

ATHENIA LIFEBOAT

Here's a photo of the newly renovated Athenia Lifeboat (the Boatie Hoose outside Seafield). Huge thanks to the North Isles Landscape Partnership for the funding for this and congratulations to the WRC lads for such a truly amazing job!



<u>A very brief introduction to the history of the restored lifeboat originally from SS</u> <u>Athenia, and now on the fore-shore at Seafield, Stronsay.</u>

'On 3rd September 1939 war was declared between Great Britain and Germany. When the official announcement was made to the nation, the 13,500 ton passenger ship the SS Athenia (Donaldson Line) was en route from Liverpool to Canada with 1147 passengers and crew on board. The majority of the passengers were women and children, and included many refugees from Europe fleeing the imminent bloodbath of war and oppression in Europe, as well as tourists mostly from the USA and Canada, whose main aim was to return home safely. At 11a.m. the news was broken to the passengers that a state of war now existed between Great Britain and Germany. The route taken by the SS Athenia was westward along the north coast of Ireland and thence to Montreal and Quebec. The declaration of war was not entirely unexpected and the possible existence of German submarines in the area was known to Captain Cook of the SS Athenia. By 1p.m. the ship's 26 lifeboats had been prepared and were ready to be launched should the need arise. The Athenia was now about 300 miles from Liverpool, well out into the Atlantic and bound for a neutral port (Canada did not declare war for five more days). *(continued on next page)*

She was an unarmed passenger ship which had set sail before the declaration of war, and although alarmed by the turn of events, none of the passengers could imagine anything really happening to them.

At 7.39p.m disaster struck. The SS Athenia was torpedoed by a German U boat - U30, captained by Oberleutnant Fritz-Julius Lemp. Although under strict orders from Hitler to avoid any confrontation with civil shipping it was later stated in Lemp's defence that he thought the SS Athenia was an armed and converted merchant ship as it was sailing without lights in a zig-zag formation. A second torpedo misfired, forcing the U boat to submerge to avoid being struck by it's own torpedo, and on resurfacing a third torpedo was fired which also missed. Lemp then, realising his mistake and being aware of the potential international repercussions of his actions, rapidly left the scene, failing to report the incident to his superiors until September 14th.

The SS Athenia took several hours to finally go down. Most if not all the lifeboats were launched, although of the Athenia's passengers and crew, 112 were killed (93 of them passengers) in the initial explosion or died later as a result of the sinking. There are many stories of individual heroism and tragedy told by survivors and recounted in the book 'A Night of Terror' by Max Caulfield published by Frederick Muller Ltd, London, 1958. Three British destroyers Electra, Escort, and Fame, together with two merchant ships City of Flint and Southern Cross, and the Norwegian vessel the Knut Nelson, all attended the scene over the ensuing hours rescuing the more than 1000 survivors from the lifeboats and the sea.

The German High Command initially denied any responsibility or involvement in the incident even going so far as to accuse the British of deliberately sinking the ship which carried many USA citizens on board, in order to encourage the USA to enter the war against Germany. The spectre of the sinking of the passenger ship Lusitania in the 1st World War haunted the German military command, and they feared that the sinking of the Athenia could have grave consequences on world opinion. As it happened this did not materialise although it did effect German naval tactics particularly in the early part of the war. Hitler issued an order that under no circumstances were attacks to be made on passenger ships, even those in convoy, regardless of nation, thus causing confusion to U boat commanders as to the vessels they were permitted to attack- for passenger ships sometimes carried troops, and freighters, passengers.

Of the lifeboats from the stricken SS Athenia, all did the job for which they were designed, ensuring the survival of more than 1000 passengers and crew. Several days after the sinking, the captain of a passing ship the SS Transylvania, noticed in the area 'an empty and abandoned lifeboat' floating on the waves.

