## A LOCUM MINISTER FOR STRONSAY'S KIRK

My name is Ali Pandian and I am delighted to be coming to Stronsay to be a locum minister at the Church of Scotland church for five weeks over the summer holidays. Bruce asked me to write a wee piece by way of introduction so here goes!...

I live in West Lothian with my husband, Dave, two daughters Maisie and Isla and hen Flower (we did have four but they've been dying off one by one!). For the last six years I have been training to be a minister with the Church of Scotland. This involved a Divinity degree at Edinburgh University, several placements and a 19 month probation at the end in Abercorn linked with Pardovan, Kingscavil and Winchburgh, which are also in West Lothian. Much of this has been done part-time as the children were only two and four when I started. I have always felt drawn to chaplaincy so two of my placements were in this setting, the first at Polmont Young Offenders Institute and the second with the chaplain at Rachel House, a hospice for babies, children and young people with life limiting conditions. I found my training challenging, exciting and surprising. My favourite subjects were definitely to do with Pastoral Care, though I did also enjoy Hebrew (much to my surprise!).

We have not always lived in West Lothian. Dave and I met in Liverpool, where we both lived initially for studying at university but then liked it so much we stayed. We were married there and the girls are 'scousers' (though you wouldn't think it to listen to them now!) so Liverpool will always have a special place in our hearts. We left there to begin my enquiry process with the Church of Scotland and the rest, as they say, is history.

As a family we enjoy being outside, swimming, playing games, cycling, baking and watching plays or films together. The girls are particularly keen on music, reading and arts and crafts.

So how come we've ended up in Stronsay over the summer, I hear you ask? Well, when I was coming to the end of my probation back in April we had no idea what was next. But we recognised that it was a time of enquiry when we would need to be considering prayerfully what lay ahead for our family. We wondered about the possibility of a summer placement of some kind while the girls were off school to explore the future in a different context and to experience parish ministry without being on placement. I have a friend, David McNeish, who is the minister at Milestone Community Church on the mainland. He put me in touch with the Presbytery Clerk for Orkney, the person who has oversight of all the Church of Scotland churches. He, in turn, put me in touch with the Interim Moderator, Sheila Garson, who spoke to the Kirk Session and (I'm glad to say) they agreed to us coming for five weeks. Dave will be with us for the first fortnight and then my parents are coming with my brother and his wife, so you'll possibly meet the whole gang! Elsie Dennison has been very helpful in all the planning and is kindly meeting us off the ferry when we arrive.

As it turns out, I have just heard that I have a permanent job to return to, working for the NHS as a trainee healthcare chaplain. This is a real answer to prayer and fits in well with my previous experience, my sense of call, and our family life. So we are pleased we can now enjoy spending time with you on Stronsay, knowing what is coming next.

If you or anyone you know on the island might benefit from a pastoral visit over my time here, please do get in touch. And it'd be great to see you in church too, whether you're there every week, or it's your first time, or the first time in a long time. We look forward to meeting you.

#### **RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS**

July is generally the 'quietest' month as regards uncommon sightings and this period has run true to form in 2017 – so far. A Quail has been heard calling at Airy on a few occasions – bursts of the 'liquid' 'Wet-my-lips' call heard by ourselves and Hazel near the 'Hescombe Corner' and a very won – bleached and many feathers missing - female Hen Harrier was seen at Grind on 7th July. Swallows appear to be doing very well this year but the Sand Martins deserted the colonies in Mill Bay during the spell of cold NE winds in early Summer. On the plus side, a small colony of Sand Martins has taken up residence in the cliff-face at Bomasty Bay.

There has been a sudden welcome return to former years in the number of Curlews and other species following the silage and hay cutters in mid-summer. Oystercatchers too have been very numerous, assisted by the ever present Starlings and gulls in gobbling up any invertebrates which appear among the recently cut crops. It is no coincidence that there has been a noticeable and welcome decrease in the numbers of Greylag Geese this summer.

Autumn is not far away and there have been signs of a few waders moving south. More to come next month! Thanks for all the calls. John Holloway.

#### This Month's Featured Area: Lower Whitehall

This quiet corner of the island has several different features and has played host to a long list of uncommon and rare species as well as many resident species and regular visitors. The beaches are a great attraction to Snow Buntings in Winter – particularly the ridge near the old pier, and Whimbrel have wintered along the shoreline by Ebenezer Cottage. Off-shore, Red-breasted Merganser are seen regularly and Goldeneye are recorded in the channel some Winters. A Great Blue Heron (American species) was seen along the shoreline in January 2012 (see photo). Sadly the Common Seal colony resident in the area for several decades was decimated by Killer Whales some years ago and has yet to recover.

