I was given recently a bundle of old Stronsay Church newsletters going back to 1950 with births deaths, marriages and new church members- the surnames are still very familiar today Cooper, Miller, Shearer, Dennison Fotheringhame, Peace, Stout, Chalmers, Work etc. In the first edition in December 1950, the minister wrote a short sermonette, entitled; the best things in life are free.



Reverend Edward Fox encouraged us to think about how valuable are the simple things of life, we so easily take for granted. For him the 3 best free things of Stronsay were the sun-set, the northern lights and the moonlight upon the water. And alongside that he names the words of the Lord's Prayer, which help us communicate with God and encourages us to respond in friendship, care and interest to others. The names back then are partly the same as today and maybe we still need at times encouragement to respond and help Stronsay be the place we want it to be?



Records of a Bygone Age The Church in Stronsay - Part 6

This was intended to be the final part of the story of the Stronsay Church but I've been given some more photos of the demolition of the church which I've included here so there will be one more episode yet to come!

With plans for the new church now accepted and Kirkwall contractor Ernest Firth securing the contract for the demolition of the old church and the erection of the new, the congregation met in the old church for the last time on Sunday March 4th 1951, with the builders then moving in on Tuesday 6th. The expectation of the congregation at that time was that the new church would be completed and ready for worship within two years. This new church was to be 20' longer, 6' narrower and a little higher than the old building, but with slightly less capacity due to the lack of a gallery as was in the old building. Worship moved to the Church Hall while demolition and building work was going on.





These two photos show the demolition of the church. The church gate can be seen in the photo on the right, showing how little space there was between the gate and the old church.

The work progressed well through the summer of 1951 as the old United Free (or Presbyterian) church was demolished to make way for the new Moncur Memorial and, during its demolition, some articles were found within the walls of the old building, no doubt placed there as what we would now call a 'time capsule'.

These were two missionary magazines, two notebooks and a 'Tom Thumb' bottle containing a letter. Sadly, the two notebooks were quite blank due to the writing having faded completely and the two magazines have been lost over the course of time. Fortunately, the bottle is still to the fore, with the remains of some of the builder's plaster still adhering to it, and the contents of the letter had been recorded before, through time, it too was mislaid or lost. The letter read:

"The foundation of the United Presbyterian Church was laid on Monday morning at 9 o'clock, the twenty-sixth of April 1858.

The Reverend James Mudie being present when he began Divine Service by singing the One Hundred and Twenty Seventh Psalm and Prayer being offered. The thirty fifth chapter of Exodus was read after which a suitable speech was delivered to a numerous audience from 1st Corinthians, Third Chapter and Eleventh verse. The meeting was concluded with prayer and praise, by singing the One Hundred and Twenty First psalm. Then the Masons went on with their work.

The foundation of the Manse will be laid in a few days hence. Both houses will cost (all expenses included) nearly one thousand pounds sterling money.

The demolition of the old building progressed quickly but then things ground to a halt and, in early 1952, frustration at the lack of progress led the Stronsay Church Board to make strong approaches to the appropriate Presbytery of Orkney Committee, who were overseeing the project, to ensure work was speeded up on the new building. On 30th April, members of Presbytery and the Stronsay Board met with Mr Firth the contractor, where concern was expressed at the slow progress of the building works, of unfulfilled promises, unpaid accounts and other complaints of unsatisfactory work. The contractor gave an undertaking to make more effort and was given until 1st June to satisfy the Board that work was progressing satisfactorily. Assurance was also given that the Church would be completed and ready to open in 1953, the same year that the coronation of Queen Elizabeth 2nd was to take place.

Over the following years, a number of progress reports were given, in Board minutes and other church documents, as follows:

By December 1952, it was stated that the building was slowly beginning to take shape but that there was still a long way to go. In March 1953, it was reported that contractor Mr Firth had paid one of his all too infrequent 'lightning' visits to the site and concern was expressed that he should be staying on site to see the job to completion. In June of that year, it was recorded that Mr Firth, had paid another of his all too short visits to the scene of the building operations, where he was present when architect Mr R W Johnston, one of the partners of Leslie Grahame Thomson and Associates, inspected the work which, although very slow, was approved, and everything was ready for the arrival of the timber for the roof. In early September 1953, architect Mr Johnston, along with Rev D A Williams, Presbytery Clerk, again visited the site. At this time it was recorded that Mr Firth had been on site for the last month, the longest stretch he had been on the island since the start of his contract, and by then the roof had been completed to the stage of slating. Again the work was passed but concern was expressed as to the late arrival of the slates to complete the roof. This concern was to be fully justified, as neither contractor nor slates were to make an appearance for fully two months!

