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YOUR ISLAND, YOUR CHOICE

A report on the meeting held on Tuesday 6 December by Roger Neville-Smith

I was not able to stay until the end of the Tuesday evening meeting and did not attend the drop in session on Wednesday. Despite my concern it was actually quite well attended.

The point was to explore the needs and aspirations of Stronsay as part of the Orkney outer isles locality. The visitors went through the survey which several people had completed and brief discussion took place about each area. There was a keen discussion which remained constructive throughout the evening. There was an opportunity to bid for some/all of a £2k (per island) grant for contribution to a project which will improve life for the residents. A report will be written following the meeting and I hope that island representatives were found so that further communication can be included. I hope a version of the report will be shared with us all. No momentous decisions were taken but the meeting was part of a process of listening to island residents. We all agreed that we need to grow our population, increase sustainability, improve job opportunities and enhance our island experience for visitors.

(A letter from Steve Haskins who is moving to Stronsay next month. If you wish to contact Steve please do so via the Limpet's editor)

We are Steve & Sharon Haskins who along with Aaron (Sharon's 15 year old son) and Flash (our 18 month old Basset Hound) will be moving to Stronsay at the end of January. This will be a challenging move with the distance involved, not least of all because Flash doesn't travel well. When it comes to travel sickness he is of Olympic standard. He does have the most beautiful, melodic voice though when he's trying to break out of a moving car!

I would be extremely grateful if anyone can give me some idea of work on the island. I have for a number of years worked in the timber packaging industry, making wooden pallets, packing cases, etc. I also have experience of the building trade although more general than a specific trade. Many years ago, probably more than I'd like to admit, I did summer work on a small farm. I've also done work ranging from bus driving to egg collecting so I'm happy to try my hand at anything.

Any help would be greatly appreciated. We are really looking forward to settling on the island and meeting everybody. Until then I'd like to wish you all a great Christmas and New Year.

STEPHEN CLACKSON'S LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

Happy Christmas to Government Scotland and thank you for the present. I know we shouldn't be looking a gift-horse in the mouth and it's the thought that counts and all that, and at least it's only a drop of 2.25% and not 3.9% like last year, but it still represents a further £1,500,000 cut in our financial allocation on top of the cut we had last year. (NB: Under the *Scotland Act 2016*, income tax powers have now been fully devolved to Holyrood, and it'll be interesting to see how Govt. Scot. chooses to use these powers.) We councillors will soon be getting a series of briefing seminars on what all this actually means in terms of setting our budget for the forthcoming financial year. It has already been announced that we will be permitted to raise council tax by up to 3%. I'd like to hear what the public feels about this as a way of raising funds to support our council services.

The Policy & Resources Committee agenda included our budget principles for 2017/18 and our medium term resource strategy. The report on the latter identified an estimated funding gap of £12 million over the next five years. It was recommended that "the recent public engagement exercise, 'Balance the OIC Budget' [the online budget simulator], will be integrated with existing processes to assist the budget setting process from 2017/18 onwards, as budgets are reconfigured in line with local priorities and reducing funding levels". It was recognised that an additional contribution from the Strategic Reserve Fund "could be required in order to defer baseline budget savings required to bridge the funding gap".

As part of his official visit to Orkney, Chinese Consul General Pan Xinchun (潘新春) made a presentation to councillors. I asked about support for Chinese language education in Orkney (奥克尼), and he spoke about the possibility of setting up a Confucius Institute (孔子学院) hub here. I steered clear of suggesting Orkney be twinned with the Spratly Islands (南沙群岛).

As Vice-Chair of Education, Leisure & Housing, I was on the selection panel for the new post of Head of Education & Improvement. The remit of this position is: service performance and improvement, parental engagement, learning and teaching, professional development, ICT for schools, and employability and youth employment. The successful applicant was James Wylie, a Service Improvement Officer at OIC. I have arranged to meet with James early in the new year to talk about his rôle vis-à-vis the North Isles junior high schools.

Other meetings I have attended included: a Members' Forum meeting (where councillors get together for free discussion away from School Place); a presentation from the Flotta Terminal management team; a seminar on the Kirkwall Townscape Heritage Initiative; a special Development & Infrastructure Committee meeting on the new air services contract; a meeting of the High Cost / Extraordinary Care Arrangements Group; a "catchup" with the Executive Director of Education, Leisure & Housing; a joint OIC, NHS Orkney and Integrated Joint Board budget seminar; meetings of the Licensing Sub-Committee and Licensing Board, and an open evening at the Warehouse Buildings in Stromness. In the Isles, I have been to meetings of the Sanday Community Council and Stronsay Parent Council. I chose to miss the grand Kirkwall tree-lighting, St. Lucy procession and Convener's reception in order to enjoy mulled wine and mince pies with island folk at the Sanday Christmas tree lighting. (As a consolation, I got to try on one of the Halberdier's uniforms—see below.)