Some months later an empty lifeboat found it's way to Shapinsay one of the northern isles in Orkney, having apparently drifted on the currents from the north Atlantic to the waters off Deerness where, it is believed, it was seen and towed into Shapinsay by a father and son fishing-boat team both of whom have since died. What is certain is that at some time during the early 1940's this lifeboat was acquired by a Captain Dennison of Shapinsay and used by him for carrying egg-boxes and the like, around and between the islands.

There are those alive today who have verified that this lifeboat at that time had the name ATHENIA thereon and it was generally accepted and acknowledged then and up to the present day that this lifeboat was in fact from the SS Athenia.

During the late 1940's the boat was regularly used for the collection and transportation of seaweed – a thriving industry after the war when seaweed was used in the manufacture of iodine, soap, and fertiliser. Again there are those around today who can remember this boat – commonly known as 'Desperate Dan' in view of it's substantial weight and clumsiness in handling, for it had no engine and had to be towed.

In 1949, J.M.Davidson of Glasgow shut down his sea-weed processing factory on Stronsay and the boat became redundant. It was then acquired by Mr J Chalmers (Pye) of Seafield, Stronsay, who moved it from the foreshore at Lower Station to the foreshore at Seafield and converted it into a 'houseboat', where it has remained to this day.

In 2004 the Stronsay Development Trust decided with the agreement of the current owner of the lifeboat, Mr Clive Martin, to investigate and confirm beyond reasonable doubt the history and identity of the lifeboat as being from the SS Athenia, with a view to obtaining funding for it's restoration and preservation. This step is thought by many to be long overdue particularly bearing in mind the deterioration in the condition of the lifeboat over the years. The sinking of the SS Athenia was a tiny but nevertheless significant event in the overall maritime annals of the 2nd World War, and as custodians of almost certainly the only surviving lifeboat from this ship, we feel it a duty to preserve this unique vessel to serve both as a memorial and a reminder of those who died and indeed of those who survived.'

It is exciting and very pleasing to see the SS Athenia lifeboat now beautifully restored on the foreshore at Seafield, Stronsay. Huge thanks are due to the Stronsay Development Trust and to Clive and Madeleine Martin for persevering and supporting this project over a period of some 16 years or so, not forgetting the vital help and financial support of the North Isles Landscape Partnership.


<u>The 25th Anniversary of the</u> <u>Stronsay Bird Report</u>

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

Regularly reporting on the exploits of your councillor in Kirkwall, the North Isles, and beyond

A combined effort by North Isles' & South Isles' community councillors, North Isles' & South Isles' OIC councillors, and local people with medical training has succeeded in convincing Orkney Health & Care to drop for the time being its plan to exclusively use the NHS24 telephone service for out-of-hours medical cover. I've been involved in a follow-up meeting on this and another meeting of the First Responders (Isles) Group. In Orkney Health & Care's Annual Performance Report 2021/22, it is interesting to note that 92% of people in the Isles are recorded as having a positive experience of care at their GP practice (compared to 88% for Orkney as a whole, and a Scottish average of only 67%). Long may it remain this way, or even improve!

There has been no let-up in meetings in the approach to Christmas. I went to Destination Orkney's tourism conference and attended a seminar on tourism in Orkney; took part in a procurement session, a confidential members' briefing, a seminar on the Council's capital programme, a General Meeting, and a Special General Meeting (following a special meeting of the Policy & Resources Committee). The Orkney NFU treated us councillors to a very informative presentation on Orkney agriculture.



In the week before the big snow up there, I spent two days in Shetland with the Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board (O&SVJB), attending meetings and a training session. The Orkney members were kindly given a tour by our hosts of *Mareel*, a multi-purpose entertainment venue and arts centre. Being a member of the O&SVJB gives a few, lucky OIC councillors the opportunity to engage with our counterparts in Orkney's parallel universe. The formal Board meeting was held in SIC's new chamber in the former St Ringan's Church in Lerwick. It is dominated by a massive table (see photo above) that would surely make Vladimir Putin envious. Too long to be practical, in my opinion. If it wasn't for the webcasting set-up, people at one end of the table would have to shout or use a megaphone to be heard by those at the other end! In the photo below, you can see the two Stephens who now lead the Valuation Joint Board: me (Depute Convener) and Shetland's Stephen Leask (Convener).

