BOWEL CANCER SCREENING

I apologise for bringing up this subject but have learnt that Stronsay has the lowest uptake of this screening test. So this month the surgery is promoting it and hope that those who have declined so far will take the opportunity to have the test.

The idea is to detect bowel cancer in the earliest stage so that treatment is much more likely to be effective. Those who are between 50 and 74 years will be sent the kit automatically every 2 years and those older can request tests. The small sample of poo is tested for traces of blood that are not visible to the eye - if positive then you will be offered a colonoscopy to check the bowel in more detail.

So, although it is a pooey subject, the test might save your life. Even if you have no symptoms you are advised to take the test. Pick up a leaflet at the surgery or check the Internet at www.nhsinform.co.uk/screening/bowel

I have been busy sowing seeds and incubating them on the surgery windowsill, this being the only place safe from the cats who like to dig sit and excrete in anything inviting. After hatching, the plants become rapidly spindly and in danger of collapse so my first batch are now risking hypothermia in the greenhouse.

Lighter days mean its full scale seed planting now - so no time to loose. All those winter jobs are now put back for another year

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LATEST BIRD SIGHTINGS

February ended with a few warm days when there was a noticeable influx of Shelduck and Oystercatchers. A flock of 20 Snow Buntings were feeding on the beach opposite the old slaughterhouse at Lower Whitehall on 28th but had soon moved on. A Merlin - seen by John and Rona from the house at Millbank - posed perfectly on a nearby fencepost the same day.

As ever there were a few frustratingly brief views of individual birds during the last month - not all identifiable, which is even more frustrating! Robin had distant views of an unidentifiable eagle species from Lodge; Fran and Jim had a quick glimpse of a lovely male Bullfinch perched on the fence-wires along the track to Banks, while from the bridge over the Mill Stream Sue and I had very brief - two-secondsworth - views of a Water Rail. Amazingly all three sightings were on 4th March! Only the Water Rail has been seen subsequently but only for a few seconds each time, scuttling along the muddy margins and creeping off under the irises outside the Lower Millfield garden. Water Rails winter on the island every year but are very hard to see. We have been lucky enough to have had a few sightings in our garden, and being omnivorous, the birds readily tuck into scraps left out for the common garden species (see photo

The first Pied Wagtail of the year was at the Waterworks Pond on 7th March, and Mike at Linnabrake had a Chiffchaff in the garden there the same day. An odd combination of new species for the year was recorded on 14th, when singles of Wood Pigeon, Rook, and Lesser Black-backed Gull were seen, the latter species fairly widespread by 20th. A Chiffchaff was in the Linksquoy garden on 18th while Sanderlings were still plentiful along St Catherine's Bay. This small, attractive little wader may also be seen in Mill Bay, Holland Bay, and Bomasty Bay as well as other shorter sandy beaches. The vast majority of these beaches are washed over at High Tide and the birds leave the area to roost elsewhere on a foreshore above the tide-line. For anyone wishing to see Sanderling, Bomasty Bay at low tide is worth scanning from the car. The birds in the photograph below were seen a few weeks ago and birds may still be seen around the island into early Summer by which time the majority have left for the breeding grounds in the High Arctic regions - the nearest to the UK being on the island of Spitzbergen! With SE winds forecast during the next few days we may be enjoying an influx of finches - possibly Brambling and Chaffinches - by the time The Limpet is in print.

LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

As you may have heard on Radio Orkney or read in The Orcadian, at the General Meeting my amendment calling for a report on the possibility of polling stations being reinstated in the Isles was unanimously accepted. (This is in addition to my call last month for OIC to investigate providing a "special collection" for postal votes.) Observing what is going on elsewhere, I believe we cannot afford to become complacent about our own democracy, and currently the residents of the Isles are getting a little less of it than their counterparts on the Orkney Mainland.

I attended a meeting of the Sanday DT's Recycling Sub-Group and obtained a preview of the Heritage Centre in Lady Village, which is nearing completion. It is good to see this project reaching fruition. At last there will be a permanent place to preserve the island's historical artefacts. The old Temperance Hall will also incorporate two business units, long-needed facilities which are just the sort of development required to contribute to Sanday's economic sustainability. One has already been earmarked as the new home of the ever-popular Re-Use Centre.

All but three islands sent representatives to the Our Islands Our Future meeting for North and South Isles community councillors. At the end of the final public meeting the same evening at KGS, I took all the remaining leaflets, brochures, questionnaires and car stickers to distribute, as I travel around, to Kirkwall Airport and onto the inter-island ferries in order to ensure the North Isles' public also have access to the literature. If any Isles' community councils, schools, surgeries, etc. also want copies to distribute, please let me know.

On a blustery afternoon, I joined some primary pupils in assisting Monsieur Antoine Pietri to transfer the tiny "troot in the shed" at Sanday School into Bea Loch. A photograph of the tail-end of a whopper that a dog brought home from the loch (probably stolen from a dining otter) demonstrated the potential of these petits poissons.

As Orkney's beekeeping councillor, along with OIC officials I engaged (via video conferencing) with Steve Sunderland and Alison Knox of the Scottish Government's Bee Inspectorate to look at a way forward to statutorily protecting Orkney's honeybees from the parasitic Varroa mite, which has been so devastating to bee populations almost everywhere else in the world. This was an initiative I took up almost as soon as I was elected to OIC, and I hope we can overcome the seemingly inevitable bureaucratic hurdles to gain this protection before it is too late. In the meantime, I implore all existing and aspiring beekeepers not to import bees into the county.

Following our latest meeting of the Orkney College Management Council, Prof. Donna Heddle gave members a very inspiring presentation on the past, present and future of the Centre for Nordic Studies. In just six years it has grown from an office containing herself and a part-time secretary into an internationally recognised academic teaching and research institute, attracting research grants and business income. Overall, its activities have caused the creation of over 80 jobs in Orkney and Shetland, from academic positions to foreign language tourist guides.