In early March 1954, the architect and Presbytery Clerk again arrived to inspect progress on the Church. This progress was well below expectations and, after much consultation, plans were made to speed up operations. It was agreed that another inspection would take place in approximately six weeks and, thereafter, monthly inspections until completed.



This photo would probably have been taken sometime in 1953/54 as the Church was opened in May 1955and shows some of the workmen who were involved in the building of the new Kirk having a break, Note the machinery in the background - I have a feeling that Health and Safety regulations may not have been quite as strict then as they are today! The slates came from Caithness and the flagstones in the Chancel were sourced from a quarry in Sandwick but there was a strong local element to the building, with local blue whinstone and red sandstone both being quarried in Rothiesholm for some of the decorative stonework. The best of the building stones in the walls of the old church had also been carefully set aside for future use in the walls of the new, but this was far from enough to complete the new build. Several derelict houses in the Lower Station were also demolished so that the stones could be salvaged for the new church, These houses had formed a small street that ran at right angles to the road, just past the row of cottages that were later turned into a cattle shelter, the street being known affectionately as 'The Closs' or 'Duke Street'. One house in particular is worthy of mention, 'Davie's' by name. It was a three storey house built by Master Mason James Davie who had helped build the old Mudie Church in 1858 and whose signature was on the document found in the foundations of that church when it was demolished in 1951. It seems strangely fitting that so many of the stones that he had originally built, both in church and dwelling, should be used in this new memorial!

Below are some verses from a poem written by Tom McLachlan in 1954 (just at the time when some of the houses of his youth were being demolished) where he is taking a nostalgic and pensive look back at the people and houses of the Station of his youth fifty years previously:

"Jock Peace's hoose is faa'in doon and Stewart's cottage will be soon; While Davie's Hoose, that great block, hid's naething but a lot o'trock. Hid mak's a body middlin sad tae see the hoose o'poor Bildad, And Fair Isle Willie, gaun afore, and a'tae bruck there by the shore.

Stootie's hoose is tae the bair, and not a bigging's standing there; Below the Nazer's, bi me sa'l, juist roos o'rubble, that is aal. The steens that went tae big the hooses are pitten noo tae ither uses; In that New Kirk there on the Hill provided for in someeen's Will."



Some of the workmen involved in the building of the Stronsay Church quarrying red sandstone for use in the Church from the shore out past Furrowend in Rothiesholm. A few blocks of sandstone still lie where they were quarried and taken to the top of the beach but not needed. Metal rails were laid on a wooden base and a bogey used to move the stones 'fae the ebb tae the top o' the banks'. I don't have names for the first three in this photo but think the others are Sammy Reid, John Miller and Jim Work.

Local labour was used almost entirely, both at the demolition of the old Church and the building of the new. The following Stronsay men were employed on the job most of the time: James Work snr, Coneyhole; Sammy Reid, John Miller, John Pottinger and George Burghes, all of the Village. In addition, J Harvey, E Dunnet and J Irvine, all of Kirkwall, were masons and slaters, while J Leask, F Craigie, L Firth and E Firth were joiners, also from Kirkwall. Mr R Campbell, formerly of Sandybank, was Clerk of Works until he found travelling from Kirkwall too much, after which time David Fotheringhame of Holmsgarth took over that role.

As the building was nearing completion, more details were being finalised regarding some of the interior fixtures and fittings, the cost of some of which would have to be borne by the congregation and the most expensive of these being wiring the building for electricity. The Session Room and Vestry were to have a tiled grate and small sink fitted, with two new toilets constructed inside the entrance to the Vestry and Hall. The interior walls of the Church were to be plastered, with the roof open to show off the beams to best effect. Windows were to be of Cathedral glass, with the east window to be stained glass, a gift from the Women's Guild. 'Alamac' hardwood flooring in Sapele was to be laid, while the pulpit and lectern were to be pre-assembled by a 'south' firm then mounted on red sandstone bases. The Communion table and Elder's chairs were made in Edinburgh, while the chairs for the congregation were made and supplied by disabled exservicemen employed in the Lord Robert's Workshops.

