
Seas of the North Isles: Prehistoric Seafaring and Early Colonisation

Talk Wednesday 13th October at 7:00pm in the Community Hall



Fire Alarms in Scottish Homes

Because of different standards for fire alarms in different types of home, legislation was introduced in January 2019 which almed to ensure that everyone in Scotland has the same level of protection whether they own or rent their home.

How many alarms are required to meet the standard?

The standard requires:

- One smoke alarm installed in the room most frequently used for general daytime living purposes
- One smoke alarm in every circulation space on each storey, such as hallways and landings
- One heat alarm installed in every kitchen

All alarms should be ceiling mounted and interlinked. Where there is a carbon-fuelled appliance (such as boilers, fires (including open fires) and heaters) or a flue, a carbon monoxide detector is also required which does not need to be linked to the fire alarms.

What types of housing will be covered by the new standard?

All homes will be covered by the new standard, as it is important that all homes should be safe for occupants regardless of tenure. It will be the property owner's responsibility to meet the new standard, however, the legal duty to enforce the standard rests with local authorities. Where owners are unable to meet the standard, it is not a criminal offence.

How long do I have to comply?

The regulations were due to come into force in February 2021, however, in light of difficulties caused by COVID-19, the Scottish Government sought and the Scottish Parliament agreed to delay the implementation of this legislation for a period of 12 months to February 2022.

However, installing alarms at the earliest opportunity, will provide improved fire safety in your home.

TYPES OF ALARMS REQUIRED

I already have smoke alarms fitted in my home but they are not interlinked - do I need to change these to interlinked ones?

Yes – the requirement is to have all smoke and heat alarms interlinked. You may not hear the alarm closest to the fire but, by having an interlinked system, you will be alerted immediately.

Are the requirements different for people who need specialist alarms?

The legislation applies to all homes which must meet the minimum standard and, where specialist equipment is needed, this should be installed in addition to the equipment installed to meet the standard (e.g. for deaf people or telecare/community alarms).

Types of alarms available

There are two types of alarms that comply with the new standard:

- Tamper proof long-life lithium battery alarms, which can be fitted by householders themselves or;
- Mains-wired alarms, which are cheaper than tamper proof long-life battery alarms, but should be installed by a qualified electrician in accordance with BS7671.

Both types of alarm can be interlinked by radio frequency.

Mains-wired alarms, however, are required to be installed by an electrician which will be an additional cost to homeowners. Any redecoration to walls and/or ceilings should be taken into consideration. You may also need a building warrant if you live in a flat.

Further detailed information on the requirements of the standard, including the types of alarms, is set out in the *Tolerable Standard Guidance Chapters* 16 and 17.

How do I choose which alarms are best for me?

First choose whether you want battery powered alarms which you can fit yourself (or can be fitted by a handyperson if you don't feel confident) or hard-wired alarms that require to be fitted by an electrician.

If you choose battery alarms, they must be tamper proof long-life lithium battery powered and must be capable of being interlinked. The carbon monoxide alarm must have a sealed battery for the duration of its operational lifespan, which may be up to 10 years, if you are using an electrician to install alarms, you can also seek their advice on what alarms to buy as some may include alarms as part of their service.

Once you have chosen which system to install, choose a reputable brand, make sure the packaging clearly displays compliance with BS EN14604:2005 for smoke alarms and BS 5446-2:2003 for heat alarms. Carbon monoxide alarms should have the British Kitemark (EN 50291-1)

Please note: the Nest Protect System will not meet the standard. This is because they do **not** meet the requirements for a heat alarm under the relevant British Standard. British Standard (BS 5839-6:2019) makes it clear that only heat alarms should be installed in kitchens.

Will it be necessary for tenements to have linked alarms between individual residences?

In a shared property such as a tenement or block of flats there is no requirement for different properties to be linked to each other. There is no requirement for alarms to be fitted in communal areas such as entry halls and stairways.

I have asbestos in my ceiling - can I still have alarms installed?

