# North Isles Landscape Partnership LANDSCAPE AND COASTAL CHARACTER STUDY - MEETING

A lot has been happening with regard to the various studies required as part of round 2 NILPS submission to the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Alister Brown, Development Officer – North Isles Landscape Partnership Scheme – explains: "We recently procured Craignish Design for our Landscape and Seascape Character Study of the North Isles. This study will provide an up to date record of the North Isles landscape and seascape, outlining recommendations in response to the threats and opportunities posed to their distinctive characteristics. The completed project will enable informed decisions to be made towards ensuring heritage is better managed and in better condition."

David Graham – Craignish Design – explains: "We are undertaking a Local Landscape and Coastal Character Assessment (LLCA) of the North Isles on behalf of OIC as part of the North Isles Landscape Partnership Project."

"The Landscape and Seascape Study will provide an up to date record of the North Isles landscape and seascape, outlining recommendations in response to the threats and opportunities posed in Isles distinct characteristics. It will also provide an up to date understanding of how the landscape is perceived and experienced by people (e.g. what local people value about their landscape). This study will help identify projects to be included in the delivery phase of NILPS."

"We are keen to engage with residents in the islands in the LLCA process. What would be useful is to learn the following from the local communities:

"What makes this landscape special? What are its special qualities and special places?"

"What, in the future may change those special qualities?"

"What could be done to protect / enhance those special qualities?"

No date for the meeting has been set at time of going to press, but we are expecting it will take place in November and will be a drop-in day-time and/or an evening event.

# **RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS**

September ended with huge numbers of Pink-footed Geese flying over, dozens of Wheatears along the roadsides, and an exhausted juvenile Gannet was found stranded at the Matpow Loch after the 75mph winds on 29th (see photo). In spite of this storm there were still 30 Swallows at Airy at the end of the month.

Calm overnight conditions prevailed on 1st-2nd October and 11 Yellow-browed Warblers arrived on the island along with a Barred Warbler and a Garden Warbler (see photos). A real surprise seen with the local Starlings at Holin Cottage on 3rd was a juvenile Rosy Starling which proved very elusive and difficult to photograph! (see photo). It was seen again on 9th and may still be on the island. A Red-backed Shrike (see photo) near the South School on 4th was another surprise followed by another big 'fall' of migrants on 6th – mainly Goldcrests, Blackcaps and Redwings. 20 Brambling were seen at Dale the same day.

With a distinct – and very welcome - shortage of Greylag Geese well into the Autumn there has been a very welcome increase in the number of waders present: Golden Plover and Curlew in particular in the fields of short grass, and Duck: particularly Wigeon and Teal on the freshwater lochs, with smaller numbers on the sea close inshore.

There were a good number of sightings of Red Admiral butterflies around 8th-12th September coinciding with a further increase in the number of Goldcrests. An indication of the mild conditions was the discovery of a very late Pied Flycatcher on 10th (see photo) when 3 Greenfinches were also seen. SE winds did it again overnight on 12th-13th and at first light on 13th Kath and Norman each saw a different Woodcock at Dale whilst another was seen here in the Castle garden. David reported seeing a Stonechat at Osen the same morning.

By mid-October Robins were just about everywhere – and many householders reported that the birds were much tamer than our usual wintering Robins. More SE winds on 15th-16th brought further waves of migrants including at least 15 Mealy Redpolls (see photo) – feeding on roadside weeds but very elusive! 2 Common Scoter were seen on the Matpow Loch, but the most exciting discoveries were Waxwings – 2 at the North School, and a single briefly later in the day at Holin Cottage.

Another wave of migrants arrived on the island on 17th – hundreds of Redwings and smaller numbers of Fieldfares, and two unusual buntings were discovered – a Lapland Bunting in the Odiness Road and a much rarer Little Bunting (see photo) near Mt Pleasant. An adult male Hen Harrier (pale grey upper-wings with black tips, and white body) flew right past Joyce Maples at Park Cottage on 18th.

On 19th many of the island gardens held several migrant species. Our own held two each of: Brambling, Greenfinch, Blackcap, Goldcrest and Robin, and singles of Redwing, Dunnock and Chiffchaff.

By 21st many birds had departed, and even more had gone next day – but with more easterlies forecast during the next 2-3 days (24th-25th Oct.) we could be in for yet more interesting species here on Stronsay.

# **BAYVIEW 2016**

When we came to look at Bayview in the spring and had our first lunch in the Fish Mart we couldn't help but be impressed by the displays and photographs that told the story of the herring fishing and the huge effect it had on Stronsay. Indeed we were about to look over a house built on the strength of that industry. Well we bought a matter that soon became common knowledge, as we made our first ferry trip, the purser knew exactly who we were, passengers introduced themselves and gave their best wishes.

As we drove round the island, on 'peedie' journeys of discovery or just heading to the beach to walk the dogs, I became increasingly aware of the rich heritage of farming on the island. Not just the careful husbandry of the land and the livestock but also the fine farm buildings; barns, steadings, workers cottages and croft houses. Even those that had fallen into disrepair and ruin, as a vernacular buildings historian the story they tell and their exposed stonework are a fascination. I find myself wanting to photograph and survey them.

