KIRK CORNER



Hello again everyone.

School has restarted and my wee son is enjoying his first year there in lower primary, as are I hope the 6 other new P1s. It's a big change for them, as it is for the other children and so the children, staff and all involved in our school are very much part of my and our church prayers. The church has a long history of serving the school and we today are always open to how best we can do that, and at the least we are praying.

Change, and coping with it, is very much part of life at any age. I have been enjoying reading Ian Cooper's articles in this year's Limpets, about the history of the church, and it is an amazing history spanning over a thousand years from the 8th century with even mention of Earl Sigurd. It's a story of change over time, and often change taking a lot of time, often relatively peacefully in Stronsay compared to places elsewhere. But there were also times of change that at times involved much tension, dispute, conflict, especially as the old ways, buildings, plans, styles of worship and music, or of meeting the community's educational or social needs, had to give way to the new, and people had to agree what shape the new should take, and then work for it together.

Its a story of necessary destruction of some old or unusable, as well as rebuilding, and often parts of the old were refurbished, redesigned or adapted for use in the new. It's a story of people separating because of differences- often small- and later coming together. And through it all, many many faithful people, with grand and small plans, gathering together to pray, and share God's love and caring for others in practical ways.



It's a story of many small churches or chapels serving different parts of the community in different ways, of many people at times involved, sometimes few. And a key pointer for me from our history, is that even with the best of wills, changes take time- it seems our current church building was about 10 years late in being built!

Today our church is smaller than the great days of many churches serving the 5000+ herring fisher folk or the boom times after world war two. My post of Stronsay Minister [and acting Minister for Eday], is just a part-time one, so the church is very much once again all about normal people involved doing things, not just the Minister. Its great to see the way so many of our folk are involved in the community and indeed serving the wider country, through their involvement in charities, church and other organisations, councils or just helping others individually.

And a great thing about the church today is we have people from a wide variety of backgrounds- from Stronsay and different parts of Scotland, the UK and elsewhere. And especially different church backgrounds - Methodist, Church of England, Church of Scotland, Catholic, Presbyterian, Pentecostalist, Quaker, high and low, evangelical, modern and traditional, left and right: you name it we have probably got it in Stronsay! And its wonderful- each bringing something, different, learning from each other and getting on with each other and trying to share what we have with others.

Our current church has a lot to live up to from the past, but perhaps more important for us, is the present and the future. Folk met recently to discuss ideas to see how we can develop to further meet the needs of Stronsay. It was a really positive meeting and your thoughts are still very much welcome.

As our history shows, part of the way forward involves adapting to help people sing in church; and styles have always continued to develop to reflect current wider musical trends. We are blessed in having Bruce play our organ so well and so able to pick up a tune at a moment's notice. We have also been blessed this year by having Andy Langton support Bruce, and together with Donna, introduce new songs and encourage singing, with various instruments alongside the organ. I think many folk found it very uplifting and we hope to keep developing as before, holding on to the best of what was as well, so that everyone can feel uplifted. If anyone wants their musical talents to be used in church, do have a word with us.

As always, our church is about change and people; and we welcome help from anyone on the island. Next month, I hope to tell you a bit more about how the wider church in Orkney and Scotland is adapting to serve others, sometimes in really helpful and exciting ways

May God bless you in your own life as you encounter change.

There is, however, a stipulation. The bulbs have to be planted in verges throughout Stronsay with the intention of bringing a little spring colour to the island after the bleakness of winter.



SHORT TERM LETS—LICENSING

From OIC Updates on Facebook

The Scottish Government is raising further awareness around the new short-term lets licensing and what hosts need to do as part of the application process.

Like all local authorities throughout Scotland, the Council has been tasked with administering the new scheme on behalf of the Scottish Government and a number of hosts have successfully applied for their new licences through OIC – and a number of others are within the system.

Did you know that from 1 October 2022, new hosts of short-term lets are legally required to obtain a licence from their local council before accepting bookings and hosting guests?

Hosts of short-term lets that have operated prior to 1 October 2022 (existing hosts) have until 1 October 2023 to apply for a licence and can continue operating until their application has been determined.