In the Isles I have attended a meeting of Shapinsay Community Council, Westray Community Council, and delivered a speech at the lighting of Sanday's Christmas tree.

Let's see what 2023 will bring.

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Records of a Bygone Age Stronsay's First Lifeboat – the John Ryburn Part 2

In last month's Limpet it was reported that the three new lifeboats for Thurso, Stromness and Stronsay had problems on their journey north from where they had been built on the Thames. The story continues:

These problems mostly befell the Stronsay boat, with engine problems on the run to the Tyne necessitating a new bearing to be fitted to the engine. Then, on the Fraserburgh leg of the journey, she lost her mizzen mast which had to be replaced before she could continue and finally, on leaving Thurso on 30th April 1909, the engine again gave problems and the John Ryburn had to return to Thurso to berth.

Below is a report from the Orcadian of 8th May 1909, recording the long and arduous journey undertaken by the volunteer crews of the three lifeboats to bring their new vessels to Thurso and Orkney:

THE LIFEBOATS ON THE WAY NORTH.

The Stronsay men courteously supplied us with the following particulars of the run north from London: - Three new lifeboats for the North of Scotland - the motor lifeboats John A. Hav the John Ryburn for Stromness and Stronsay respectively and the new sailing lifeboat for Thurso left London on the morning of fifth April at 8 o'clock. Stronsay men manned both the Orkney boats. The Stromness lifeboat had as a crew George Williamson (coxswain), John Williamson, John Muir, John Eunson, and John Stout. There were also on board Commander F. J. Rowley, R.N., who acted as navigating officer to the flotilla, and Mr Small, the Royal National Lifeboat Institution's motor expert. The crew of the Stronsay lifeboat consisted of the following: - G. Eunson (coxswain), John Fiddler (bowman), Peter Williamson, John Leslie, James Logie, and John Miller (engineer.) The Thurso boat had representatives of the boat's crew on board. The first stop after leaving London was at Harwich which was reached about 8 o' clock on the evening of 16th April. Here the crews were exceedingly well treated. On the morning of the 17th, the boats left for Yarmouth, and in fine weather this port was duly reached. The next day's run was a good test for the engines. The departure made from Yarmouth at 6 o' clock, and 14 hours later, Grimsby was reached – a non-stop run of 96 miles. Scarborough was reached on the 20th. On the following day the flotilla on leaving for the Tyne encountered a strong head wind, and the boats put into Hartlepool. Next morning, the weather having moderated a course was set for the Tyne, which was reached about 8 p.m. On this run the after bearing of the shaft of the Stronsav boat had heated, necessitating the engine being taken out, and waiting till the new bearing arrived. On the defect being remedied the boats sailed for Blyth, but, owing to the detention at Shields remedying the engine detect, the call at Berwick, arranged, was not made, and the flotilla proceeded direct to Dundee from Blyth - a distance of 110 miles. The engines during the whole run went without a hitch. After leaving Dundee such a strong head wind was encountered on reaching the mouth of the Tay that Commander Rowley deemed it expedient to put back.

