SDT Grant Scheme

We're thrilled to announce that applications are now open for the new SDT Grant Scheme, funded by the Community Turbine!

This initiative is all about supporting community-led projects and ideas that will make a real difference across Stronsay. Whether you're planning an event, pursuing training, or developing a project that aligns with the island's Place Plan, there's funding available to help bring your vision to life.

Here's what's on offer:

- Entertainment Grant Up to £500 per event to help cover costs like performer travel, accommodation, venue hire, catering, and decorations.
- Education & Training Grant Up to £1000, covering up to 50% of course fees, for any kind of training or educational course (open to Stronsay residents).



Published by Sanday Community Association, grant-aided by the Heritage Lottery Fund and the North Isles Landscape Partnership, the book outlines the origin of the Sports and contains contemporary reports for many of the times the Sports have taken place. These reports are of Track and Field athletics performances; there are no reports of Football or Netball games although comprehensive winners' lists are included for these team events.

The broken pieces tend to be clumsy in the hand, they require specially textured papers, they smudge easily and also need a fixative spray or glass to protect them. Our "Polished Pastels" technique sidesteps every one of those difficulties!

Join our experienced art teacher Christopher Andrew Maier who developed this particular art project especially for his students who found working with pastels difficult. No art skills required.

3 hours with supplies provided, including a take home project consisting of several dreamy matted color field images suitable for personal gift or greeting card.

AYRE OFFSHORE WINDFARM

The Community Engagement Manager, Thistle Wind Partners, an Edinburgh-based business, founded with a focus on Scottish offshore wind development has notified Stronsay Community Council that later this year they will be submitting marine licence applications to construct an offshore windfarm and associated transmission infrastructure for the Ayre Offshore Windfarm. The proposed windfarm will have the potential to generate around 1GW of renewable energy and is located 22km off the east coast of Orkney.

The licensable activity consists of:

Up to 67 wind turbines (floating or fixed foundations)

Up to two offshore substations, connected to the turbines via inter-array cablesUp to three Interconnector cables

Up to 20 Subsea collectors. Up to four export cables to the landfall location of Sinclair's Bay in Caithness.

Thistle Wind Partners will be sharing their progress with a series of formal Pre-Application Consultation (PAC) events as detailed below. This will enable the team to gather feedback prior to finalising their proposals and they hope that you will be able to attend. A virtual consultation room will also be available for those unable to attend in person at www.twp.scot/ayre

Records of a Bygone Age Stronsay's Side Schools Part 6 – Out with the old and in with the new

The first term of 1950 saw a new teacher, Mrs Margaret (Meg) Fiddler, in place in the school. She had previously taught at the Central School (as Miss Margaret Banks) from 1927

to 1930 but had then married a local man, moving to Kirkwall for a time where her husband John Fiddler acted as a ship's pilot in Kirkwall Harbour throughout the war. The youngest of their family wasn't yet at school so Mrs Fiddler on occasion took him into school with her. At other times he was left with the Millan family at Southbank, where Mrs Fiddler went to have her lunch each day.

The pupils were left to their own devices, completely unsupervised, while Mrs Fiddler had her lunch break. One former pupil recalls how they always had one of their number designated to be 'on watch' to warn of the teacher's return, enabling them to return to their seats and be working industriously when the classroom door opened!

This new teacher was to inherit some of the same old problems, with the school being dismissed early on 31^{st} January due to the room being very unpleasant due to smoke and soot and then, on 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} February, no fires could be lit as the stove was smoking so badly. In an attempt to provide at least some warmth in the school an oil heater was delivered on 6^{th} February.

Nature rambles still continued, with a walk to Lamb Head noted on 8th June. Later that year, obviously paying some heed to the requirements of personal hygiene, the School Management Committee provided a basin, ewer and soap for pupils to wash their hands. Although about as basic as it was possible to get, it must still have made some considerable difference to cleanliness and prevention of disease.





The latest in hygiene – cold water and carbolic soap!

The log of 30th April 1951recorded that *'The school is very cold, particularly in the forenoon. Temperature at 10 am was 38 degrees.'*

Then, on the 25th of the following month it was recorded that 'Fires still being lit every day but with wind going from NE to SE there has been little heat from them and the room is always unpleasant with smoke and soot.' Later that year a new stove was fitted with the hope that it would function more efficiently.

Despite the soap and water now available, school attendance still suffered at various times through illness and epidemic, with it being recorded that whooping cough had been prevalent from 26th October until 20th November 1950, influenza from 30th January to 9th February 1951 and chicken pox from 11th May until 4th June that same year.