You may wish to seek specialist advice but it is possible to install interlinked, tamper proof long-life lithium battery alarms to ceilings with asbestos using a firm adhesive and as such would not require any disturbance to the ceiling. In any case where it is not possible to mount a ceiling alarm due to asbestos concerns, battery-operated alarms that meet the manufacture's requirement and can be wall mounted may be used.

COSTS OF ALARMS AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

I own my home - who will pay for these alarms?

Any costs will be the responsibility of home owners and landlords. The cost of the alarms will vary according to what you currently have in place and the alarms you choose to install. It is estimated that the cost for an average three-bedroom house which requires three smoke alarms, one heat alarm and one carbon monoxide detector will be around £220. This is based on using the tamper-proof battery type of alarms that you can install by yourself without the need for an electrician.

Will there be any financial assistance provided to pensioners and disabled people to help meet the costs of alarm installations?

As a general principle, home owners are responsible for the costs of ongoing work needed to protect and preserve their own property. As with other housing standards, it will be the responsibility of the homeowner to meet the new fire and carbon monoxide alarm standard. Local authorities have broad discretionary powers to provide advice and assistance to home owners with work needed to look after their homes.

I am a tenant of the local authority or a housing association, when will my home have these alarms?

Social landlords (local authority and housing association landlords) are aware of the new standard and have been working to ensure that the new alarms are in place, where needed. The standard will be monitored by the Scottish Housing Regulator, who may intervene as they deem appropriate for any non-compliance.

I have shared ownership of my home with a housing association. I have been told that I am responsible for making sure that my house complies with the standard, is this correct?

For shared ownership properties, as with other condition standards, responsibilities are set out in the occupancy agreement. However, in general, it is your responsibility as the proportion owner, rather than the registered social landlord, to meet the new fire alarm standard.

I am a tenant in a privately rented property – how do I make sure my landlord complies?

As the new standards for fire alarms extend those which currently apply in the Private Rented Sector to housing of all tenures, your landlord should already be complying. The standard is enforced by the right of tenants to apply to the First-tier Tribunal for Scotland (Housing and Property Chamber), so if you believe that your landlord is failing to comply, you can apply to the First-tier Tribunal. Penalties for non-compliance would be determined by the Tribunal.

COMPLIANCE WITH THE NEW STANDARD

How will local authorities check that home owners comply?

Most home owners want to make their homes as safe as possible. As this will be a minimum standard for safe houses, local authorities could use their statutory powers to require owners to carry out work on substandard housing, although we would expect any intervention to be proportionate.

HOUSEHOLD INSURANCE

How will the new regulations impact my household insurance policy?

Different home insurance policies provided by different insurers will have varying terms and conditions which a homeowner must comply with in order for their home insurance to be valid. Anyone who is unclear about the terms and conditions of their specific policy in relation to the fire alarm requirements should get in touch with their home insurer in the first instance, to check whether the new requirements will be specifically included in their policy or not.

BUILDING REGULATIONS REQUIREMENTS

I am having an extension added to my home – and need to meet building regulations. What types of alarms can I install?

While building regulations recommend mains operated devices with battery back-up for building work in certain circumstances, tamper proof long-life lithium battery operated devices may be the preferred option for home owners. The building standards system gives the local authority verifier a degree of flexibility when applying the building regulations to alterations, extensions and conversions. They can consider that a sealed long-life battery-operated system that is interlinked via radio frequency can provide an equal or in some cases, higher level of protection than is required through Building Regulations,

Is a building warrant required for the installation of fire and CO alarms?

If you are only installing battery operated alarms a building warrant is not required. If you install a mains-powered system rather than sealed battery alarms, this may require a building warrant to be obtained from your local authority verifier before any work starts. More information on the building standards system and how to obtain a building warrant can be found in the Building Standards Customer Journey. If you are in any doubt contact your local authority building standards service.

MARKETING MATERIAL FROM COMMERCIAL ENTERPRISES

I have received a leaflet from a business about the fire alarm standard telling me that I need to buy an alarm from them, do I have to do this?