Many smaller items were gifted, some anonymously, including a Church bell to hang in the belfry. By the summer of 1954, with the building slowly nearing completion, arrangements were made for the opening of the new Church and the date for this opening was fixed for 6th September 1954. It soon became apparent that this deadline was going to be missed and the Board felt they had no option but to postpone the opening until the spring of the following year.

11th May 1955 was the new date set for the opening of the church but the completion of the last few small tasks still dragged on for some time until the keys were eventually handed over by the contractor on 18th April 1955, less than a month before the opening ceremony of the new church and a full 10 years after the first intimation of the bequest.

The final part of the history of the Church in Stronsay will be in next month's 'Limpet'.

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

A regular report from your councillor, who supports 20mph speed limits for our schoolchildren's safety.

As I step out of my front door at this time of year, I am reminded of *The Garden of Flowers*, the second of the *Sanday Revival Hymns*, published in Edinburgh in 1861 for "the members and adherents of the Sanday Free Church Station by one of their deacons"—assumed to be the folklorist Walter Traill Dennison (1825-1894). Here is the first of its six verses:

O ye saints of the Blessed, no longer be dumb, As a garden of flowers has our island become; Where the bud and the blossom are rich in their bloom, And it scenteth the air with a balmy perfume; Let the prayer to the Father of mercy be ours, That it may not be only a garden of flowers.

The park around the West Manse (formerly the manse to the Free Kirk, the epicentre of the Sanday Revival) is annually carpeted with daisies, buttercups, orchids, cowslips, and many other blooms, although the cowslips would not have been there in Dennison's time, having been introduced from the banks of the River Clyde by the Rev Walter Forrest in the 1920s or '30s.

Our final General Meeting before the recess was probably the longest on record, the business taking a total of 1 hour and 41 minutes. Of course, the big item was the Council Leader's notice of motion that had been making international news, to seek alternative governance arrangements for Orkney. Fearing this was beginning to enter the realms of an Ealing Comedy ("Passport to Pierowall"...?) and heeding the warnings voiced by my wise and experienced colleague, former OIC Convener and current Vice-President of CoSLA, Cllr Dr Steven Heddle, I voted with Cllr Rev David Dawson's amendment against the motion, but we lost 6 votes to 15. A subsequent further amendment by Cllr Heddle was incorporated into the motion, which will help inject some sobriety. I seconded a notice of motion by Cllr John Ross Scott concerning "vapes", and this was passed.



As reported in The Orcadian 29th June, at a special meeting of the Development & Infrastructure (D&I) Committee (of which I'm not a member), rather than endorsing the recommendations to approve the traffic order to install 20mph speed limits around Isles schools, the Committee approved an amendment to reject the traffic order and re-allocate the funds designated for it to projects unspecified. This undoes over two decades of lobbying by some communities which had culminated in my unanimously-passed notice of motion of the 21st December 2021: "To install as soon as practicable, but not later than the end of 2023, a 20mph zone or speed limit on the roads in the vicinity of each of those schools in Orkney that still does not have one" (see Issue 107 of my Letter). Following my pre-notified amendment to the General Meeting (see The Orcadian 13th July), Cllr Dawson, Chairman of the D&I Committee agreed to take the item back for reconsideration. This will take place at the D&I Committee meeting of the 5th September. The other members of the D&I committee are Councillors Bevan, Hall, Leask, Manson, Peace, Skuse (Vice Chair), Stockan, Thomson, Tierney, Tullock, & Woodbridge, should you wish to lobby them in advance of that meeting.



Shortly before the start of our councillor recess (7th July to 20th August) we welcomed our Shetland colleagues to Orkney for a meeting of the Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board. Our next meeting will be after the recess in Shetland.

Congratulations to Eday Primary School on its recent inspection report, and well done to its staff.

On 6th July, I accompanied my younger daughter, Frideswide to Holyrood Palace to attend a celebration event for those who have achieved their Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award. There were four other recipients present who had also been members of the Sanday Dofe Open Award Group: Kacey Brown, Ethan Lennon, Cameron McPhail, and Jasmine Walker. Also with us was Rosemary Newton MBE, joint founder and 30-year stalwart of the Group (see *Issue 110* of my Letter). We were lucky to catch a brief audience with the new Duke of Edinburgh (HRH Prince Edward), who knew all about the planning done around Rosemary's kitchen table. The five recipients at this one ceremony represent 1% of the population of Sanday. The Duke told us that only 0.1% of the entire UK population has ever received a Gold Award, which just shows how exceptional our islands can be! (The photograph below shows me, Rosemary and Frideswide with one of the High Constables of Holyroodhouse.) The following day I was at Glasgow University, a proud father at the graduation of my younger son, Dunstan.

