COMMUNITY FUND OVERVIEW FOR 2015/16

Over the twelve months from 1st September 2015 to 31st August 2016 a total of £99,588 has been granted to groups and individuals on Stronsay. The awards have included £50,000 to the Stronsay Play Park Group, £19,749 to Stronsay Parent Council, £1,500 to Stronsay Swimming Pool, £8,100 in Fuel Poverty payments, £5,306 for driving lessons, 11 Education bursaries of £1,000 apiece and 12 skills bursaries totalling £3,933.

There were no applications by Stronsay Development Trust towards its running costs, leaving the Community Fund to begin the 2016/17 financial year with a balance of £152,535.84, of which £40,000 has been put aside.

We are asking the Stronsay Community to write a letter, or a card, to someone on the island.



LATEST BIRD SIGHTINGS.

Rather like the well-known 'London Bus Syndrome' (none for ages then three come along together etc.) the first Temminck's Stint record for the island in late July was joined by a second bird on 26th (see photo), but better was to come later that day when a Sharptailed Sandpiper arrived among a flock of small waders. This species breeds in the far NE region of Northern Russia, the majority of birds wintering in Australia, so this was a major find. Sadly it was only present for a couple of minutes but all the features of the bird were noted — including the yellowy legs and short, straight bill. All the waders on the loch at that time were suddenly flushed by a passing skua and neither the sandpiper nor the stints were seen again.

A strange find by Norman at Airy Farm on 28th July was a bedraggled Peregrine which appeared to be nothing other than 'wet through' (see photo). It was seen in a much drier condition next day.

The first small Autumn migrant species in the gardens was a beautiful Wood Warbler at Dale on 5th August (same day as a Garden Tiger moth at Castle) whilst Sedge Warblers were seen at several garden sites during late Summer suggesting that at least 4 pairs bred this year. Swallows were very numerous again but last year's House Martins at Greenfield and Grindalea failed to return. House Martins rarely breed in the Northern Isles of Orkney.

SE winds on and around 20th August brought 2 Icterine Warblers to the island and a colourful mixture of small passerines including 10 Pied Flycatchers, a few Whinchats and singles of Redstart, Lesser Whitethroat and Garden Warbler. Rarer species recorded were a Common Rosefinch at Dale, an Icterine Warbler at Holin Cottage, and the first Greenish Warbler – a much rarer species – at Airy (see photo). On 23rd there were no less than 3 Greenish Warblers in the Airy Garden and a surprising find at Castle the same day was a Hawfinch which was later seen by Nigel in the garden at Lower Millfield.

Other than the (usual) big influxes of Pied wagtails in late August there were a few other migrants in the last week of the month including the only Swift of the year (over Airy on 27th) and the first Robin at Dale on 31st.

September arrived with a Stonechat at Grind on 1st. A surprise sighting on 4th was a Wryneck flying low over The Reserve – giving close but frustratingly short views to ourselves and visitors Jim and Tam from Edinburgh. Another surprise sighting was 3 Shelduck on the Bu Loch on 3rd – a species rarely seen here after the end of August, but even more unusual was a Brent Goose – also on the Bu Loch - on 9th. There was a noticeably big influx of 'Greenland' Wheatears around 10th Sept (see photo) and a very unusual discovery in Whitehall Village on 12th was a Slavonian Grebe. This bird had probably swum close inshore, frightened by the approaching ferry as it manoeuvred between the piers (see photo).

A Yellow-browed Warbler was found in the Castle garden on 15th September – brought in on a favourable light NE wind – and a Buzzard was seen on several occasions mid-month, possibly one of the birds from Eday where the species now breeds. Clear skies over much of the North Sea and virtually no wind on 19th-20th brought hundreds of Yellow-browed Warblers to the eastern seaboard of the UK, three arriving in the Airy garden (see photo). Over 100 were seen around Flamborough Head in Yorkshire the same day. It is amazing that such a small species (hardly bigger than a Wren) and which breeds no closer than far eastern Europe, visits the UK in late Autumn annually. Perhaps the most memorable sighting among our own birds was one flying in form the North and almost landing on the pier just a few yards from ourselves and departing visitor Ken Barclay as we waited for the Ferry. A wonderful send-off for Ken!

LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

I apologise to the folk of Stronsay for not making it over as planned to chair the Northwind public meeting on the 7th September. Unfortunately, I got fog-bound at Sanday Airfield. This is more the sort of experience you hope will happen to transport consultants, in order to give them a taste of the realities of inter-island travel. Fortunately, at a seminar I attended on the Inter-Island Air & Ferry Transport Study being undertaken on our behalf by Peter Brett Associates (whom many of you will have met recently at the transport engagement events in the Isles), it was clear that the consultants have now got a good grasp of the main issues, how it is for us in the Isles, and what our transport needs are. Fog also prevented some of the transport reps getting into Kirkwall for the Air Services and Ferry Services Consultative Forum meetings. Timetables for summer 2017 were discussed, and for both planes and ferries these will broadly be remaining the same as last year. There was an appeal from the Ferry Services Manager for organisers to arrange events around the ferry timetables and not for Orkney Ferries to arrange the timetables around events.

A seminar was held to present and discuss the first draft of our Council travel policy, the intention of which is to cut down the expense of travel for both OIC employees and councillors. Our geographical location means that we have to travel considerable distances to reach the centres of power. There is an unavoidable cost involved with this, which we have to accept if Orkney is not to be disadvantaged. To be effective, in my experience, you have to be physically present at meetings. Useful as it is, video-conferencing really doesn't cut it. And then there are the pre- and post-meeting conversations that you miss out on if you're not there (or have to rush in at the start and leave straightaway at the end)—the conversations where contacts are established, networks are tapped into, deals are negotiated, and the decisions are really made.

At the Education, Leisure & Housing Committee meeting, approval was unanimous for the Appiehouse Stone (which displays both Pictish and Christian iconography) to be returned to Sanday. Following the meeting, we had a briefing on Education Scotland's new plans for raising attainment: "closing the gap and raising the bar" and "delivering excellence and equity", as they put it. I think "Plain Words", Sir Ernest Gower's classic guide to the use of English, must have dropped out of the Scottish curriculum some time ago!

I met with the new Japanese Consul, Daisuke Mutsunaga, who was in Orkney for the visit of pupils and teachers to the county from Kamaishi High School. He spoke about opportunities for young people in Orkney to experience Japanese culture through the Japan Exchange & Teaching Programme (JET), which is now in its 30th year.

I attended a meeting of the Orkney Memorial Fund, of which, as Vice-Chair of Education, Leisure & Housing, I am *ex officio* an administrator. This fund exists primarily to provide assistance to families with dependent children who have suffered hardship as a result of the sudden death or incapacity of a parent. Requests to the fund are lodged directly by elected members.

An afternoon coach tour was arranged for members of the Education, Leisure & Housing and Development & Infrastructure committees to look at some of the Council's "work in progress". This included the new hospital site, housing in Kirkwall, a development site at Hatston, and the new school building at Evie.

I sat on the shortleeting and interview panel for appointing a new headteacher for Westray Junior High School. We offered the post to Sarah Jones. Sarah is currently Vice -Principal—Student Development at BSix Brooke House Sixth Form College, which serves Hackney in London. Prior to that, she co-founded and was Deputy Head at Greenwich Free School. I am pleased to say she has accepted our offer. Her starting date has yet to be confirmed.

In Kirkwall, this month, I have also attended pre-agenda and pre-meetings of Education, Leisure & Housing, a High-Cost/Extraordinary Care Arrangements meeting (this is an officer/member group responsible for the wellbeing of children and young people with exceptional care needs and those in out-of-Orkney placements), meetings of the House-Build Programme Board, Orkney College Management Council, Licensing Sub-Committee, Licensing Board, and Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board. In addition, I convened face-to-face meetings with Council officers to discuss certain proposals and practices, brought to my attention by ward constituents, which clearly contradict, where the North Isles are concerned, our "Council values" of **promoting survival** and **promoting sustainability**.

In the Isles, I have been along to meetings of the Sanday, Shapinsay and North Ronaldsay community councils, Stronsay Parent Council, and Shapinsay Community School Planning Group.

THAW (Tackling Household Affordable Warmth) is making "Cosy Home Packs" available to OIC and OHAL tenants who are in fuel poverty (defined as having to spend more than 10% of their household income in order to heat their dwelling satisfactorily) and who suffer from long-term ill-health conditions. If you think you or someone else may be eligible, THAW can be contacted by telephoning: 01856-878388, e-mailing: in-fo@thaworkney.co.uk, or calling in at their office at 15 Victoria Street, Kirkwall.

There is currently a Government Scotland consultation underway about permitting electrofishing for razor clams. This practice could have a serious detrimental impact on the sustainability of traditional spooting in our islands. I shall be going to the meeting of Stronsay Community Council on the 17th October (weather permitting!).