In another rather unusual event, on 29th June 1951 food parcels all the way from the Fiji Islands were distributed among the pupils. There is no record of what prompted this, or what was actually contained in the parcels, but with some rationing still in place it can probably be assumed that this was a gift from schools overseas similar to that received from Australia three years previously.

Weather dominated the log in 1952, with the entry for 15th January stating that 'I was unable to reach school today as the road was blocked by fallen telegraph poles after the great gale which struck Orkney in the early hours of this morning. Velocity of wind estimated to have reached 120 mph at times. Severe damage almost everywhere. The school received no damage although there were a few slates off the schoolhouse. A boy and girl reported the loss of their school books during the gale and were issued with new books.' It would be interesting to have known what had actually happened to have caused the loss of those books.

Just two weeks later Mrs Fiddler recorded that she couldn't get to school for four days as the roads were blocked with snowdrifts.

In a new venture for the school that April the Education Committee sent retired Post Office worker Robert Wilson out to the school to teach singing. He was in Stronsay for a fortnight, giving lessons to young and old at both the South and Central School, and his teaching was said to be very much appreciated.

Another wedding and reception was held in the school on 15th October 1952 with the marriage of John James Hall and Annie Jane Cooper being celebrated there.

There was a 3 day school holiday, from 1st to 3rd June 1953, to celebrate the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, with all 12 pupils on the roll being presented with silver teaspoons and blue plastic beakers, given as Coronation souvenirs by the Education Authority. This was the first major event to be broadcast live on British television but, as it was to be several more years before television came to Orkney, pupils had to enjoy the delights of the Coronation huddled around the radio or 'wireless' as it is often still referred to in Orkney.

A more unusual problem with the coal-fired stove in the schoolroom was noted on 25th November when it was logged that 'No fires lit for the past four days as the Clerk of the School Management Committee had neglected to order coal, despite being given adequate warning.'

The coal stocks had obviously been replenished a few weeks later when, on 16th December, we are told of a more serious problem occurring with that same fire. The log records that 'The wood around the stove was found to be burning when the cleaner arrived at school last night. The stove was removed and a report sent to the Education Department. A new stove was delivered on 21st December but couldn't be fitted until the Christmas Holidays.'

There was an outing to attend a Children's Service at the Church conducted by Rev EPG Fox on 27th May 1955. This service, involving all the schoolchildren on the island, would have been one of the first services to be held in the newly built Moncur Memorial Church, the opening ceremony of which had been held on the 11th of that month.

The HMI report in January 1956 reported that 'The school building is in good condition but the lack of an adequate water supply prevents the modernisation of the lavatories. The classroom has recently been attractively decorated, and the high standard of cleanliness calls for favourable comment. The provision of a fire guard is recommended. Progress in basic subjects was, in general, good, the work of the younger pupils in particular being creditable.

Matters discussed with the headmistress included the use of individual reading material in the infant classes, the teaching of history, geography and handwork and the development of composition.'

In what must surely have brought to an end the long-running saga of the problems with poor heating, inadequate stoves and a smoke filled room, new Calor Gas convector heaters were installed in the schoolroom in September 1956.

It what was obviously extreme weather conditions on 26th November the school was dismissed early, with the severe gale of the time being recorded as reaching 124mph at Costa Head.

We move on now to 1959, when a newly extended and modernised Central School had been designed and built with ample capacity for all island pupils. With a good school bus service also available, the writing was on the wall for the South School, the last survivor of Stronsay's side schools. In what was the final entry in the South School log on 18th September 1959 Mrs Fiddler recorded that *'School closed today. The eleven pupils are being transferred to the new Central J S School.'*

Their teacher, Mrs Fiddler, moved with them to the Central School where she continued to teach until her retirement in 1967.



RADIO TELESWITCH SERVICE (RTS) BEING PHASED OUT STARTING ON 30TH OF JUNE 2025

This will affect households that use an older electricity meter for heating their home and for hot water, with some types of electricity meter needing changed. As part of this partnership, NWS is helping to raise awareness of this issue in Scotland.

What is the Radio Teleswitch Service (RTS)?

RTS is a radio-based system introduced in the 1980s which enabled older electricity meters to switch between peak and off-peak rates. RTS is used for some traditional multirate meters and was designed to support those who use electricity for their heating and hot water. This may include those who use electric storage systems, panel heaters or immersion heaters in water tanks – some of which typically charge up overnight.

RTS is now reaching the end of its natural operational life. This means that the equipment that produces the radio signal cannot be adequately maintained anymore. The Radio Teleswitch Service is due to be closed (its signal will begin to be phased out from 30 June 2025). If your electricity meter relies on this service, it will need to be upgraded before the signal is switched off.

