THE FRESH NIGHTMARE THAT IS CLUB DELIVERY ...

We have been issued with scanners by Streamline for HERMES parcels. This will hopefully stop some of the issues where parcels scanned in Aberdeen trigger the automatic emails that tell customers their parcel has been delivered. But this is only HERMES, other couriers will still likely have the above issue.

When HERMES parcels reach Stronsay we will have to scan them in before any can be taken away from the shed, Jim is planning to do this as he unloads the lorry each night so there may be a delay before items can be taken. When he does this, it may well trigger an email stating that *'Your parcel is now with your local Hermes courier for delivery*'. This means the parcel is in the yard on Stronsay. These parcels can then be collected from the shed if you wish. If not, they will be taken round the island on the next delivery day (Wednesday or Friday).

As they are taken for delivery, they will be scanned again by the delivery person - which will (probably) trigger an email stating 'Hermes has successfully delivered your parcel'.

This system is not ideal, it likely works very well on the Orkney Mainland where one driver will be going about all day with only HERMES parcels - I'm not sure how will it will work here as there are lots of issues - like the scanners only working on Wifi as the EE mobile system they are designed for is not available on Stronsay. It may be that the emails to say things have been delivered etc do not get sent until the scanner is brought back to Millfield at night for updating on the home Wifi.

Also, as stated above, this is only for HERMES parcels - other parcels may well still inform you of a delivery when the parcel is still in Aberdeen - as we are the final courier this also often (confusingly) says signed for by J Holland Haulage - this is just a system generated message, and though it's really misleading does still mean the parcel is in Aberdeen.

The added complication is Hermes parcels that require a signature. These parcels can now no longer be left in the customers porch or taken from the yard as we have to get the customers signature on the hand-held scanner. If your parcel requires a signature and you are not available when it is delivered, it will be taken back to the yard and a card left informing you of this. The delivery person will then attempt a further 2 times on the next round. I will try and inform folk where I can, if I have a parcel on the list that will need a signature. Hopefully the majority are parcels won't need this.

It's a shame the system has had to be changed but we are having to follow the terms set by Hermes so that Streamline can carry on with the Hermes contract and get items out to the islands.

Clear as Mud? If you have issues or complaints about this system then Streamline Orkney are the people to contact (telephone 01856 873658) as they have the contract from Hermes. If you get an Email about a parcel delivery and are unsure about what it means then pass it to me and I can try and check where the parcel is on the system.

RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

In what has been a mainly cool Spring and no big influxes of migrants moving North, there have been a few surprises: a Wryneck seen by Kath and Norman in the Dale 'Quarry' by the Fire Station on 29th April; a drake American Wigeon and a Little Gull at the Matpow Loch on 5th May, and the most unexpected and dramatic — a Sea (White-tailed) Eagle on the Rothiesholm Moor on 9th May (see photo). All were fairly brief sightings — the eagle flying in off the sea, settling on the moor for 5 minutes or so, and then flying off out to sea. (The same bird was seen on Sanday the following day).

A good selection of small common migrants were then recorded in early May – mainly Chiffchaffs, Willow Warblers, and Lesser Whitethroats, the best sighting of all being a male Bluethroat which had flown into a window at the school. It was discovered on the ground by Andy Rose on 12th May (the prime date for the species in the UK) outside the Healthy Living Centre but had soon recovered and flew off never to be seen again! Unless......it was the same bird discovered dead at Grind by Alan and Gaynor Smith on 17th (see photo).

A small influx of migrants arrived on 20th, including PIed Flycatcher, Spotted Flycatcher, Lesser Whitethroats, Black Redstart, and best of all - an Icterine Warbler accompanied by a newly-arrived Chiffchaff in Raymond's garden at Ebenezer Cottage.

This Month's Featured Area - Osen and Bomasty Bay

The house at Osen is perfectly positioned for bird-watchers who enjoy 'seawatching', and the low hedges in the garden there attract a good number of migrant species in Spring and Autumn. The current resident - Dave Hudson - is a keen ornithologist and the 'garden list' there is growing year by year – the best so far being a small party of Crossbills, several Waxwings, Yellow-browed Warbler, and a few Ring Ouzels, the latter attracted to the large (1/2 acre) grassy 'paddock' adjacent to the shore. The new flower beds and small vegetable patches are also a great attraction for hungry insect-eating migrants in the area, whilst the sheltered road along the shoreline is one of the best sites to see Brambling in Autumn, and Twite and Rock Pipit for much of the year. There have been several sightings of Red-backed Shrike in Spring, and Eiders regularly drink from the small stream which runs into the sea close to the house. Bluethroat and Wryneck have also been seen by the roadside there and in October 2004 a major UK rarity was found fly -catching among the hay-bales stored by the shore – a Swainson's Thrush which had probably just flown the Atlantic Ocean! The only island record of Crag Martin – seen by Joyce Males and myself – flew along the road past Osen around mid-day on 3rd May 1999.

The sheltered waters of Bomasty Bay have turned up several surprises including a total of 3 Grey Phalaropes close inshore, whilst in stormy weather it is the best place on the island to look for Sooty and Manx Shearwaters, and Stormy and Leach's Petrels. 2 Little Shearwaters have been recorded there and a single (adult in Spring!) Long-tailed Skua.

The Red-throated Divers which breed on Rothiesholm feed in the area throughout the Summer, and Great Northern Divers are regularly seen off-shore in Winter. Hundreds of Gannets may be seen passing through the Stronsay Firth during rough weather.

For 'all-round' bird-watching the Osen is possibly the best house on the island!