The last General Meeting of 2016 was dominated by the ladies and gents in the chamber discussing the provision of public conveniences in the centre of Kirkwall—how, having a slash in our funding, we could avoid being caught short spending a penny we don't have—and finally passing a motion to reopen the St. Magnus Lane toilets. I didn't bring it up at the meeting, but I have wondered if there might be scope for an alternative on-demand "Uber"-style service, where householders make their facilities available to paying customers via a smartphone app. Perhaps we could pilot such a scheme in the Isles ...?

Transport: I believe it was a Stronsay schoolboy who many years ago defined an island as "a piece of sea with no water in it". The North Isles ward is unique, being the only local authority ward in the country to consist solely of discreet islands. The sea not only defines us, but presents us with transport connectivity challenges both within the ward and without. Planes and ferries currently provide us with bad connectivity between our respective islands and barely adequate connectivity with the Orkney Mainland. The recent Inter-Island Air & Transport Study commissioned by OIC has unequivocally demonstrated that according to Government Scotland's own *Routes & Services Methodology* we are under-provisioned, and it is on this basis that OIC has requested Government Scotland to fund our internal ferry fleet (like they fund ferries in other parts of Scotland). For the moment, I am supporting this approach, provided the outcome corresponds at least to the enhanced level of service suggested by the consultants. However, I must introduce a disclaimer here: Improved transportation links are no guarantee of improved prosperity, sustainability or the survival of our island communities, since small island economics are complex.

Without the full 1959 records, it's not possible to be sure that his listed victories are complete, but he won the Mile at least 10 times, and had another 13 or more victories in the 440 and 880.

LATEST BIRD SIGHTINGS

2016 has been one of the best years for unusual sightings here on Stronsay, with 4 species new to the island - Wood Duck in January; Sharp-tailed Sandpiper in July, Pine Bunting in October, and Saker Falcon in December. And the year is not over yet!

The Pine Bunting was seen briefly in mid-October at Linksquoy and identified later from the single image obtained (see photo). There were several other singles of this very rare species in the UK around this time. The area hosted another major British rarity a week later – this time just across the road on the Holin Farm fence (see photo) – a Pallid Harrier which we approached with caution in the car and managed to obtain an amazing series of photographs (see below). Being discovered on what was a Sunday morning - and long before the service in The Kirk - we had ample time to study the bird, which eventually flew off towards Airy and was never seen again.

Four Stonechats were seen in late October – two along the road between Eastbank and Gorie's which were seen on and off until late November, and two different birds, seen a few times near the Matpow Loch well into November. 6 Greenland White-fronted Geese (40-50 or so used to winter on the Meikle Water annually prior to the Greylag Goose invasion) were in the field alongside The Reserve on 27th October, and Sheila at Helmsley reported a flock of 40 or so Barnacle Geese flying over the Village next day. As if to prove how unpredictable bird sightings can be, Sue flushed a Woodcock as she left the Community Greenhouse to walk home to Castle on 29th, and after 400yds came across an Isabelline Shrike among the umbelifers by the roadside – just the second island record! Woodcock are completely unpredictable and among several sightings in early November, Hazel and Norman saw one rise from the dry crusty margin of the Slurry Lagoon at Airy Farm on 3rd. Another surprise around this date was a party of 3 Goosanders on the Bu Loch. There were three – all rather brief – sightings of single Waxwings between 7th and 20th. Postman Andy had a great surprise during his round on 14th – 3 Short-eared Owls close together on roadside fence-posts.

Although migration is virtually over for most species by November it can be an exciting month for the keen birdwatcher, and this year did not disappoint with further sightings from a very diverse list of habitats – a Dabchick on the Matpow Loch; 15 Snow Buntings on the Lower Whitehall beach; a Lesser Whitethroat in the garden at Dale Cottage; a scattering of Greenfinches polishing off what remained of the Rose-hips in several gardens; a Water Rail out in the open below the big Sycamore tree at Sunnyside – with a Merlin on the nearby stone dyke; a party of 4 Long-tailed Ducks (see photo) for several days on the Bu Loch (they are more often found on the open sea); a Buzzard - flying over, and the most exciting find of all - discovered by Leslie Miller on 29th – a Snow Goose among one of the Greylag flocks – in a field of plain grass! This bird has been present well into December (see photos). Single Chiffchaffs (possibly the same bird) have been seen at LInksquoy and Dale in late November/early December. It is a sign of the generally mild weather that this tiny insectivorous species is still present so far north!