You should make sure that your home meets the new standard for fire alarms, but should always think about which tradespeople you pay to do work on your home, you can chose who you use, and you should always use reputable businesses. If in any doubt seek advice from your local authority trading standards team. Local Care and Repair teams can also provide advice for older and disabled home owners. The Scottish Government does not endorse any particular suppliers, products or services.

<u>STRONSAY</u> Know Your History!

Stronsay surprisingly lacks a full scale history. Hopefully the Heritage Committee will gather the key sources for study. I would like to recommend (from OIC Public Library van ref: 336 Y)

THE ORKNEY POLL TAXES OF THE 1690s

Only 96 pages with half of that being appendices. An exceptional amount of research here, with much detail on nearly all Orkney parishes and comparative analysis. For Stronsay:

- Named listing of householders (nearly all male), marital status, numbers of tenants to lairds, numbers of servants, numbers of children, all with gender.
- Place names I noticed at least 20 properties still in use.
- Appendix C (page 45) gives estimates for population .but this combines Eday with Stronsay from 1627 to 1801 when first official UK Census held.
- Stronsay population in 1693 (Table 18 page 33) is given as 708 (104 house-holds, 142 named persons, 291 pollable persons the approx 24% poor were excluded.
- Several servants in Stronsay were head of households, thus not living in at their employer's home.
- Family structure, rents, occupations etc. data is also tabulated.

LAMB HEAD SEA CAVE


Stronsay legend says that a sea cave exists below Lamb Head. Locals say the cave runs from Whale Geo to Hells Mouth. The Ordnance Survey map shows a cave on the Lamb Bay side of the Head. An article in the August 2017 edition of the Limpet makes mention of a kayak trip through the cave by Peter Hall. No written records of swimming through the cave could be found.

After a recent swim under the Vat of Kirbister Andy Whiteman and Bill Hodgson started discussing their next adventure. The informal Stronsay Extreme Adventure Club was formed with a motto of "Let's Do It'. The reality was that two old men who should have known better had a cunning plan. Andy mentioned the local knowledge of the cave and the Limpet article.

On Saturday 4 September 2021 the Club had grown to three members with the addition of Iain Johnston, who had been talked into this adventure by Andy and Bill. At 1pm the trio walked out to Lamb Head carrying their equipment. The plan was to arrive at low tide and the weather was favourable. The group had decided to enter the water at Whale Geo and locate the cave. Whale Geo so named because a whale was reported to have been stranded there a number of years ago. Lamb Head is a special place with a long history of human habitation including a number of cairns and the broch. We wondered if the ancient inhabitants knew of the cave and swam through it. After getting changed into our wetsuits and checking our lights, goggles and cameras we walked the short distance to Whale Geo. We scrambled down the rocks and entered the deep water of the Geo. We were joined by a number of Shags who had been watching our every move from the surrounding cliffs. From here we could see what appeared to be a cave entrance at the far end of the Geo. Though deep the water was crystal clear and we could see a forest of kelp, small jellyfish, sea urchins and numerous small fish. The colours were just amazing. We chatted a giggled like little kids. As we arrived at the cave entrance we could see in about 50m then it just went dark. We were able to swim in with the water varying in depth. It was obvious from the limpets on the cave wall that at high tide the cave would be filled with water so our low tide choice was wise. As we turned the first corner the head torches were required as all daylight had vanished. The rocks were smooth and colours just beautiful. Stalactites could be seen hanging from the cave roof. We could hear the gloup of the water ahead and thought we could hear the open sea beyond. Iain took the lead at this point as Bill and Andy were just messing around. Suddenly Iain shouted I can see light. Bill and Andy stopped messing around and joined Iain. We swam together towards the light and as we approached the cave exit could see Selkies bobbing around the entrance curious at our presence. We had found the cave running below Lamb Head. The exit brought us out into Lamb Bay and only 50m from where we had left our gear.

The water especially in the Geo is very deep and cold. Also be aware that this is on private land and respect must be given to the livestock and property.

