretch of road, including a Great blue Heron on the beach (American species – see photo); Black-eared Wheatear on the road (see photo); Tree Creeper in the Monk's Garden behind Morven; Waxwings feeding on rose-hips in the gardens along the roadside, and both Hawfinch and Blue Tit attracted to the bird-feeders in Mirland some years ago, A Spotted Crake present in late Spring 1989 could be heard all around the village, it's 'whiplash' call keeping several residents awake! Oh yes – and the most exotic sighting of all – the Bee-eater of late Spring 2015.......which was seen catching bees in several gardens including the Hotel and later in Tam Chalmer's garden in Whitehall.

Two species which are regularly seen along the 'Village Street' are Black Guillemots and Rock Pipits, the former present all summer around the piers in their dapper mainly black breeding plumage, and Rock Pipits which are present throughout the year, pecking for insects and other 'morcels' of food along the tarmac road (see photos).

The last month has been very quiet regarding migrant species, and only a handful have been recorded on the island. Donald Omand (Lower Samsons) has recorded Barred Warbler, Rosefinch, Blackcap and Brambling in the area, and Ant and Clare at Gesty Dishes found a Yellow-browed Warbler close to their house on 17th Sept. There have been just a few other migrants elsewhere, including 2-3 Willow Warblers, one Pied Flycatcher at Airy, and two Stonechats near The Mill. There have been far less 'Greenland' Wheatears around the roads in Septtember this year – perhaps a big influx is just around the corner!

Several raptor' species have been recorded during the last month (all probably 'one of each species'): Merlin, Sparrowhawk, Hen Harrier and Buzzard. Swallows and Sand Martins have both reared good numbers of young this year, and there has been a noticeable increase in the numbers of Sandwich Terns off-shore in early Autumn which also suggests a better breeding season. Pied Wagtails seem to have had a good season with several seen feeding along the tarmac roads during the last few weeks, and the local Linnets have certainly had a good breeding season in the island gardens. A flock of 50 or more Linnets is not unusual anywhere right across the island at this time of year.

Ant and Clare watched a pod of 5 or 6 Risso's Dolphins in Holland Bay in midmonth, but the group had soon moved off southwards – perhaps heading back to the area around Shapinsay where a pod of that size had been seen recently on several occasions.

One other sighting of interest was of a Humming-bird Hawk Moth in the garden at Park Cottage on 9th Sept – with plenty of Red Admirals all around the island during the very welcome warm spell of weather in mid-month.

September has so far been very disappointing regarding migrant species from the east. The weather forecasters kept promising us winds between SE and NE but very little materialised, If a warmish airflow from the east does materialise during the next month have the binoculars at the ready!

SAGE has warned that Britain is "on the edge of losing control" of Covid-19, hence the introduction of the "Rule of Six". I have tried to dissuade OIC Leader, James Stockan from obsessively seeking variations for Orkney. We can't afford to play politics with a pandemic. We may feel safe on our islands, but, in reality, our situation is fragile and precarious. I was involved in a lengthy, multi-agency Covid-19 debriefing session, which I hope will bring improvements to handling the coronavirus crisis locally. I discovered recently that one of my great-great-great-great-grandmothers and her 9-year-old son died in the cholera pandemic (or "Asiatick" as it was called then) that reached Britain in 1832. Although it was barely at the dawn of the railway age, the disease spread rapidly across the country—a warning from history for all us. We still don't have a Covid-19 vaccine!



You may be wondering why I am illustrating this month's *Letter* with the front cover of the Westray SWRI's "Golden Jubilee Cookery Book". The reason is that it was published by the *Cienfuegos Press*, founded in Sanday in the 1970s by anarchist, Stuart Christie, who passed away on the 15th August.

As well as a heap of anarchist literature, he also published "A Visit to the Island of Sanday", a nicely illustrated extract from Alexander Goodfellow's "Sanday Church History" (published in 1912). In the early 1960s, Christie hitchhiked to Spain to assassinate the Caudillo, Generalissimo Franco, was caught and was jolly lucky not to have been executed by garrotte. Sanday seems to be a haven for those willing to act on their convictions. Take, for example, my W.Manse councillor predecessors: Rev Matthew Armour (OCC 1890-99), who was imprisoned for inciting a political riot against a Tory parliamentary candidate; and Mrs Christine Muir (OCC 1964-75, OIC 1975-78), famed for refusing to sit down in the council chamber "until the water comes" (in her campaign to bring mains water supplies to the Isles).

I am taking up the speed-limit cause again by attempting to get speed limits reviewed throughout Orkney with full community participation. OIC reactions to Covid-19 have demonstrated that where there's a will there <u>can</u> be a way. "Cienfuegos" means "hundred fires". Just one bonfire of the bureaucracy which has consistently blocked progress on our speed limits would suffice!

At a Special General meeting back in April, if you remember, I supported an amendment calling for the "Orkney Harbours Masterplan Phase 1" to be referred back for proper scrutiny by all councillors rather than going through on the approval of merely the 6 members of the Harbour Authority Sub-Committee. Regrettably, the Chairman of D&I (my North Isles counter-part Cllr Graham Sinclair) refused to take it back and our amendment failed. I share the concerns of my colleague Cllr Steve Sankey expressed in his article in the 10th September issue of *The Orcadian*. The glossy "Masterplan" has now been released to the public. If you read it, you will observe that our crumbling North Isles lifeline harbour infrastructure is not addressed at all, and I urge my ward constituents and North Isles community councils to highlight this fact if they make a response.