At the Licensing Board meeting, I was happy to propose (successfully) acceptance of the variation of the premises licence for Westray's Cleaton House Hotel. Following a full 2 hours of debate on an application for a betting premises licence in Kirkwall, my motion for rejection was passed by a majority. There was much concern about the nature of the prospective betting establishment's gambling machines, and my basis for rejection was the Board's statutory responsibility to protect vulnerable persons from being harmed and exploited by gambling. Rejection was the only way I could see for us to ensure 100% odds of achieving this within our limited remit of regulating gambling premises in Orkney.

This month I attended community council meetings in both Stronsay and Papay, but once again short notice prevented my getting to North Ronaldsay's. However, having now been given sufficient advanced warning, I now have secured a seat on the plane to go out there on the 8th May (and come back). I shall also be going out to Rousay on Saturday 12th April for the Rousay, Egilsay, Wyre & Gairsay CC meeting. If anyone on any of these islands wishes to see me while I'm visiting, please do not hesitate to get in touch. (From now on I intend to notify folk of when I'm coming as well as when I've been.) Stronsay and Papay are pilot communities for "Empowering Communities", and it was Papay's turn to receive a presentation on how this initiative should promote joined-up thinking and sensible use of the skills and resources already present on each island.

Several ward constituents have contacted me about flooding. I have been advised that the Council is busy carrying out flood-related work resulting from both coastal erosion and damage caused this winter, and that longer-term studies are being conducted on flood defences. OIC has a duty to maintain records of flood events, and such information should be passed on to the Flood Risk Management Team, Engineering Services, OIC, School Place, Kirkwall KW15 1NY or by e-mail to engineering.services@orkney.gov.uk in order that solutions may be developed and funding accessed. Ideally, this should include details of the severity, regularity and number of properties and/or infrastructure affected by the flooding, and photographs or sketches if possible.

Well, the official council photograph has at last been taken. Like most of the gentleman councillors, I wore my Council tie and so did the two lady councillors!



What's the complete cost of a well water borehole installation?

The installation can be split into two parts, firstly the drilling, lining & grouting of the borehole and secondly the installation of the submersible pump, pressure set, pipework, electrics & construction of a simple well head housing. We don't actually get involved in the second part but we are more than happy to give you free advice on what you will need, where to buy it, how much it will cost and how to put it all together yourself. It really is all very simple.



FIRST PART:— We will identify the best location for your well, drill the borehole, install a full depth plastic liner & grout the top of the liner to prevent the ingress of surface water. The cost for drilling the well varies depending on how deep we have to drill before we hit an adequate supply. Unfortunately, it is impossible to predict exactly how deep a borehole must be drilled before adequate water is reached, but height above sea level give a rough indication and depths less than 200 foot are more common than depths over 200 foot. SECOND PART: Borehole pump, pressure set, pipe, electrics & simple well housing. If you budget this at £1'000 you should not be disappointed. But could cost more if borehole is located further from property.

The regulations state that if the hole is less than 1650 foot deep and you don't use more than 10 metric tons of water per day you do not require permission or a licence for a borehole on your own property.



Great Scottish Tapestry


As many of you will remember, round about this time last year lots of folk in Stronsay were busy stitching away on the panel that Orkney agreed to embroider. A book has been published featuring all the panels of the entire tapestry. It's an incredible piece of work, all done voluntarily by dedicated folk throughout Scotland and represents many hundreds of hours of unpaid work.

Despite all our efforts, Orkney didn't just manage to finish our panel before the deadline, so it went back to Scotland to be finished there. If you look carefully at the top left-hand corner we're there – a limpet! If you look at the bottom right-hand corner we're there – a map of our island! "But," I hear you exclaim, it says....Westray!!" Ah well, there's quite a good chance that the naming of the island wasn't stitched in Orkney, so that would explain it right enough! The organizers have been notified in very clear terms of their error and have promised to make good and put it right.

Another half panel about the whaling was stitched later in Stronsay by some very keen and talented folk whose names appear on the text accompanying the photo.

In the years around c. 3,000 BC, the greatest revolution in Scotland's $\,$ history took place. Farmers crossed the North Sea from Europe and they brought new techniques of cultivating crops and domesticating animals. Life changed utterly and amongst many spectacular monuments to the productivity of the farmers were the great stone circles of Orkney and the large timber halls built on the banks of rivers in eastern Scotland at places such as Balbridie, Claish and Kelso. The population grew very quickly particularly as a consequence of growing cereal crops. It turns out that the invention of porridge changed the world. In hunter-gatherer societies infants with soft baby teeth found the wild harvest of roots, fruits, nuts and berries difficult and consequently they were breastfed for much longer. While nursing, women generally cannot conceive and so the birth interval was long. When cereal cultivation began, the dried or charred grains could be mashed into a protein-rich porridge and fed to infants. This allowed mothers to stop breast-feeding earlier and it greatly reduced the birth interval so the first farmers began to have much larger families. And the production of food surpluses in good years allowed these growing communities the time to do work not associated with agriculture - the building of the great religious monuments of prehistoric Scotland.

Stitched in: Orkney Demand for whale oil for use in lighting drove a major expansion in whaling. Out of ports such as Dundee and Peterhead, whaling ships sailed the Arctic but overfishing seriously depleted stocks. In the early 20th century, Christian Salvesen established a whaling station in Shetland as well as one in the Antarctic on the island of South Georgia. Salvesen became the largest whaling company in the world in part because of their pioneering use of the entire carcass of the whale. By the end of the 20th century, stocks had dwindled so alarmingly that a complete moratorium had to be imposed to allow species to recover.
