LATEST BIRD SIGHTINGS

There were a few late Spring migrants at the end of May - Spotted Flycatchers and two Blackcaps. A party of five Great Northern Divers were seen off The reserve on 9th June – all in summer plumage and regularly uttering the eerie wailing call, and an exciting find on visitor Ken Barclay's last day was an Icterine Warbler in the garden at Airy on 13th June

The tern colony at Matpow has failed this year – driven out by the sheer presence of a party of Greylag Geese which took up residence there for a few days in mid-June. The Common Gulls have suffered a similar fate on the Rothiesholm Moor where there has been a huge drop in the number of nesting birds – including both species of skua - all due entirely to the presence of Greylag Geese.

A surprise sighting on 25th June was a House Martin near Gorie's but there is no sign of breeding on the island this year. Following the regular sightings of the species in Spring it seems quite probable that two pairs of Short-eared Owls have attempted to breed this year. Another plus is that Sedge Warblers are breeding again at Springwell and Margaret Crow reports two pairs breeding at Scoulters.

There are currently many young birds emerging form the safety of their nests including Oystercatchers, Ducklings and Lapwings which may be met with anywhere around the roads (see photo). A first-summer male Hen Harrier has been present for several weeks, mainly in the Bu/Mt Pleasant area (see rear-on distant photo of bird on fence-post taken by Christine Richings).

This term Lower Primary became space biologists! They embarked on a voyage of discovery by growing seeds that had actually been in space – rocket lettuce seeds.

In September 2015, 2kg of rocket seeds were flown to the International Space Station (ISS) on Soyuz 44S where they spent several months in microgravity before returning to Earth in March 2016. The seeds were sent as part of Rocket Science, an educational project launched by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening and the UK Space Agency.

We are one of up to 10,000 schools to have received a packet of 100 seeds from space, which we grew alongside seeds that had not been to space and measured the differences over seven weeks. We did not know which seed packet contained which seeds.

Rocket Science is just one educational project from a programme developed by the UK Space Agency to celebrate British ESA astronaut Tim Peake's Principia mission to the ISS and inspire young people to look into careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) subjects, including horticulture.

Lower Primary signed up to this project many months ago and could not wait to get started. In preparation for the arrival of our seeds we did lots of planting to help get those fingers green. We planted Daffodil, Crocus and Tulip bulbs, Nasturtium, Peas and Potatoes around the school grounds, in addition to this we planted some Spinach, Peas and Cress to take home and share.

LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

The eyes of the world have been on Orkney this month for the Battle of Jutland centenary commemorations. Along with fellow councillors and representatives from our island communities, I attended the remembrance service in St. Magnus Cathedral (as you may have seen on telly). Camron Dowell's moving rendition of "Lonely Scapa Flow" had a particular poignancy for me because the Flow is the final resting place of my uncle—a casualty of the Second World War. The following evening, my younger son and I accepted an invitation from the Naval Regional Commander for Scotland & Northern Ireland to a reception and combined Royal Marine and Federal German Naval Band concert at the Picky. I also attended Sanday's own Battle of Jutland events, and we flew the Deutsche Bundesflagge from the West Manse flagpole to welcome ehemaligen Konteradmiral Heinrich Schuur and Professor Klaus Wellershoff. The former is the grandson of the flotilla commander of the B98, parts of which lie aground in Lopness Bay. A few days later, I took the opportunity to join P7 and S1 pupils from Sanday School when they went to see the ceramic poppy display and did a tour of the cathedral. When we reached the memorial to HMS Royal Oak, I told them about how she saw combat at Jutland in World War I and was sunk, along with 834 men and boys, in Scapa Flow at the start of World War II prompting the construction of the Churchill Barriers. By far the best tribute the people of the world today could pay to the fallen of both world wars would be not to be fighting each other anymore.

At a seminar I attended on rubbish recycling, feedback from Shapinsay and Westray on the alternate weekly collection was very positive, however, owing to Government Scotland's cuts to local authority funding, it looks like we are going to have to put its roll-out to the other isles on hold for the time being. At another seminar, we were told about an online budget simulator, with which, in due course, members of the Orkney public might be able to have their own stab at setting the Council's budget!

