AIMS AND ETHOS DAY – FRIDAY 7TH FEBRUARY 2014

Our Aims and Ethos day began with a short assembly to share with everyone the school's new Vision and Aims which have been chosen by everyone. The key words are Respect, Trust, Honesty, Responsibility, Kindness, Manners, Positivity, Sensibility and Inclusion. Pupils were split into their groups and moved to their first activity.

The day was arranged into a circuit of four activities. These were Outdoor areas, Dressing up, Phonics and Bridge building.

In the Outdoor area activity, Catherine Diamond first of all asked us what we liked to do outdoors. e.g. jumping, swinging, climbing etc. She showed some pictures of outdoor areas. Then we had to design and make our ideal play area in a tray and make it as creative as possible. Materials we used included green fabric ('grass'), moss/heather like material, stones, clay, cocktail sticks and wood. People started to make their outdoor areas. It was fantastic and a good chance to show off our skills and put forward ideas.

Mrs Barber led the Dressing up activity. She asked us to look at the Smartboard. She showed us some pictures and asked us if we knew what period in time they were from. We picked somebody from each group to dress up as something we saw in the pictures, for example, a caveman or a Roman soldier. We used all sorts of materials to make the costumes. Finally, we got the S4s to judge our costumes with a mark out of 5. Elizabeth's group won with Amber dressed as a Flamenco dancer. It was educational, interesting and fun.

Bridge Building – Mrs Rose led a quiz about Newtons and forces. If we got 6 or more correct answers we could earn more materials to build our bridge. The materials were an extra metre of tape, 10 extra art straws and 2 extra pairs of scissors. The bridge had to hold at least one plank of wood. Some groups didn't get to put wood on their bridge. At the end, Mrs Rose put weights on the plank of wood to see how much weight it could carry. It was excitingly enjoyable! John, Eoan, Millie and Andy's group won.

Phonics – We learned the sounds of the alphabet with Mrs Evans and there was a song to go with it. It was fantastically fun! We also played a spelling game where we had to listen to Mrs Evans. She said the words, then we tried to make them. It was great fun to do. We played another game which was like Corners. Someone was a frog. The frog said a word, there were 4 lily pads with a certain amount of word endings and you had to go to the lily pad that had the right ending of the words that the frog said. If you went on the wrong lily pad you went out of the game.

The vision and aims key words were represented by the Upper Primary acting out small sketches about responsibility and the Secondary pupils producing 'stills'. Mr King handed out Bronze, Silver and Gold merit certificates to primary pupils. James and Matthew played a few tunes on their accordions, ably assisted by Jack on guitar and Molly on fiddle. They then accompanied the whole primary singing Edelweiss. It was all really good. Mr King then handed out the secondary merit certificates. Some secondary pupils also received First Aid certificates and certificates for the Loch Eil trip, from the Outward Bound Trust, for their achievement and participation in the trip. Finally, it was announced that Diane had been accepted as part of the new steering group for Scotland for Young Ambassadors.

We would like to thank Mrs Diamond, Mrs Barber, Mrs Rose and Mrs Evans for creating the activities. We would like to thank the community for supporting the day and taking part. We had a delicious lunch made by Arna and Wilma. Thanks to everyone who made the day so educational and fun. We are 'Proud to Belong, Proud to be Limpets!'

LATEST BIRD SIGHTINGS

The SE winds and generally mild conditions at the end of January and early February brought an assortment of early Spring migrants to the island, including several Robins and a few flocks of Fieldfares. At least 3 Woodcock were seen and a Coot was found feeding in the road by The Mill - a very unusual sighting of the species away from the larger locks/waterworks pond. It spent the next few days in the small pond at Lower Millfield. The party of 12 wintering Whoopers were regularly seen feeding close to the road opposite Springwell for much of the mid-Winter period.