A start was made for Aberdeen at 6 a.m. on Tuesday, and the boats arrived off Girdleness about eleven hours later. Here they were taken in tow by a tug, and safely berthed in dock. At Aberdeen the Stronsay boat lost her mizzen mast, but this was remedied on reaching Fraserburgh on the 28th inst. The next port of call was Wick, but such a strong head wind was experienced that the passage occupied some 17 hours. The boats were expected to arrive at Thurso last Friday forenoon about 11 o'clock, and a number of persons proceeded to Scrabster Roadstead at that time to welcome the arrival. It was, however, almost 1 o'clock before the boats were sighted off Dunnet Head, and fully an hour later before they arrived at Scrabster Roadstead. Stormy weather had prevailed and the flotilla encountered a rough passage coming through the Pentland Firth, heavy hail showers falling at intervals, accompanied by a strong wind and a heavy sea. When in the Firth owing to the heavy sea running, the tow rope between the John Ryburn, and the Thurso boat (Sarah Austin) slipped off the billet head of the latter, and some time elapsed before they were again connected. The crews were accorded a great reception as the boats drew alongside the pier under the command of Commander Howley. In the course of the afternoon the two Orkney boats sailed for Stromness but when off Dunnet Head, the engine of the Stronsay boat again gave trouble and had to return to Scrabster. Commander Rowlev proceeded to Stromness with the boat for that station. Next day, Mr Small, the motor expert, proceeded to Scrabster, and it was then found that the fore bearing of the Stronsay boat was now the cause of the trouble, and that a new part would require to be obtained. It was accordingly arranged that the mail steamer St Ola should tow the lifeboat to Stromness. It was this part of the passage that was perhaps the most trying for the crew. They were simply drenched with spray, and Mr Small's kindness in seeing that the men were supplied with tea on arrival at Scapa was most highly appreciated. The events which followed the arrival at Stromness have already been described. We were specially requested by the Stronsay men to express their sense of gratitude for the great kindness and consideration they received front both Commander Rowley and Mr Small.

The Stromness boat had arrived safely at her home port late in the evening of 30th April while the following day, as reported above, the Stronsay boat suffered the indignity of being towed across the Pentland Firth by the St Ola before she too was berthed safely at Stromness. The crew later described their tow across the Pentland, at full speed and in adverse sea conditions, as being the worst part of the whole journey!

The John Ryburn had to wait in Stromness for new engine parts to arrive and be fitted before she could continue her journey, eventually reaching Stronsay on 15th May, a full month after leaving London. The following day she was officially handed over to the local Lifeboat Committee by the RNLI's Commander Rowley and was accepted on the committee's behalf by Dr Robert Rosie, the local GP.



The Thames Ironworks, where many of the early RNLI lifeboats were built.

Built at the Thames Ironworks near Greenwich in London, the John Ryburn was a Watson class lifeboat, 43ft (13m) long with a beam of $12\frac{1}{2}$ ft (4m), built at a cost of £2770 -9-5d, and was one of two lifeboats funded from a generous bequest from William McCann of Largs. She was fitted with a single Blake 40 bhp engine, which cost £375 and weighed around 15 cwt (750kgs), and achieved a top speed of 7.2 knots during her sea trials. Her cruising speed was reckoned at 6.4 knots, a very sedentary pace by today's standards but a very acceptable speed at that time.

As a little bit of trivia, in the late 1890s the Thames Ironworks had a very successful works football team, Thames Ironworks Football Club, who played in the Southern League. In the 1898/99 season they were 2nd Division champions, achieving promotion to the 1st Division where they played the following season. In 1900 this club resigned from the league and were immediately reformed under the new name of West Ham United Football Club. This club has, of course, achieved much fame and success over the intervening years and still plays in the English Premier League today. West Ham's emblem of crossed hammers represents the large riveting hammers used in the shipbuilding trade and their nickname of "The Hammers" is for this reason. While the media and the general football world commonly refer to the club as The Hammers, the club's own supporters seemingly usually refer to their team as 'The Irons', which again comes from that historic link with the Thames Ironworks. Apparently, more than 120 years after the club was formed, the chant 'Come on you Irons' is still to be heard on match days at West Ham!

The John Ryburn was yet to be officially named, although a naming ceremony had originally been planned in Kirkwall as she headed home to Stronsay. With the delays and breakdowns on the journey, this never happened and the 'Orcadian' of 17th April reported that it was 'decided to postpone the ceremony, as it was considered that the lifeboat after her passage north will hardly be presentable, and will first require to be painted.'