Back on land, the area is 'first-fall' for tired migrants arriving from the east and north-east. An exhausted Crossbill landed on Richard Groat's lobster-boat some years ago – less than half a mile from land – but had soon recovered and flew off towards the gardens in Lower Whitehall. Later that day, whilst looking for Richard's bird, we discovered a party of five Crossbills in the Erraid Station garden and then others across the island.

The first Arctic Redpoll of the huge influx into the UK in November 1995 was found feeding among the low weeds near the old pier, and Wheatears are regularly seen in this area during migration (see photo). A few Red-backed Shrikes have been recorded in this same open area, using the tall weeds as 'look-out' posts. Inland and closer to the village, former residents Paul Miller and Robbie Rendall alerted us to a calling Spotted Crake near Minerva in 1989. A Black-eared Wheatear spent several days feeding by the roadside between Mirland and Feastown in late October 2001 - another major rarity in Great Britain (see photo) More recently, Breda Miller heard a Cuckoo (quite rare here) calling from Glenmanna. (This bird was heard – and seen – later, in the village).

The last 'complex' of gardens attract most of the small migrant species arriving on the Grice Ness peninsula during migration in both Spring and Autumn, the most common being Goldcrests and Chiffchaffs, but there is also an almost staggering list of uncommon and rare species which have been found amongst the small trees and shrubs. These include Olivaceous Warbler ( the only island record – see photo), Melodious and Icterine Warblers; Pallas's Warbler (2 years running!), several Yellow-browed Warblers; Wryneck, Waxwing and Rosefinch, and a Grasshopper Warbler in the garden at nearby Feastown – the latter exceptionally rare in the Northern Isles. A Cirl Bunting feeding in the road outside Ebenezer cottage was another major surprise in late October 1994.

But the most memorable sighting occurred in the open cultivated area in the plot between Erraid Station and Ebenezer Cottage in May 2002. Myself and former island resident John Fiddler were kneeling by the low wall between the plot and the road, gazing at a beautiful male Bluethroat through our binoculars which were resting neatly on the flagstone top. We were suddenly joined by one of the recently arrived Monks of Papa Stronsay who quietly knelt down beside us and politely asked what we were looking at!

He was encouraged to see his family, friends and supporters who were there along the route and at the finishing line, and thanks to all the local community for their support also.

The day was well organised and he particularly liked the camaraderie amongst fellow runners in the marathon, as well as the runners in the 10k and 5k races. Congratulations also to Mairi and Millie Dennison and Dan and Sam Whiteman for completing the 5k course.







## **STRONSAY'S NEW POST OFFICE**

89 year old Eddie Cooper cut the ribbon when Stronsay's Post Office reopened on Tuesday 27 June in its new home at Ebenezer Stores. Eddie was a postman on Stronsay for 46 years, beginning when he left school aged 14 and made his round using a pony & cart as well as walking many miles every day. After Eddie had cut the ribbon the new Post Office sign was unveiled by Emily Carr and Shae Seaton.

The Post Office's previous home was in Fagerheim for over 70 years but the recent sale of the property meant that a new home was needed. The process of transferring the business took Mike & Viv Erdman around 8 months and during the actual change-over there was no Post Office service for almost a week. Mike & Viv thank everyone on Stronsay for their support and for their patience during this time.



#### PROMOTING STRONSAY - PROGRESS UPDATE

#### From the Promoting Stronsay Group on behalf of the Community Council and Development Trust

The key design elements for promoting Stronsay have been completed by Ignition, the Edinburgh marketing company who visited Stronsay for several days in February. These include a logo, a style of writing and photography and a strap line which describes Stronsay in 5 words. Ignition have also written a 25 word version and a longer version for our use in all future publicity.

The reason we need these is that to make anything memorable, the message has to be consistent: repetition is key. A search of literature and websites showed that Stronsay was mentioned with so many different styles that it was hard to know the same island was being referred to.

The Vat of Kirbister is often the only attraction mentioned on Stronsay. In the last few years we have had many developments like;

- ... the Storehouse B&B
- ... the Fishmart
- … Craftship Enterprise
- ... several craft businesses

... most of these do not appear on visitor information leaflets or websites. Very little is mentioned about all our other facilities such as shops, post office, healthy living, swimming pool etc.

Both Radio Orkney and VisitOrkney have been out in the last couple of weeks to do features on Stronsay as a direct result of contact with Ignition and the "Promoting Stronsay group. The new website content, all the words and photos have been managed by Ignition and we are just waiting for Orcadia, the Mainland web designer, to finish constructing the website. A brochure is being designed which brings together in one place everything that is good about Stronsay.

To gain extra publicity we will be having an official launch of the "new look" Stronsay. This will involve the press, local radio and all the visitor websites such as VisitOrkney and VisitScotland. This again will be managed by Ignition.

The group would like Stronsay residents to be the first to see this "new look" so we will be organising a preview event a day or two before the official launch.

As soon as the website is finished we will be able to set a date for this meeting and the launch, so will be back in touch soon.