There were over 40 Oystercatchers on the Holin Links - often their first 'gathering place' - on 1st February, and Jim Miller had a flock of over 30 Fieldfares at Banks on 3rd, with a different flock of 40 or so at Dale around the same time. 17 Tufted Ducks were on the Blan Loch on 6th, and 4 Barnacle Geese were feeding among the Greylags at Cleat on 8th. Several Meadow Pipits were seen on the fine day of 9th when 5 Linnets arrived in the Castle Garden. A single Barnacle was at Eastbank on 9th when the over-wintering Chaffinch was seen again at Linksquoy.

The first returning Shelduck was at the Bu Loch on 12th Feb, when the Loch held 12 Pintail, 6 Gadwall and a few Wigeon and Mallard. A party of 30 Pink-footed Geese flew North over Castle the same day, and 5 Twite were seen at Dale.

There was a 'gathering' of 15 Ravens near the Bu on the calm and almost 'balmy' 14th February (Valentine's Day - did they know?!!) when back at The Reserve an Otter was seen swimming offshore and 10 Long-tailed Ducks, 6 Great Northern Divers, 3 Red-throated Divers, and a Slavonian Grebe were all feeding in the calm waters of the bay. It was interesting to watch a long line of gulls land on the surface of the sea on what appeared to be the exact path of the Otter (Hunton-Odiness), behaviour we have seen before, the gulls probably feeding on small scraps of crab etc - floating 'debris' left by the feeding mammal.

There have been the normal sightings of Merlin, Sparrowhawk, and Hen Harrier in late Winter - all however very unpredictable! It is possible to see any one of the species three or four days running and then have no sightings at all for 3 weeks or so! And as I write Kath Kent has just telephoned to say that a Rock Dove crashed into their front-door window this afternoon (23rd) - pursued by a Peregrine. The dove quickly recovered from the collision with the door and after a few minutes flew off to shelter below the nearby cottage.

Meadow Pipit is the common small species found along the roadsides here on Stronsay between March and November, and a few over-Winter most years. Rather like a very small thrush (streaky breast) and about the same overall length as a sparrow the species is rather 'flitty' in behaviour but often gives excellent views while perched on a fence-post. (the bird - NOT the observer!). Hundreds of pairs nest on the island annually.

LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

A new record on shortness of meetings was achieved at the Special General Meeting on the new hospital, which was all over in less than three minutes. I hope Kyle Brown (from Sanday), who was in the public gallery on work experience with Radio Orkney, did not get the impression that all Council meetings are like that (if only!).

At the Education, Leisure & Housing Committee meeting (wearing my Sanday Community School hoodie*), I voiced my concerns over underspends in education. If a budget has been set, there is nothing virtuous in the department not spending it, especially when schools are under pressure from the introduction of the Curriculum for Excellence and the need to obtain resources for the new examination system.

A seminar was held on the issue of lengthening the weekend at home for Isles' KGS pupils. It is a difficult circle to square, with many knock-on consequences. The various options will soon be going out for consultation. The same afternoon, I was given my own personal tour of the new Papdale Halls. They are splendid accommodation, far better than any I experienced at university.

At a special Policy & Resources Committee meeting on the setting of the 2014/2015 Council budget, I collaborated with Cllr Russ Madge on an amendment requesting, among other things, additional funding for the internal ferry and air services. We ended up being in a minority of two! We also supported Maurice Davidson's and Owen Tierney's amendment to scrap a £65,000 cut to the ferry budget, but that garnered no support from other councillors either.

At our normal Policy & Resources Committee meeting, I advocated that OIC should provide a "special collection" for postal votes to give voters longer to consider who to vote for (and candidates longer to canvass them). It was agreed to look into this in time for the General Election in 2015.

Along with community council transport reps from the North and the South Isles, I attended the Inter-Isles Air and Ferry Services Consultative Forums. In line with the public's preference, it was agreed to base next year's refit timetable for the outer North Isles on the draft made widely available before the meeting (which itself was based on the two-boat timetables used during the dispute last year). An attempt is also going to be made this year to improve the signage at Kirkwall pier.