The Education, Leisure & Housing Committee has approved The Orkney Play Area Strategy, and I'd welcome any comments the public (especially the young users) may have on our play parks in the North Isles. At our Policy & Resources Committee meeting I was appointed OIC's representative on the Leadership Board of the Highlands & Islands Science Skills Academy, a "long-term programme that aims to transform the engagement of our young people with science, technology, engineering, mathematics and digital (STEM/D) disciplines" across the entire Highlands & Islands region.

Reports on the progress being made at empowering our communities on the pilot islands of Stronsay and Papay were presented at the meeting of the Empowering Communities Member/Officer Working Group. I got to see first-hand some of the good things happening in Papay when I flew there for the official opening of their Kelp Store Heritage & Craft Centre. Thank you RNLI ladies for the wonderful spread you laid on for us visitors. Papay has also been chosen to host a joint working pilot between two schemes aimed at tackling fuel poverty and improving energy efficiency: HEEPS:ABS and HEEPS:WHS.

I enjoyed a grand day (and another fine spread) in Westray at the North Isles Sports. Congratulations to our hosts for being overall champions and to Sanday for winning the Schools Cup. It was good to meet competitors and spectators from Stronsay, Papa Westray and North Ronaldsay, too. Maybe Eday and Papa Stronsay will send teams next year.

Other meetings I have attended include those of the: Change Programme Management Board, Westray Parent Council; Orkney College Management Council (at which we were given a presentation on the work of the Agronomy Institute); High Cost/Extraordinary Care Arrangements Group; a pre-meeting of Education, Leisure & Housing; Westray Community Council; Monitoring & Audit; Rousay, Egilsay, Wyre & Gairsay Community Council; and a discussion on the mobile library petition.

I have been asked what OIC is doing about Orkney's digital connectivity. The Convener informs me that the UK Government has responded to Council lobbying with a promise of a universal service obligation for digital communications of 10MB/s, and Government Scotland has committed to superfast broadband to all premises by 2021. However, we are not complacent and continue pressing at COSLA and the Convention of the Highlands & Islands for successive tranches of funding targeted to areas of lowest coverage so that improved services are faster and arrive sooner.

On the 27th June I shall be back in Rousay and on the 28th in Sanday for isles engagement events on the Inter-Island Air & Ferry Transport Study. The last General Meeting before the recess starts will be on the 5th July.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND AN ENTANGLED WHALE!



British Divers Marine Life Rescue Large Whale Entanglement Awareness

BDMLR Emergency Hotline: 01825 765546or

HM Coast Guard: VHF Ch. 16

Whales can become accidentally entangled in fishing gear and other man-made materials. While this type of incident is rare and often not immediately fatal to the animal in question, these entanglements can hinder the recovery of endangered whale populations.

What to look for, what to do (and not do) and what to expect:

- > Look for buoys and lines, moving or unusually clumped near a whale.
- Determine what species of whale is involved (see reverse). Do not approach the whale, stay at least 400m distance from the whale.
- > Call **01825 765546** or relay through **HMCG** (**VHF Ch. 16**) if whale is entangled.
- Please provide the following information: position, species (or best description), behaviour, description of gear and entanglement and your contact details.
- You may be requested to stand by the whale or help track it on a voluntary basis.
- > A vessel or aircraft will be despatched to assess the situation, transport the LWDT and stand by if required.
- > The LWDT may attach a satellite telemetry buoy and VHF transmitter to locate the whale for future rescue attempts if a disentanglement cannot be conducted immediately due to sea state, weather and light conditions or availability of correct resources.
- Do not attempt to disentangle the whale yourself. Initial instincts to cut the whale free can actually make it more difficult for the LWDT to locate the animal and carry out an effective rescue. Removal of large amounts of gear can make it almost impossible for the LWDT to capture the animal if free swimming. Entering the water with an entangled whale is extremely dangerous and must never be attempted under any circumstances.
- > Remember that large whales are extremely powerful and very unpredictable, especially if they feel threatened or are frightened by your presence

KEEP THIS NOTICE ON YOUR BOAT!

British Divers Marine Life Rescue - Large Whale Disentanglement Team (BDMLR-LWDT) has been trained in large whale disentanglement techniques by the Provincetown Centre for Coastal Studies (PCCS) in the United States of America. BDMLR is the only organisation in Europe that is trained and experienced in disentangling large whales and holds the only set of large whale disentanglement rescue equipment in Europe. It is vital that any entangled whales are reported immediately to BDMLR or HMCG to protect these critically endangered whale populations.