The new date for the naming ceremony was fixed for 28th September, again to be held in Kirkwall, and the John Ryburn duly appeared in Kirkwall Basin that day, resplendent in her new coat of paint and bedecked with a colourful display of flags. Her appearance attracted much interest and attention as she lay alongside the Corn Slip in the basin and a steady stream of visitors came to cast their eyes over her until, soon after noon, a large crowd had gathered for the naming ceremony. This ceremony was carried out by Mrs Balfour, wife of Colonel Balfour of Balfour and Trenabie, who named the ship John Ryburn and recited the traditional wish of *"success to her and all who sailed in her"* before breaking the customary bottle of champagne over the bow.


Below is a full report of the ceremony which was carried in the Orkney Herald of 29th September 1909.

ROYAL NATIONAL LIFEBOAT INSTITUTION. (KIRKWALL AND NORTH ISLES BRANCH.) NAMING CEREMONY OF STRONSAY LIFEBOAT.

A most interesting ceremony took place at Kirkwall Harbour yesterday (Tuesday) morning, viz. the naming ceremony of the Stronsay lifeboat, John Ryburn. The ceremony was performed at the Corn Slip before a large number of spectators. The boat had been moored at the slip since early in the morning, and excited a great deal of attention. A meeting of the local committee was held at 11.45 a.m., after which the committee proceeded to the Corn Slip, where the naming ceremony was proceeded with. Among those present were - Col., Mrs, and Miss Balfour, Sheriff and Mrs Harvey, Dr Craven, Rev. John Rutherford, Col. T. Smith Peace, Ex-Provost Sclater, Provost Slater, Bailie Baikie, Capt. Robertson, Dr Sinclair, Messrs A. Stewart, Wm. MacLennan, S. Reid, jnr., G. C. Pitts, J.W. Cursiter, and W. Cooper, members of the branch; and Dr Rosie, Messrs R. Mitchell, D. Pottinger, and John Shearer, members of the Stronsay Executive. At 11 o'clock the local committee arrived, and the proceedings were opened by Ex-Provost Sclater, Chairman of the Committee, who said the meeting there that day was under the auspices of the Kirkwall and North Isles branch of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. Three years ago, Lieut. Hall visited Kirkwall to endeavour to raise sufficient enthusiasm to have a lifeboat placed at Stronsay. He met with a very hearty response, and Kirkwall agreed to co-operate and form a local committee, and they saw the outcome of this resolution that day. There was a desire to see the whole North Isles on this committee, and have a lifeboat in each isle if possible, or where absolutely necessary. They all knew of the disaster in North Ronadshay not long since, and how the want of lifeboat was felt then, and if there had been one at Stronsay the crew might have been saved. North Ronaldshay ought at once to be put in telegraphic communication with all the islands in Orkney, and he hoped this would again be brought to the notice of the Government. Lieut. Hall was unfortunately unable to be present owing to other engagements, but his representative, in Lieut. Charles Forbes, R.N., was present, and would make the necessary representations. Addressing the crew of the life-boat, Ex-Provost Sclater said -