How to find out if you have an RTS meter?

If you are not sure whether you have an RTS meter, there are a few things you can look out for:

- There may be a separate switch box near your meter with a radio Teleswitch label on it.
- Your property is heated using electricity or storage heaters.
- There is no gas supply to your area, this includes households in rural areas and high-rise flats.
- You get cheaper energy at different times of day. Your tariff might be Economy 7, Economy 10, or Total Heat Total Control.

What happens if I do not upgrade my RTS meter?

If you decide not to upgrade, the heating and/or hot water provisions in your home or business could be affected.- Your heating and hot water may not work correctly. You may find that your heating and/or hot water is left continually switched on or off; or the charging-up happens at the wrong time of day.

Your bills could increase. Your electricity supplier will not be able to confirm how much electricity you have used during peak or off-peak times, which means your electricity costs could be much higher than before.

VAN AVAILABLE FOR CHARITY WORK

The Pomona Prefect logo peedie red van is available for charity work on the island if anyone needs a man and a van and wants to help the island reach the target. Saturdays service and cost for this is suggested as £10 per hour min donation for half hour units. All to the Stronsay Defib fund. No live animals, persons transported or dirty, sloppy stuff carried. Limited load and not a taxi service. This is a temporary thing to raise money and not a challenge to any services on the island. Call Mick for all taxi work and Sinclair Haulage for freight!

Also, if anyone needs their car karcher jet washed and vaccuming and then can do at Ellerslie as you pass for a donation to same Defib Fund. Cost is £10 per basic body wash and wheels rinsed and boot/inside vacced. Limited to cars. No monster trucks, panel vans, lorries or camper vans sorry.

This charity service will be hopefully available until there are enough defib machines in position with the people trained to cover us all 24/7. Availability is limited to Saturdays.

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

– 150th Issue ——

The 150th issue of my Letter is perfectly timed to report on the 75th North Isles Sports, which took place in Sanday on the day of the summer solstice. This year, competitors and spectators came from Eday (after a long absence), North Ronaldsay, Sanday, Stronsay, Westray and Papa Westray. (One day I hope to see Papa Stronsay compete in the tug of war and maybe teams sent from the inner North Isles.) The weather was changeable during the day, but remained clement, apart from the fog that prevented the North Ronaldsay folk getting home. Well done to Westray for winning the Primary Cup, Schools Cup, Junior Relay Quaich, Senior Relay Quaich, Challenge Cup and Millennium Cup; to Sanday for winning the junior netball, senior netball and junior football; and to Papay for winning the senior football. Congratulations to Boys' Champion Tristan Hoque, Girls' Champion Lizzie Harcus, Men's Champion Conner Harcus, and Women's Champion & Best Adult Millie Dennison. And well-pulled to Stronsay for winning the tug of war. (And brave to my bees, who kindly refrained from swarming until the following day!) You can find a wealth of information about the previous 74 North Isles Sports in Roderick Thome's 340-page "75 Years of Orkney's North Isles Sports" (price £15). My fellow North Isles councillor, Heather Woodbridge (N Ron) won joint bronze in the women's high jump, but no member of the Clackson family competed in the 75th, however Frideswide Clackson's past glories, along with those of a host of others, are detailed in Rod's well-illustrated and informative book.



On midsummer morning, I landed at a foggy Sumburgh Airport (photograph above) for a meeting of the Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board that afternoon in Lerwick. One thing that came up at the meeting was the poor response so far (only 45%) for postal vote re-applications for UK parliamentary elections. If not renewed, these expire in January! It will also soon be time for this year's annual electoral register household canvas. Make sure to complete it. Don't lose your right to vote! You never know when an election may be sprung on you (from community council by-election to snap general election).

Our last General Meeting before the summer recess saw a disgraceful denial of democracy. Clir James Moar's notice of motion requesting earlier cutting of roadside verges was unable to be considered thanks to 8 councillors refusing to vote for the necessary suspension of standing orders (which requires a two-thirds majority). This is the first time our longest-standing councillor (Clir Dr Steven Heddle) has known such a vote be used to block open debate in the Council chamber. Shameful!

Other meetings I attended before our recess included: a special Policy & Resources Committee meeting concerning delivery of our Strategic Housing Investment Plan; and seminars on the Orkney World Heritage Site Programme and on Flotta Oil Terminal decommissioning. I went to the Shapinsay Community Council meeting, and later I arranged to meet the Deputy Harbour Master at their ferry slip on the Kirkwall side with some of the community councillors to discuss parking issues there.