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Records of a Bygone Age The Church in Stronsay - Part 7

After what had been a long and difficult journey the new church was finally ready and, looking to the Stronsay Church Board minutes once more, it was with a note of pride and honour that the dedication and opening of the Moncur Memorial Church was reported in the minute of 11th May 1955:

"The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, Right Reverend E.D. Jarvis, performed the dedication and opening before a congregation of approximately 400, including 22 ministers of the Orkney Presbytery. After a most touching and inspiring service the stained glass window in the Chancel was unveiled by Mrs Jarvis, wife of the Moderator. The memorial tablet in memory of the late Alexander Moncur by whose legacy the church was built, and commemorating his grandfather Rev. James Mudie and his mother Eliza Moncur, was unveiled by Mrs Laura Grimond, wife of Major Jo Grimond, MP for Orkney and Shetland. The final traditional act was the handing over of the keys of the church by the Moderator to Rev E.P.G. Fox who accepted them as Minister of Word and Sacrament in this parish."

It was apparently quite a wintry day that day and the Moderator had to wait until a heavy hail shower passed before making his way from the Church Hall around to the entrance of the Church

I like to lay claim to having been at the opening of the church in May 1955 as I would, at that time, have been slightly more than a twinkle in my dad's eye, although I wasn't born until January 1956!

The photo above brings to mind a tongue-in-cheek comment from the late Jim Work, long -time Stronsay elder and Session Clerk, who said he had once been told that "Ministers are like a midden; if they are all gathered together in one place they aren't for much use, but spread them around and it's amazing how much good they can do!"

The first Sunday service to be held in the new building was a Communion service on 15th May where 110 members shared the Sacrament. The second service, on 22nd May 1955, was to see the total of four children baptised on one Sunday soon after Philip Fox came to Stronsay surpassed when seven babies were brought forward for baptism.

These seven were Eunice Caithness, Boondatoon; Duncan Kenneth MacRae, Hotel; Ruby Chalmers Rendall, Roadside; Ruth Agnes Shearer, Crowanna; Rhona Margaret Stevenson, Mingro; Marie Robina Stevenson, Springwell and Ivan Sinclair Stevenson, Midgarth Cottage.

In the days before mains water and electricity reached Stronsay, the supply of both to the Church and Manse was an ongoing problem. Mention was made earlier of the purchase of five Tilley lamps to light the old Mudie church, and lighting continued to be by Tilley and oil lamps until 1956, when lighting was installed in the Church Hall and Manse powered by a new petrol engine and generator, all achieved at a cost of £250! Two years later electric lighting was also installed in the Church. Then, in 1964, this generator was upgraded to a Lister diesel 'Startomatic' lighting plant at a cost of £120.

This meant that it was no longer necessary to go to an outhouse (the 'engine hoose') to manually start and stop the engine as need required, with this new system being thought to be the height of luxury at the time!

The main source of water for many years was whatever rainwater could be caught and stored in stone tanks at the Church and Manse, supplemented by water carted from a well in a field belonging to Dale Farm. A petrol water pump was later installed at this well to pump water to a storage tank at the Manse but the water still had to be pumped by hand to a header tank in the loft to give a supply of water to the single cold tap in the scullery. A solid fuel range was later installed, complete with back boiler, which helped ensure a supply of hot and cold water on tap.

This was all to change in the 1970s when mains electricity came to the island via an undersea cable from Shapinsay. The Church, Hall and Manse all had to be rewired to current standards and the Chapel in the Village was also wired for electricity for the first time. This all came to fruition on 12th June 1973 when Stronsay's mains electricity was switched on for the first time.

In December that same year a long awaited mains water supply to the island was completed, with the Church and Manse being connected up to that supply the following year.

This was a busy and expensive time for the church as, in addition to funding the installation of mains electricity and water, the old Manse roof of grey slates was removed, the roof covered in sarking and felt and new slates fitted.

Winter storms in Orkney and the damage they can cause are always a cause for worry but over the years the Church and Manse seem to have stood the effects of these storms quite well. One notable exception was when Stronsay was struck by a severe storm in February 1981 which stripped off a small area of slates on the south west side of the Church roof, leaving a section of the sarking exposed and allowing water to leak into the Church until repairs were carried out.

Rev Philip Fox retired in September 1983, having served the congregation and parish faithfully for over 33 years in this his first and only charge. During his time in Stronsay he held a service every Sunday at noon in the Church and at 6.30 pm in the Village Chapel plus a service in the South School on the first Sunday of every month and a service in the Rothiesholm School on the last. This must mean that he would have delivered in excess of 4,000 sermons during his ministry!