December this year certainly began with a bang when a Saker Falcon was seen well for about 30 seconds as it hunted in the area between Castle, Lower Samson's and the Fire Station, before disappearing over the hill towards Dale. This large falcon was roughly Peregrine size, but had slimmer, more flexible wings; a slimmer, more tapered body, and noticeably much longer tail; a rather insipid mousy-brown mantle (back and innerwings); very strongly dark-streaked whitish underparts with pale flanks and vent area, and an almost all-white head with some small pale fawny-coloured 'smudges'. Viewed from behind, the white rear crown showed some narrow black flecking, which together contrasted strongly with the mantle colour.

One big plus was the lack of 'jesses' on this bird. Falconers invariably apply jesses to captive falcons and the lack of these is a good indication that the bird was a genuine 'wanderer', most probably from the breeding grounds in Western Asia. There have been several sightings of a bird of this species -perhaps the same bird - up the east coast of England and Scotland during November and into December this year.

Thanks once again to all who have contributed their own sightings to us throughout the year. We always try to contact anyone who might be interested enough to see any of the unusual birds we come across, and if we make no effort to flag you down as we are peering across a loch or into a sycamore tree, please assume we have not seen anything of interest!



NORTH ISLES LANDSCAPE PARTNERSHIP SCHEME UP-DATE.

Hello,

The North Isles Landscape Partnership Scheme (NILPS) is an ongoing programme which is being coordinated by a steering group led by Orkney Islands Council. The LP Scheme is one of the main grant programmes offered by the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF). NILPS was originally conceived as an idea back in 2014 after the success of the Landscape Partnership Scheme based around the Scapa Flow area between 2009-2012 (http://www.scapaflow.co). Consultation events were held on the North Isles towards the end of the year with their findings used as a basis for submitting the NILPS round 1 application.

The steering group found out that the round 1 application had been successful towards the end of 2015 and were given permission to commence the round 2 (development) stage. This stage started back in April. The main work since then has involved various studies being undertaken by consultants. These have focussed on the North Isles' Historic Environment, Heritage Trails, Landscape and Seascape, Tourism, and Biodiversity. The studies are a requirement of the HLF process and will help identify the unique elements of the North Isles to demonstrate the area's eligibility for receiving a LP Scheme grant.

The studies will also help develop the initial project ideas identified back in 2014 and help inform potential projects to include in the round 2 application. The application will be submitted to the HLF towards the end of August 2017. We anticipate a decision being made around November/December 2017. If approved, NILPS would look to commence in early 2018 and run until 2022.

The studies will involve the identification of provisional walking and cycling trail for each island. Thanks to all of you who provided feedback to our consultant during the process. Further discussion around the proposed trails will be taking place soon as we look to incorporate a key trail for each of the populated North Isles into the scheme.

A Landscape and Seascape Study will involve a survey of the landscape and seascape of each island, outlining recommendations in response to the threats and opportunities posed in Isles distinct characteristics.

A Visitor and Marketing Study is also underway. As well as identifying priority projects for delivery in the North Isles during NILPS, the study will identify priority themes and produce a marketing strategy. The study will involve engagement with local tourism stakeholders and groups on the North Isles as well as collecting information on people's trips to the North Isles. Finally, a Biodiversity Study is also commencing. The study is being led by Nature Watch Orkney and will identify the wildlife and natural places that give each island its unique identity, and show how these form the character of the North Isles and its marine area. This will involve collating all the existing data about the species and habitats that occur in the North Isles. Also, a questionnaire asking for opinions about the most important wildlife features on your island has been produced. I do realise that the various processes involved in the HLF process have led to periods of activity and then inactivity. Unfortunately this is unavoidable as out application goes through the HLF system of review and assessment. I also note that your community has recently been inundated with people from out with your islands carrying out various studies, and that this will continue until the end of the year. I can only thank you for your patience and reiterate that these studies are an essential requirement of our ongoing HLF bid. The studies will also allow us to produce a strong application to the HLF, which will be submitted in August 2017. The studies will, once complete, be made available to the local communities. It is hoped that the various studies will provide information of interest and benefit to local groups.

I am now slowly starting to get around some of the islands (as time allows). A big thank you to those I have visited so far for your time. I do intend to try and arrange more visits in the future but as time moves rapidly on during this phase it is proving more difficult (August 2017 submission is getting closer and a lot of work to do behind the scenes!) However, if anyone has any queries regarding the ongoing development phase or about NILPS in general, please do not hesitate to get in touch. I will be only too happy to assist.