LATEST BIRD SIGHTINGS

With so little wind from an easterly quarter, virtually all of the unusual/interesting sightings have been surprises. Just how bird-watching should be!

The biggest surprise has been the number of 'birds of prey' – Hen Harrier daily (at least 4 individuals - including males) at least 3 Kestrels, and a few sightings of Sparrow-hawk, Merlin and Peregrine. The most interesting 'small bird' sightings have been: a Grasshopper Warbler flying across the road at Matpow on 24th August (Donald Omond) - just the second island record of the species; a (Common) Rosefinch at Samsonslane on 12th Sept -(also DO); a Redwing seen by daughter Hazel along the Airy Road around the same time, and a Tree Pipit in the Reserve drive on 15th. There have been several sightings of Short-eared Owl (see photo).

The Bu Loch was totally dry for much of late summer but as water built up in the second half of September, birds began to congregate there – mostly gulls, Curlew and Lapwing, but also a large flock of over 30 Sandwich Terns – more than have been seen here for many years. The 'waders' too returned in good numbers – mainly Curlew ,Lapwing and Bar-tailed Godwit . A flock of 400 or so Golden Plover had built up in the pastureland but were hard to locate, and a few Knot were seen at the Bu Loch. Parties of Snipe were also seen 'f'lying in' - perhaps migrants from Iceland? Wigeon were arriving from their breeding grounds further north, and the first Whooper Swans (Winter visitors here from Iceland) arrived on 24th – 10 at Matpow and 15 or so on the Lea Shun Loch later in the day.

Skylarks began re-appearing in mid-month and there were encouraging signs that Twite had bred on the island again. Most of the interesting sightings were of migrants as usual but there was a dearth of sightings throughout the last month or so – just 2-3 Willow Warblers and Blackcaps, and 2 Garden Warblers. A Spotted Flycatcher was a real surprise in the Castle garden on 21st September but it did not stay long! Just a single Stonechat has been recorded so far this Autumn (see photo) – at the new 'workings' at Bomasty Bay. Stonechats are attracted to what might be called 'earthworks', following the earth-moving machines around and gobbling up the exposed worms etc. They can become quite tame and odd birds over-winter here some years.

There were the usual sightings of 'Greenland' Wheatears along the roads throughout September (see photo), including what appeared to be a 'family' party of 5 in the Airy Rd. A few Chaffinches were recorded after mid-month, and as usual several were recorded in the cultivated land at Samsonslane, but there was a big surprise as we drove past the workings at the new 'Water Works' near 'Iona' when a flock of over 200 Linnets flew up from the disturbed ground there. – most probably all 'Iocal' birds attracted to the 'weed-seeds' of the new, low vegetation. Pied Wagtails arrived in good numbers during the month – almost all around the roads, their preferred feeding habitat here during Autumn migration in particular.

More signs of Autumn appeared on 22nd when flocks of 90 and 30 or so Pinkfooted Geese were seen coming in high from the North-West and flying on towards the Scottish Mainland. (DO reported that big numbers were seen flying south over Caithness that day). A flock of 40 or so flew south over Mill Bay on 23rd. *(continued on next page)* Many of the local breeding Swallows and Sand Martins had left the island by the 20th – a sign that winter is on the way. 6 Herons were at the Bu Loch on 24th and a rather dark) Robin has recently taken up residence in the Castle garden. It will be interesting to see if it can avoid the marauding 'birds of prey' - Merlin and Sparrowhawk – during the coming months.

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place ("blended" from West Manse) Keeping the folk of the North Isles ward informed with Orkney's only councillor newsletter

Early in September, Orkney passed its 200th confirmed Covid case. This means that nearly 1% of the Orkney population has been infected (compared with about 8% for all Scotland and 10% for the UK as a whole). This is no time to be complacent!

It was heartening to hear a suggestion (BBC Radio Orkney, 25th August) from Iain Stewart MP, the (UK) Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Scotland, that, through its "Union Connectivity Review", the UK Govt could potentially provide finance towards replacing Orkney Ferries' ageing fleet. Let's see if the UK Govt will support us where the Scot Govt has rejected us.