I suppose, gentlemen, you have already taken a pride in your craft. You have been selected and appointed by the committee in your island, who are best able to judge, and they have done their best and chosen a good crew. 'You have given yourselves to a noble calling, and you may have to make many sacrifices, and take many risks in giving yourselves to this noble occupation. You are familiar with that great song, "Rule Britannia, Britannia rules the waves." I know of no situation in which a better illustration of this song is given than a lifeboat proceeding to sea in a storm with only the flares of the ship in distress to guide it. You may have the satisfaction of conveying the crew back to land, and you may be sure the task of rescuing these loved ones for their families will never be forgotten. There is no need for me to say anything to encourage you. I am sure you will prove faithful to the charge you have taken up. We are here to give the boat a name. I have very great pleasure in now calling on our worthy representative, Lieut. Charles Forbes, R.N. (Applause). Lieut. Charles Forbes, representative of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution, said that we had all just listened to a most eloquent speech, and he would not make any long remarks. The boat was one of two constructed from funds left by Wm. McCunn. The one is at Port Logan and the other is the John Ryburn. He also left endowments for these boats, and a further sum for the widows and orphans of men who lost their lives serving on lifeboats. I must acknowledge this bequest on behalf of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. The idea of providing a lifeboat for the North Isles, and where it was to be placed, had been under consideration for some years, and finally Stronsay was decided on as being the most suitably situated, and the well known courage of the Stronsay men was also taken into consideration in this matter. (Applause.) The Institution considered as to the most suitable type of boat, and found a large and powerful one would be required. This boat is the largest and finest supplied by the Institution, and the first one designed and built to be used as a motor lifeboat. She was designed by that great designer, Mr Watson. Lieut. Forbes then explained that the Institution was altogether supported by voluntary subscriptions, and if it was not for the public they could not carry on their work. The funds collected locally are primarily used there, and anything taken here will be first used for supporting the Stronsay boat, and the balance, if any, sent to the institution. If the funds collected were not sufficient, the institution would pay the balance, and he was sure that a place like Kirkwall would be quite able to support the boat, and he hoped they would figure well with regard to subscriptions in the blue book issued by the Institution. On behalf of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution he had much pleasure in handing over the lifeboat to Colonel Balfour, chairman of the local committee. (Applause.) Col. Balfour said it was with a profound depth of grateful pleasure that, he accepted today, on behalf of the local committee, this magnificent lifeboat. He was sure this boat and bequest would draw forth the deepest gratitude, and he returned his most grateful and sincere thanks. This lifeboat was a specimen of the most modern improvements in lifeboats. It reminded them of that most sacred human obligation of endeavouring to save life, even if they should die in the attempt. Their thoughts naturally travel to those gallant men selected as the crew, and no words can describe how they admired their bravery and gallantry.

As regiments gather their colours with their numerous victories inscribed thereon, so around this crew will gather a record of bravery and gallantry to be handed down to all humanity. There was also the matter of funds. The method of meeting the expenses, etc., had already been explained, and, therefore, he would not deal with it. Two short pravers were now offered up by the Rev. John Rutherford, and afterwards the hymn, "Eternal Father, strong to save," was sung with great feeling by those present. Mr Robert Mitchell, hon. secretary of the Stronsay Executive, said that what they had heard there that day would encourage all to do everything they could for the lifeboat. Some time ago they began to ask themselves how that day's proceedings were to be carried out. One point was at once and most unanimously decided, namely that Mrs Balfour should he asked to name the boat. As a Shapinsay man this choice was particularly pleasing to him, and he knew how widely respected Col. and Mrs Balfour were. He had much pleasure in calling on Mrs Balfour to name the lifeboat. Mrs Balfour said "I name this boat the "John Ryburn," and wish success to her and all who sail in her." (Applause.) She then completed the ceremony by breaking a bottle of champagne over the bow of the boat. Three hearty cheers were then given for the life boat and crew and also for Mrs Balfour. The boat, with a large number of the committee and others on board, proceeded to the bay and manoeuvred off the harbour. A collection was taken up on behalf of the lifeboat and amounted to £17.

If the request is for travel assistance, members can award 50% of the requested amount with a capping limit of £200 funding within twelve months.

Full details of the event and/or project will be required and will be submitted to the next Community Council meeting for consideration.

Financial requests must be with the Island Link Officer prior to the event/project taking place and the payment of any grant awarded will require submission of evidence of expenditure from the applicant.

Each application will be considered on a case-by-case basis and should be submitted on an Application For Financial Assistance form available from the Island Link Officer.

A Verification Form will be required for <u>each separate delivery of a car</u> to the scrap yard.