What surprised me was the apparent lack of writing on Stronsay's agricultural past, so I set about 'doing a little research'.

Reading the Orkneyinga Saga, there were several references to Stronsay but almost always coupled with farming. Rental records for 1595 in St Nicholas parish show three substantial farms, Clet (now Cleat), Housbie (now Housebay) and Holland all in the hands of Earl Patrick Stewart. The area, six square miles, was described as Class 3 (the highest category), and was the largest area of land at this category in the Northern Isles.

Looking at the census records from 1841 to 1911, over 10,000 entries, Stronsay had 30 to 40% of its population (around 1200) in employment. Of these 50 to 60 folk were fishermen, but 200 to 300 worked on the land. Farming was clearly of considerable importance to Stronsay.

Now the reason for me writing this article. I would like to write that book, but I can't do it without your help. I am asking you to share, any photographs, documents and stories that could help me to understand the way the land has been worked on Stronsay over the past years, decades - even centuries.

Gathering facts is relatively easy, they are generally out there somewhere but getting to know what life was like on Stronsay is a little more complicated; it is held in people's memories and their willingness to share them, plus I'm a newcomer. I am glad to say communities have trusted me in the past and some interesting and rewarding work has been the result.

### STEPHEN CLACKSON'S LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

I first mentioned the budget simulator in my June "Letter". Since then OIC officials have been busy customising it. Interestingly, the simulator allows you, for example, to suggest stopping **all funding** to our life-line Orkney Ferries and the inter-island air service, but not reducing the salaries of the aforementioned OIC officials nor sacking the Finance Department. Nevertheless, the simulator does give an indication of the difficult decisions faced by us councillors in setting the annual council budget, which is predicted to be even tighter this year.

I sat on the shortleeting and interview panel for appointing a new acting headteacher for Eday and North Ronaldsay primaries. The post was offered to Steve Miller, well known to staff and pupils at both of those schools.

Stephen Fraser, the Scottish Fire & Rescue Service's Station Manager for Orkney, kindly saw me about recruitment of firefighters in the Isles. He shall be coming out to Sanday's community council meeting on the 22<sup>nd</sup> November.

I paid a visit to Peter Rickard, Interim Manager of THAW Orkney (Tackling Household Affordable Warmth), a new charitable organisation with the aim of eradicating fuel poverty in Orkney. I was impressed by their joined-up approach. As a member of the Orkney College Management Council, I attended this year's graduation ceremony at St. Magnus' Cathedral. While waiting for the procession to start, I noticed with horror evidence of last year's reception on the front of my red & gold doctoral gown, in the form of smears of blue icing sugar. Fortunately, the food colouring in it wasn't indelible. This year, another memorable reception was laid on by the students of the College's Hospitality Department, but this time I've made sure no reminders have remained for next year's graduation!

I accepted an invitation to meet with consultants from SKS Scotland, commissioned by the Sanday Development Trust to carry out a feasibility study and draw up a business plan for the regeneration of Kettletoft, a project supported by the North Isles Landscape Partnership. Many Sanday folk will have memories of the "Idea of North" study conducted by the Mackintosh School of Architecture in 2006. I am confident that this time the consultation is firmly grounded in realism.

Other meetings I have attended this month include those of the: Policy & Resources Committee, Monitoring & Audit Committee, General Meeting of the full Council, Stronsay Community Council, and the Leadership Board of the Highlands & Islands Science Skills Academy. I have also engaged in a strategic planning workshop of the Orkney College Management Council, and been to seminars on serious organised crime and on the use of intelligence information in licensing.

Several schools in the North Isles still have unacceptably high speed limits on the roads passing by them. I have been informed that the Council's road team have commenced a survey of existing 40 mph speed limits across Orkney.

At last the "extra" wheelie bins at the Hatston depot are going to be put to good use. Each household in the Isles (with the exception of those in Shapinsay and Westray, which already have them for their alternate weekly collections) is going to be provided with two bins for storing recyclable items and bagged-up refuse. This means your rubbish can be kept outside in a vermin-proof container during the week and wheeled to the roadside on collection day. (The collection frequency will continue as at present.) In addition, the recycling points will be increased in capacity.

I have been asked how long one should expect to have wait for a response to a query made to a Council department. OIC has corporate standards for this which state that an acknowledgement should be received within 5 working days and a substantive reply within 25 working days. (I, personally, try to do much better than this.)

The next local authority elections will be held on Thursday, 4<sup>th</sup> May 2017. I intend to have a mini-manifesto in place by then, on which I will stand, and which (if I am reelected) I will use as a basis to form an alliance with other like-minded councillors, so that it is backed with sufficient support to become implemented. In the next few issues of this "Letter" I shall be sharing my thoughts on various areas of council activity and what I am thinking of putting into my manifesto, and I would welcome feedback from the public. I shall start this month with education (so pupils, parents, teachers, prepare to get in touch ...):

Education: Much of the Council's education policy is directed by Scottish Government legislation. (Alarmingly, under SNP education reform proposals, local authorities may lose any role in education at all!) Nonetheless, there is still some scope for local variation and innovation. For example, I support our "Orkney Offer", which capitalises on the almost-unique situation that our local further education college is council-run. This enables pupils in S4, S5 & S6 to blend academic education and vocational training to suit their needs and abilities. I firmly believe that schools must teach skills for life, and two specific skills I want taught in Orkney schools are: 1) Touch typing — In a world where the keyboard is taking over from the pen, this indispensable skill should be introduced in primary. 2) Driving — One of the most essential qualifications one needs as an adult is a driving licence, and in the senior secondary years we should, at least, be preparing students for the theory test.