A review is being undertaken, as promised, on the revised Orkney Ferries fare structure. An online feedback form can be found at: <u>https://www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/</u><u>TQEKCO/</u> or a paper copy can be requested by sending an e-mail to: <u>transport@orkney.gov.uk</u> or by phoning 01856-873535 ext 3637. A modification I am asking for is for the fares to be rounded to the nearest 10p. The deadline for responses is very soon, the 30th September!

We had an update on the Scapa Deep Water Quay and Hatston projects—which I still consider speculative, and risky, vanity projects, certainly for as long as the refurbishment of our life-line inter-island ferry harbour infrastructure remains neglected.

As a step back to normality, some Council meetings have become "blended". This means some councillors are assembled in the Chamber at School Place, while others continue to participate by "Teams". I don't find it all that satisfactory, because it somewhat sidelines those not actually present in the room (the same as I've argued in the past about video conferencing).

Some community councils meetings have also been "blended". Sanday and Papay were the first, but, unfortunately, with Papay's, the sound quality coming from St Ann's Community Room was so poor I had trouble following the meeting. Purely "Teams" community council meetings I have attended this month are those of Stronsay (with a presentation by Michelle Koster from Warmworks), and North Ronaldsay.

Congratulations to North Ronaldsay on achieving *Dark Skies Status*. It's taken a long time, considering I wrote a letter to Dr John Barentine at the International Dark-Sky Association supporting their application back on 21st February 2017.

I attended a meeting of Westray School Parent Council through an awful connection via Vscene. (My connection kept cutting out, so I missed a great deal of it.) I shall be attending the forthcoming Stronsay School Parent council meeting in person.

At the Education, Leisure & Housing Committee meeting, my amendment to refer the decision on the future of The Grind to Eday Community Council won. I felt it important that the Eday community (through their elected reps) make such a decision.


At a Special General Meeting, I managed to prevent OIC's share of funding from the Scottish Crown Estate marine assets being plundered to pay for an access roadway across Bignold Park in Kirkwall. As this money is distributed to local authorities based on their share of coastline, I reiterated my conviction that Orkney's share be distributed among our council wards in the same way, in which case the North Isles Ward would be entitled to 48% of it! (See my *Letter*, issue 90 – July 2020.) Consequently, at the Policy & Resources Committee meeting, I was delighted and more than happy to be able to support Crown Estate money being deployed to assist funding the creation of the new Wyre Community & Heritage Centre.

Other meetings I have "been to" (virtually) this month include those of the Air Services Consultative Forum; Ferry Services Consultative Forum; two ("blended") confidential members' meetings with the Chief Executive; Orkney Health & Care Cttee; a seminar on Scottish Flood Forum support for OIC; Dounreay Stakeholder Group; and Monitoring & Audit Committee.

We recently found in a charity shop "Mma Ramotswe's Cookbook — Nourishment for the traditionally built". How reassuring to find a recipe book that caters to one's own constitution. What is more, the recipes are given in the traditional Imperial units of measurement (and not in those unsuitably small metric measurements, which re better suited to chemistry than to cookery). This is very appropriate, given that, as the Bechuanaland Protectorate, Botswana, from where these recipes originate, was part of the British Empire.

<u>Records of a Bygone Age</u> <u>Donald Horne Learmonth of Housebay</u>

As recorded in an earlier article in the 'Limpet', the Learmonths were involved in farming at Housebay for nigh on fifty years, a time that had seen the farm brought up from a run-down unit in the throes of bankruptcy to become one of the best farms in Orkney. This involvement ended when Donald Horne Learmonth, in partnership with his mother Catherine, found themselves in financial difficulty meaning that, in November 1892, they had to sell all their stock, implements and sundries at Housebay to try to meet their commitments. The farm itself was rented, and they also had to give up the lease on it.