"Your Islands Your Future" has now been published and was distributed in The Orcadian of the 13th February. For those of you who don't read The Orcadian, copies are available on request from OIC. Public events will be held in the coming weeks. All Isles' community councillors have been invited to attend a meeting specially for them on the 3rd March, held at a time to fit in with the transport links. (At my request, OIC will cover the community councillors' travel expenses, and they'll get lunch.) You are encouraged to contact them with any of your thoughts and ideas to raise at the meeting.

HOME FIRE SAFETY VISITS

The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service has once again secured some funding to put in place a scheme in Stronsay offering free Home Fire Safety Advice visits, the logic being that it is much better to prevent a fire in the first place than to have to come to put one out! Members of Stronsay Fire and Rescue Service hope by these visits to help raise your awareness of fire safety and to help make your home a safer place in which to live. During the visit we would attempt to identify any potential fire hazards, check that you have enough smoke detectors and that they are correctly sited, and give advice on fire safety and what to do in the event of having a fire. We will also check that your smoke detectors are working correctly and supply and fit new ones free of charge if you need them. This inspection would be carried out by two members of the local Fire and Rescue Service at your convenience.

THE SHOP AT ELLERSLIE

After writing about the shop at Holin it is now my time to tell about the one at Ellerslie. First I remember it was a very small shop owned by a woman called Barbara Wallace. After she retired Magnes and Madge Dennison with their son John moved from Kirbuster Farm bought Ellerslie and turned the kitchen and bedroom into one big shop, also building a new kitchen and two bedrooms (later), on the back of the house. As Madge was from Kirkwall and had been a dress-maker with Peter Shearer (tailor) she made a success of the shop and was a very pleasant and kind person.

Magnes was a great gardener and built a shed where he repaired and also sold bicycles. As school-children we could always depend on him to repair punctures or tighten chains on our bikes!

He had been in World War One and had served in Mesopotamia, so had lots to tell about that. He joined the Territorial Army in Stronsay so was in Flotta with them for a time at the beginning of the war but later came back to the shop again. All through the war years the shop was very busy and Saturday night was just packed when folks went for their messages and they stayed open till quite late.

That shop sold everything from groceries, drapery, haberdashery, etc, and if you wanted a new coat Madge would send to Kirkwall (perhaps James. M. Croy) and they would send out a selection so you could choose (£1 to £3). Just imagine, hard to believe, but it is true.

After Magnes and Madge retired Ellerslie went back to a house and now a relation of Magnes is there with his wife and family.

Magnes never believed that men landed on the moon. ('Not true' he said to his grandsons)

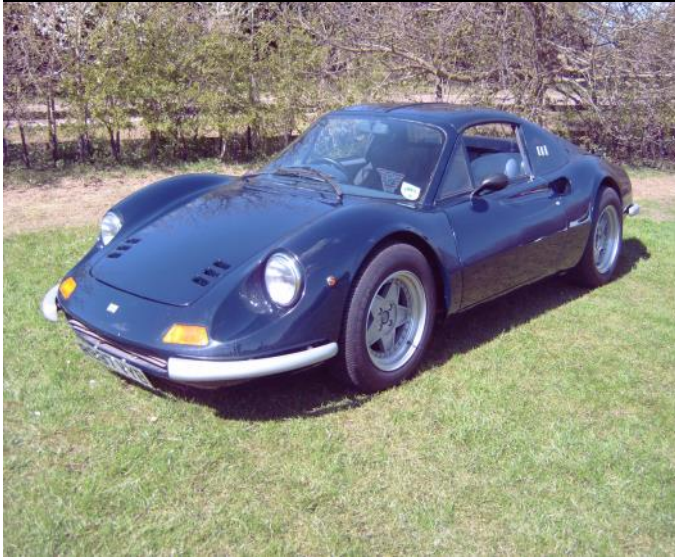