Now it's time for me to make the most of our councillor recess and get all those jobs done at home which, in the hurly-burly of council business, I never manage to find the time for.

STRONSAY WILDLIFE RECORDING PROJECT

As part of this project I would like to ask for your help in recording butterflies on Stronsay this summer - a little 'citizen science'. I've adapted the approach developed by Butterfly Conservation for the 'Big Butterfly Count' that runs across the UK in July and August. All it involves is sitting in a sunny spot (your garden or anywhere on the island!) for 15 minutes, or for 15 minutes on a walk, counting the number of different butterflies you see. You can do this as many times as you feel able anytime through July and August.

I'm sure many of you have noticed the big influx of Red Admirals that have come in recently but we've not got many different sorts of butterfly on the island and I've created an illustrated recording form based on what we could be seeing here. I hope you can print this off, but I will get some available at the Trust offices as well. We will have a box in the porch at Erraid Station House for you to drop off completed forms. But if you prefer you could simply email me with your counts (by species) with a date and location (david askew11@btinternet.com).

I can collate all the records in September and hopefully this will give us a good picture of butterflies on Stronsay in the main summer butterfly months.



SHORT TERM LETS—LICENSING

From OIC Updates on Facebook

The Scottish Government is raising further awareness around the new short-term lets licensing and what hosts need to do as part of the application process.

Like all local authorities throughout Scotland, the Council has been tasked with administering the new scheme on behalf of the Scottish Government and a number of hosts have successfully applied for their new licences through OIC – and a number of others are within the system.

Did you know that from 1 October 2022, new hosts of short-term lets are legally required to obtain a licence from their local council before accepting bookings and hosting guests?

Hosts of short-term lets that have operated prior to 1 October 2022 (existing hosts) have until 1 October 2023 to apply for a licence and can continue operating until their application has been determined.

The Council has a dedicated web page on short-term lets licensing to try and assist folk through the application process. 

Nicandro James Porcelli, Skipper of the Pomona Prefect, in conversation with Ute Clackson for Sanday Sound July 2023

Nicandro first came to Stronsay in 2018 for a retreat on Papa Stronsay's Golgotha Monastery. A Scots-Italian with distant Orcadian relatives, he unknowingly bought a cottage a relative built in 1871. He started his career at sea in 1981 and is a certified MN engineer officer with additional navigation and watchkeeping certificates. He's helped out on ferries here as a deckhand cook but mainly works as a chartered scientist/ Doctor of Engineering for clients innovating in the hydrogen economy, energy and critical infrastructure.

Tell me about the Pomona Prefect. A Hardy 24 Fastfisher, it was built and fitted for the Environment Agency as a patrol-survey boat; operating as Solway Prefect. Modified for hand-dive scalloping it was registered on the UK Fishing Fleet. It was brought to Stronsay in 2021 and put back to the UK Workboat Specifications, making commercial transportation services between the North Isles possible. It's registered as a dive contracting boat and is a licensed registered fishing boat- K34. It carries six in local waters in favourable conditions; taking people and/or goods: such as to a snorkelling/dive spot, bird watching, shorewatch or monitoring nature as well as between harbours. There's deck space, cat catcher and a weatherproof hold for light cargo and gear.

I know that much of the sea around Sanday is protected because of kelp forests... and reefs. Seeing kelp forests underwater close up is wonderful. As a Chartered Environmental scientist and engineer, there's a practical vocational mission to widen people's access and contribution to conservation. This also fits wellbeing efforts in the islands as and there are many amazing reefs or seagrass sites to be observed reachable from Stronsay or Sanday. These habitats are common goods and need protecting legally as marine conservation zones.

Have you had any interest yet? Yes. We are on Discover Orkney and have reached out wider. We have snorkelling and SCUBA equipment for hire that has interested people and are in touch with the dive community, national and international dive clubs and national and international research establishments. Future plans include having an ex-RN Dive instructor who may be interested in some training trips for tourist. Summer as it is weather permitting.

Any problems you have encountered apart from winter? Location and logistics lag is a given. The North Isles could definitely improve access for the public on and off for people on small boats. The differences in facilities around Orkney is evident. We hope OIC and the Development Trusts and communities get around to this soon.

Anything else worth saying? It would be useful to employ deckhands. Training and certs are required but we are looking at ways to get this paid for. It would help local careers on the water.