On the 15<sup>th</sup> November, I shall be flying to Papay for a meeting of their community council, and I'll also be going along to Sanday's community council meeting on the 22<sup>nd</sup>.


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


#### Miss Me - But Let Me Go

# THE "WHAT IS IT?" COMPETITION FROM SEPTEMBER 2016

Here is the definitive answer to last month's "What is it?" competition, printed with kind permission of Elaine Charwat MSc, MCLIP, Deputy Librarian & Linnaeus Link Administrator, The Linnean Society of London, Burlington House, Piccadilly, London, W1J 0BF, UK .

#### FINDING A GIANT EAR BONE ON THE ISLAND OF STRONSAY (ORKNEY)

Stronsay's exposed position in the North-East of Orkney and its flat "all arms and legs" shape make it a prime location for catching out the more spectacular and mysterious creatures living in the North Atlantic and the North Sea. Therefore, it should come as no surprise that the small island is famous for a major cryptozoological puzzle. In 1808, after a storm, Stronsay's own close relative of the Loch Ness Monster was found washed ashore nearRothiesholm Bay. Dubbed the "Stronsay Beast", it has stubbornly resisted identification so far. Various parts of the creature have indeed survived and are awaiting DNA analysis.

When my husband and I visited Stronsay this September, we spent a few happy hours walking around Rothiesholm Bay. Failing to spot anything more monstrous than a dead and very bloated grey seal (Halichoerus grypus), we heard about the remnants of a stranded whale near Lambness and went to see them. Parts of the spine with its impressive vertebrates and discs were still draped over rocks. As we walked along the beach at stumbled over countless pieces of narrow triangular leen plates roughly the length of my arm, which looked almost like they were peeled from the trunk of a palm tree with their frazzled fibre-like bristles running along the translucent horn-like main shape. We also found a part of the beak-shaped skull, arched rib-bones, and single spine discs the size of Frisbees. When lifted from the water, these were heavy with water like soaked yellow sponges. Then Lukas walked towards me holding a solid, curved white object. "What do you think this is", he said. He handed it to me, and it lay in my hand extraordinarily heavy for its size. It was of a hard, porcelain-like substance and shaped vaguely like a conch. "Ear", I said, without thinking. It just seemed to have been made for amplifying sound, just like a conch would. This initial gut-feeling seemed rather fanciful at first – could this really be a whale's ear? – but it turned out to be just that.

A quick look at the anatomy of whales confirmed that it was the bulla, which encloses the delicate inner ear bones. Identifying the species of whale was not difficult thanks to the excellent Scottish Marine Animal Stranding Scheme database and map [http://www.strandings.org/cgi-bin/map.pl]. Our whale was a juvenile female fin whale, stranded on the 6th of January 2016. This fascinating find prompted me to try and learn more about how whales hear – sound being so crucial to their lives and their anatomy being so different from land mammals. Our bulla and inner ear, for instance, is located in our skulls, whereas with whales it is located inside their jaws. The density and stiffness of the whales' bulla is, apart from dental enamel, the greatest of any vertebrate skeletal tissues, and has evolved to deliver the best possible sound transmission without distortion.

The question of how whales hear is still being debated. Baleen whales like fin whale have a different "ear" anatomy again from toothed whales (toothed wales have ligaments which separate the ear bones from the rest of the skull, probably making it harder for sound conducted by the skull to be heard). Recent research using a fin whale skull, computed tomography and a simulation model suggests that there are two mechanisms which allow the whale to hear. Firstly, the bone-conduction mechanism, which is hearing by sound conducted from the movement of the skull to the ear bones. Secondly, the pressure mechanism, which is sound interacting directly with the ear bones of the whale after moving through water and the head tissue. In line with its anatomy, the bone conduction mechanism seems to be the main mechanism for fin whales. In summary, "fin whales communicate using low-frequency vocalizations [...]. Low-frequency sounds tend to scatter and therefore do not have the ability to apply much direct pressure on ear bones. Therefore the sound's contact with the skull would account for the majority of how they hear these low-frequency sounds and the 'pressure mechanism' would be less impactful."

Whale song is quite an earful – and it goes hand in hand with a giant ear bone, a uniquely adapted anatomy to make the most of it. Mysterious body parts found on remote islands maynot always belong to sea monsters, but "prosaic" truths often hold far profounder and more fascinating mysteries. Holding in your hand the heavy bone which has sounded with the haunting song of a fin whale is humbling, and much superior, I think, to a sea monster. What they have in common, on the other hand, is that science still has to find answers to the many questions raised by both.