Other meetings I have "virtually" attended this month include those of the Monitoring & Audit Committee, Education, Leisure & Housing Committee, Orkney Health & Care Committee, and Shapinsay Community Council; also a rescheduled Air Services Consultative Forum meeting, and patchy Skype attendance at an Orkney College Management Council meeting.

It was nice to attend a real event for a change. Owing to a combination of change of head and Covid-19, the achievements of both the 2019 and the 2020 school leavers were celebrated simultaneously in the playground of Sanday School. Well done to them all and to the staff who brought them this far. I wish them godspeed for the rest of their respective life journeys.

Since my last *Letter*, the goslings have become practically geese. Here they are a month later at the beginning of September.

RECORDS OF A BYGONE AGE AMMUNITION DISPOSAL ISLAND STYLE!

In last month's article about the Stronsay Boy Scouts, I mentioned the role that James Sinclair Gorie of Clestrain played in the formation of the Stronsay troop of Scouts. After spending much of his life in South Africa, Jim Gorie returned to his native Stronsay to retire at Hazelbank. With the formation of the Local Defence Volunteers in May 1940, he was called into service once more as officer in charge of the Stronsay Local Defence Volunteers, later to become the Home Guard. It was this involvement with the Home Guard that jogged my memory and brought to mind a rather strange event that occurred more than fifty years after the end of the war and the disbanding of the Home Guard.

As a little bit of background information, Jim Gorie moved to Kirkwall in October 1941 and my wife's grandfather Jim Chalmers, who had served in the 1st World War, was promoted to the rank of lieutenant and took over as officer in charge of the platoon, a role which he held until the Home Guard was disbanded in 1945.

Jim Chalmers bought the farm of the Lodge and moved there in 1945, farming there until the property was taken over by his son Bobby in 1962. It was then bought by Arna and I when Bobby retired in 1991. In May 1997 we decided we were going to build a silage pit at the Lodge and, to get the site ready, we had to remove a couple of small concrete sheds which had been erected by Jim Chalmers soon after he had bought the farm. These sheds had been

used for keeping hens and pigs, both of which had been so important to the farming economy for many years, but the sheds were now redundant.

Robert Rendall, who worked at Midgarth with us for over forty years and stayed in the farmhouse at the Lodge after we bought it, was dispatched with a digger to demolish these old buildings and get the site ready for the new building and all seemed to be going smoothly and according to plan. Then came a phone call from Robert to tell me that demolition had come to a standstill as he had decided it wasn't safe. When asked what the problem was, he told me I had better come over and have a look so off I went, wondering what could have happened. On arrival I found that Robert had pulled up the concrete foundations of the shed with the digger only to discover several hundred rounds of .303 ammunition, still in their cardboard boxes, arranged neatly in the bottom of the trench where the concrete foundations had been poured many years before! After much debate about what we could do with this, we decided we had better call the police to report this find and see what they would advise us to do. They seemed surprisingly uninterested and told us they would come along and have a look next time they were out in the island, and maybe take it away for disposal! Knowing nothing about ammunition and how stable it would be after lying for a long time, we weren't sure what the next step should be and certainly didn't want to risk hitting it with the bucket of the digger!

As we could do nothing more with site preparations until the ammunition was moved, we decided that it would have to be shifted from there and gingerly gathered it all up and put it in a five gallon drum, which it almost filled! We then topped the drum up with sand and set it aside to await future inspection and collection by the police.

Jim Chalmers, Arna's grandad, had passed away by this time and her father Bobby knew nothing about where this ammunition came from or how it came to be buried under the foundations of a shed. On thinking back to some of the stories about the Home Guard previously related by Arna's grandad, we could only surmise what may have happened. As the officer in charge of the unit, Jim Chalmers would also have been in charge of the ammunition and, when the Home Guard was demobilised, would have had to return all the rounds that had been issued. Being the army, I'm sure every round would have had to have been accounted for. I believe the issue was fifty rounds per man, of which a maximum of ten rounds could be used for practice.

As target practice was one of the more interesting and competitive parts of the Home Guard training, I understand that extra ammunition was sometimes obtained from some of the armed fishing boats and cargo boats that called in along Stronsay, who were quite happy to exchange a few boxes of cartridges for some milk, eggs or butter. As this practise would have been highly illegal, both from the point of view of the seamen handing over ammunition and from the locals handing over produce which should have been rationed, this ammunition would have had to remain very much 'off the record'. It obviously couldn't be returned to stores and, as the Home Guard's .303 rifles had by now been returned, the ammunition couldn't be used.

This would have become something of a concern and embarrassment for Jim as it would have been highly illegal to be holding this ammunition and it would also be very difficult to account for where it came from in the first place. The problem he was now faced with was how to dispose of this ammunition quietly, safely and permanently. With new sheds being constructed at the Lodge, it would have seemed an ideal opportunity to dispose of the surplus under the foundations, never to be seen again and no one any the wiser. He would never have dreamt that these boxes would see the light of day once more over fifty years later!

The drum containing the ammunition stood in the yard at the Lodge for months and it seems it had been completely forgotten about. Then one day a police officer called along Robert at the Lodge to check his shotgun licence and was quite surprised, to say the least, to have a drum full of ammunition set in the boot of his police car and to be told to take that back to Kirkwall with him! What became of it then I have no idea, but it may still be gathering dust in a 'lost property' office somewhere!