As you are no doubt aware, there have been some other games going on in Orkney (also nicely timed for this 150th issue). I took part in a civic reception with dignitaries from the participating islands and was able to talk over with the Faroese Prime Minister Aksel V Johannesen my idea of establishing some cultural linkage between their island of Sandøy and our island of Sandøy. He promised to pass some material from me on to the island's municipalities. The Faroese team came top of the medal table in the XXth International Island Games, and the Faroe Islands will be hosting the next Island Games in 2027.

Other council business I undertook during the councillor recess was to travel to Thurso for a meeting of the Dounreay Stakeholder Group (on which I represent OIC).

"IMPROVING THE CANCER JOURNEY" (ICJ) SERVICE NHS ORKNEY

If you or someone you know has been affected by cancer, *Improving the Cancer Journey* is here to help. *Improving the Cancer Journey*, in partnership with Macmillan, is a dedicated service to support anyone affected by cancer with their non-clinical needs. This could be the person with the cancer diagnosis, or it could be someone affected by that diagnosis, such as family or carers.

When someone is diagnosed with cancer, they often describe feeling like they're in a maze. It can be difficult to know what services are out there and where to access them. The *Improving the Cancer Journey* service is here to support with this, and help people to access the services that can support with their non-clinical concerns.

Non-clinical concerns may include:

- Supporting someone to access local teams that can help with money or housing worries and benefits
- Addressing caring or work responsibilities
- Connecting with those that can support with addressing physical concerns
- Accessing complimentary therapies
- Helping with emotional concerns, connecting with wellbeing support and services
- Accessing information to answer questions or concerns about cancer and treatment

When someone affected by cancer accesses the ICJ service, they will be offered a Holistic Needs Assessment, which is a simple check-list style questionnaire that helps to understand what means most to the person. The key areas addressed within a Holistic Needs Assessment are financial, practical, physical, emotional and spiritual.

Based on this assessment and meaningful conversations with an ICJ Link Worker, a support plan will be created to ensure the person affected by cancer is offered all the support they need.

Patients can be referred into the service through a self-referral form or via a professional referral. Both referral forms, alongside further information, can be found on the ICJ page of the NHS Orkney website - <u>Improving the Cancer Journey (ICJ) | NHS Orkney</u>.



The Digital Phone Switchover



What you need to know

What is the digital phone switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and January 2027 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines over to new upgraded landline services using digital technology. This means services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones, telecare and health devices will need to be compatible.



The good news is – your landline isn't going anywhere and for most consumers and businesses, this change will be straightforward. In fact, many customers are already making the switch when they upgrade to fibre broadband.

Your telecoms provider (for example, Vodafone or BT) should contact you before the switchover to check in and discuss what you need to do to make sure any reliant services you may have aren't affected. However, we're encouraging everyone to know what to expect.

The change may be as simple as plugging your phone into a broadband router rather than the phone socket on the wall, or you may be given a new router to do this.

Please note that your provider will move you to a digital service before January 2027. If you care for a vulnerable person, please keep an eye out for correspondence notifying of a switch over date.

What you need to know

Other Devices

If you have other devices connected to your phone line that you may have purchased, such as alarm systems, you might need to upgrade your device to make sure it is compatible.

If you are unsure about how a device in your home or business might be affected, it is recommended you contact the equipment supplier or device manufacturer to find out whether it will remain functional on a digital phone line.

People who use health monitoring or telecare devices should check if the switchover will affect how they work.

Key Points To Remember

If you have any queries or have no means of making emergency calls you need to contact your communications provider.

If you have a telecare alarm please contact the telecare team at Orkney Islands Council: 01856 873 535 Extension: 2635

Check with the appropriate equipment manufacturers if you have any other devices supported by your existing telephone line (such as intruder alarms) to check it will work digitally.

Most telecare alarm providers will have upgrade plans, if your phone line has or is due to an upgraded by your communication provider let them know.

In a Power Outage

Digital landlines cannot carry an electrical power connection, so in the event of a power cut they will not work. If you have a mobile phone this can still be used, but if you've no other means of calling the emergency services your telecoms provider will offer a solution to allow calls to be made to emergency services.


You should tell your telecoms provider now if you have no other way of making emergency calls.

Scams

There have been incidents reported of scammers contacting vulnerable users in relation to digital migration.

Communication providers or telecare services will never call you to ask for money.

Contact is usually by letter and charges are only applied to normal invoices. If you are in any doubt as to the authenticity of a caller, just hang up and call your communications or telecare provider to report the incident, using a trusted phone number, such as the one on the bill.



HOW TO CONTACT THE LIMPET