After quite a short vacancy Rev Kenneth Borthwick was ordained and inducted to this, his first charge, in April 1984. Kenny and Morag had their first child, Sarah, soon after with their son David arriving a couple of years later, the first time for many years that there would have been children's voices heard in the Manse

Later that year central heating was installed in the Manse, new hardwood double glazed windows were installed and new front and back doors fitted. This was reported to have made a considerable difference to the cost and effectiveness of heating the Manse.

Rev Borthwick moved on to St Peter's and St Andrew's in Thurso in June 1989 and Rev Kenneth Fisher was inducted in July the following year. Rev Fisher, who had been unable to carry out his duties as Minister of this parish for long periods due to poor health, retired in 1994.

After a vacancy of more than two years, during which time the church had the services of locum Minister Rev Hugh Drummond for three months and Rev William Dungavel on two occasions for some time, the ordination and induction of our new Minister, Rev Joyce Keyes, took place on 11th September 1996.



After a vacancy of about 2½ years, Rev Joyce Keyes was ordained and inducted to the charge of Stronsay and Eday in September 1996. Among those present at the induction were:

In 1999, with the approaching New Millennium, it was agreed that the congregation should raise funds for installing a new heating system in the Church. With this in mind an application was made to Orkney Islands Council's Development Fund for the New Millennium which had been specifically set up to support Millennium projects. Sadly this application was turned down as the Council were apparently not supporting any funding applications from churches, a decision that was greeted with some surprise and dismay as there was no mention of this in the application guidelines. The Congregational Board felt strongly that the Council had rather missed the point of whose birth these millennial celebrations were commemorating and should actually focus on!

It was agreed that the congregation should still try to raise funds for this 'Millennium Project' even without the help of the OIC and, after some vigorous and very successful fund raising events and grant assistance from several bodies, the funding target was reached and the project went ahead at a cost of around £29,000.

As a further celebration of the approaching new millennium a very successful 'Millennium Concert' was held in the Church in October 1999 with in excess of 180 people in attendance. This concert was a truly memorable event and, as the Church moved into a new century and new millennium this seems a good point to bring this history of the Stronsay Church to a close.

I did not see any windfarms or electricity pylons spoiling the view either on land or sea. I believe we need to appreciate what we have here in Orkney, before we misguidedly allow our landscape and seascape to be industrialised for the sake of a few crumbs from the table of those who will be garnering the profits from the desecration. Many of my generation will remember Joni Mitchell's 1970 environmental protest song *Big Yellow Taxi* and its lyrics "Don't it always seem to go, That you don't know what you've got 'til it's gone; They paved paradise, put up a parking lot"

Sadly, in taking this short holiday, I missed a few community events in the North Isles, but I did get back in time to present Bronze & Silver Duke of Edinburgh Awards to 8 young people on Sanday and celebrate their achievements (see photo below).

The 2023/24 council year kicked off for me with virtual attendance at meetings of N. Ron. and Papay Community Councils.

The Code of Conduct for Councillors states: "Councillors are required to provide strategic leadership and oversight. This involves setting strategy and policy, scrutinising and making major, complex decisions that concern the council as a whole. Councillors are not, however, responsible for operational management (i.e. the planning, organising and execution involved in day-to-day activities) as this is the role of employees." This last sentence is the source of the main frustration ward constituents have when it comes to the expectations of what their elected members can do on their behalf. Although we can report back shortcomings in council services, it is important the public understands that we are not empowered to direct council staff. Another source of frustration is government legislation, which e.g. makes it difficult for us to mitigate the pain being caused by the implementation of short-term lets licensing, even though we fully understand the difficulties it has created for accommodation providers, and the negative ramifications it is having for accommodation provision overall.

I now have my first Charles III coin taken from circulation, a 50p piece. Formerly, the custom was to give the name of the king in Latin. So the previous 2 kings named Charles were inscribed as CAROLVS, and within living memory coins circulated of EDWARDVS VII, GEORGIVS V & GEORGIVS VI. So it was disappointing to see the King's name on the 50p "dumbed down" to CHARLES III. The rest of the inscription is abbreviated Latin: D.G. REX F.D., short for "Dei Gratia Rex Fidei Defensor",

meaning "by the grace of God King, defender of the faith."