STEPHEN CLACKSON'S LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE



The Council Offices at School Place, Kirkwall

I am indebted to the 197 voters who placed me 1st on their ballot paper, beholden to the 118 people who put me 2nd, obliged to the 103 individuals who made me their 3rd choice, grateful to the 26 souls for whom I was their 4th preference, thank the 15 who gave me a 5, am appreciative of the 17 persons who wrote a 6 next to my name and the 14 who marked me 7th, and acknowledge the 39 folk who ranked me at number eight. Which means, after all the calculations, transfers and exclusions, I got back in with 321.92191 votes—such is the crazy Single Transferable Vote system (the blame for which lies with the Local Governance (Scotland) Act 2004).

Since the election, councillors, both old and new, have been solidly undergoing fullon "induction", in which we are lectured about our roles and responsibilities, governance, council structures, services and committees, standards and ethics, etc., etc.

On the morning of Tuesday 16th May, following the blessing of the new Council by the Revd Fraser Macnaughton, we held our first proper meeting, the Statutory General Meeting, at which Harvey Johnston was appointed Convener (now a purely ceremonial role) and James Stockan the Leader (a political role). Chairs of committees and certain other appointments were also decided at this meeting. I have been appointed to the board of Orkney Ferries Ltd, am staying on the Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board, and I am expanding my portfolio of council experience with a seat on the Orkney Health & Care Committee. I was unopposed to continue as OIC's representative on the UHI Foundation and on the Highlands & Islands Science Skills Academy Leadership Board and to represent the Council on the Scottish Councils Committee on Radioactive Substances and the Dounreay Stakeholder Group. Unexpectedly, I was also appointed to the Council of Society of Friends of St Magnus Cathedral.

It was a pleasant change, the next day, to get out of School Place and attend the Norwegian Constitution Day events and take part in the Tog, at which I got to carry an (albeit small) Norwegian flag in the procession. The next day it was back to "induction", which will continue almost up until the end of May.

Last year, following initial discussions at a Sanday Parent Council meeting, I persuaded OIC to offer the former Harbour Master's House at Kettletoft to the Sanday community before putting it on the open market. I am pleased to say it has now been purchased by the Sanday Development Trust, who will be renovating it to become a "gateway house" for the island.

I have set up a dedicated website at <u>lfsp.pbworks.com</u> where the current issue and back numbers of "Letter from School Place" are available for downloading.

Here's to the next five years ...

A CHANCE TO GET INVOLVED IN THE BATTLE AGAINST FUEL POVERTY

Fuel Poverty in Orkney is the worst in Scotland and isles – like Stronsay – are amongst the most affected by it.

Over the past 15 months the Tackling Household Affordable Warmth (THAW) Group in Kirkwall's Victoria Street has been at the forefront of the drive to overturn that damning statistic by enabling energy efficiency works, worth over £500,000 to be progressed in over 400 Orkney households.

Now, with the assistance of grants from businesses, benefactors and community organisations on the isles and the Orkney Mainland, the group is trying to formulate a bid that could bring in an additional £340,000 work over the forthcoming year.

THAW will hold its 2nd AGM in Kirkwall Town Hall on June 15th at 7pm when they will explain their plans for the year ahead and be pleased to hear the views of those in the North Isles who are interested in fuel poverty as well as those who have benefitted from the work undertaken so far.

The guest speaker at the event will be Di Alexander – the man appointed by Scottish Ministers as the independent chair of the Scottish Rural Fuel Poverty Task Force who also chairs the Highlands and Islands Housing Associations Affordable Warmth Group.

THAW Chairman Robert Leslie said: "Di Alexander has been championing the case to treat areas such as Orkney differently when it comes to energy efficiency programmes aiming at bringing affordable warmth to folk, as the issues we face are not the same as those in urban areas of the Central Belt. His message – backed by many working to tackle fuel poverty in the Highlands and Islands – is starting to be listened to. I would encourage folk to come and hear it for themselves."







NORTH ISLES LANDSCAPE PARTNERSHIP SCHEME DEVELOPMENT PHASE UPDATE – NO 6.

Hello,

As I write this update on the North Isles Landscape Partnership Scheme (NILPS) we are in mid-May. The main development with NILPS since the last newsletter was the meeting with the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) at the end of April. The meeting went well and they were pleased to see how the scheme and associated projects are being developed. However, based on the work still to be done the submission date has been pushed back until mid/end of October. From my own perspective this allows more time to complete the required works as part of the NILPS submission to the HLF and is generally welcome. It will impact very slightly on the timescales of the scheme, as a decision on the application will now be made in February 2018 as opposed to November/December 2017. However, in order to allow time to produce all of the documents required the slight change to timescales will not impact massively on the 5 year programme.

As the development phase is now over the half way mark, the majority of the project studies are completed. There are still a few to be done, whose details are highlighted below:

The additional works to the Historic Environment study, coordinated by my colleague Tom Hunter, is nearing completion. We have acquired a local surveyor (Billy Groundwater) to do some surveys and costs for us as we develop projects further.

The contract for the Monitoring and Evaluation of NILPS has recently been awarded to Resources for Change (www.r4c.org.uk/index.html). A workshop will be held on the 18th May with North Isles representatives present. Notes on the outcome of this workshop will be available in due course.

The Branding, Graphics and Website Development for NILPS have been awarded to Resolve Creative (www.resolve-creative.co.uk), in conjunction with NB Communications (www.nbcommunication.com/locations/orkney). The branding of LP Schemes is deemed very important, with the development of a logo and associated graphics one of the main outputs from this exercise. Although the final works are to be discussed, we anticipate the consultants will look to actively engage with local communities and (possibly) the local schools during the process of developing the identity for the scheme.

With regard to project briefs, these have now been developed. If anyone would like a copy of the full project briefs please get back to me and I can send them on. My contact details are shown at the end of this update.

So, despite the additional time, my priority will still be to produce the LCAP as well as developing the projects we intend to deliver under NILPS during the 5 year scheme.