Following the sale at Housebay Donald, along with his wife Roseanna and their four children rented and moved to Gaitnip Farm near Kirkwall for a time, then relocated to Aberdeenshire where his occupation was given as a 'cattle dealer'. Among a number of documents belonging to DH Learmonth and deposited in the Orkney Library archives is a well-worn map depicting the gold fields of South Africa, but whether Donald had visions of making his fortune digging for gold, whether he planned to resume a farming career there or had another career planned is unclear. What is known is that he felt drawn to South Africa to start a new life, with his wife and family to follow him there as soon as he became established. Sadly, this wasn't to be, as tragedy struck before his family could join him, as reported in the Orkney Herald of 6th April 1904:


Fatal drowning accident in the Transvaal Death of Mr D.H. Learmonth

Details have now been received of the death by drowning in the Transvaal on March 10th of Mr D.H. Learmonth, sometime tenant of Housebay, Stronsay and afterwards of Gaitnip, by Kirkwall. The Pretoria News of March 12th says:-

A fatal drowning accident occurred at Magalies River on Thursday afternoon, March 10th, whereby Mr D.H. Learmonth, late inspector of donkey transport, lost his life. He was driving in a cart with two horses, and shortly after 1 o'clock in the afternoon, whilst on his way back from Commando Nek, essayed to cross a drift in the river just at the place where the stream flows over the main road from Rustenburg. The river was in flood at the time, being much swollen by heavy rains and the drift was dangerous. The boy who was driving advised him not to cross, but he anticipated no danger and bid the drivers proceed. It is said that, just as he reached the centre of the stream, a great wall of water was observed coming down, and seeing this, an attempt was made to turn. The horses faced the water, but could not move the cart quickly enough. The water caught the vehicle and overturned it. The whole team was carried down the river. The boy managed to get safely to the bank, but Mr Learmonth was swept away and drowned. From the S.A.C. post at Reitfontein, Corporal Harrison and Trooper Brooks proceeded to make enquiries on receipt of information and, searching along the bank of the river, discovered the cart. Further down the bodies of the horses were found lying on their sides on a mudbank left by the receding stream.

The body of Mr Learmonth has not yet been recovered, but as the struit is still very much flooded and the banks are steep and difficult of negotiation, it is probable that it will not be found until the water recedes, it being most likely caught on an obstruction and held there. It is not known what friends Mr Learmonth had in South Africa, but it is generally understood that he has family connections in Scotland. Those knowing anything of his family, if they would leave particulars at the office of the Resident Magistrate, Pretorius State, would confer a favour on those who are anxious to make the occurrence of the death of Mr Learmonth public. The boy Angus Conkie, who drove Mr Learmonth, came into town this morning and stated to Mr Rose Innes how the affair occurred. When they got to the Magalies River, just near its junction with the Crocodile, they tested the drift and found it to be very deep. There were three men there who had attempted to cross but could not, and they advised Mr Learmonth not to try it. It was too much swollen to admit of them doing so. They outspanned and waited. After a while two others came up on bikes, who said they thought it could be crossed. The boy Isaac essayed to cross, but found that the water was up to his middle and the current was very strong. About 2 o'clock Mr Learmonth decided to inspan and try it. They did so, with the result that they were swept away. One of the men on the bank called out to Isaac to help his master, as he was being carried away. Isaac turned to help him, and managed to reach where he was struggling. Learmonth caught the boy by the shoulder from the back and supported himself for a while, but suddenly he let go, and was carried away by the current.



Donald and Roseanna had eight children, the oldest of whom would have been aged 18 and the youngest aged 5 at the time of Donald's death. His widow Roseanna (nee Houston) stayed on in Aberdeen for a time, renting out lodgings and apartments there until at least 1910. Some time after this, she moved to Ontario, Canada to live with some of her family, where she died on 7th June 1943. A memorial to Donald, Roseanna and some of their children stands in Greenwood Cemetery in Georgetown, Ontario.


Seas of the North Isles: Prehistoric Seafaring and Early Colonisation


