RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

Yes, it happened again – immediately after last month's Limpet publication deadline several interesting species arrived on the island including a MIstle Thrush at Dale, a Grey Wagtail by the Mill Stream bridge, and a Redpoll at Scoulters. Further new arrivals were seen next day (24th Oct) including a Mealy Redpoll by the Mill Stream (see photo). a Goldfinch briefly near Millbank, and a Water Rail in the garden at Gesty Dishes. But overall there were less migrant birds on the island, many of the thrushes (including Blackbirds) which had arrived earlier in the month having moved on.

A surprise find in Lower Whitehall was a party of Redpolls on 25th (see photos) - at least one of which was an Arctic - but they flew off and were not seen again. A Ring Ouzel was present for several days in the Sound/Gesty Dishes area in late October/early November (see photo).

Very few migrants remained by 27th – just a few Redwings and the odd Fieldfare and Song Thrush but two Stonechats seen regularly by Norman in the Dale/Matpow area were still present well into the second half of November. A small party of Chaffinches and sixty or so Linnets have taken up residence in the unharvested seed-crop at Dale this Winter.

A pair of Goldeneye joined the Wigeon and Teal on the Matpow Loch in late October but the biggest surprise at the end of the month was a Blue Tit, discovered by John and Tara in the Lower Millfield garden – just the tenth island record of this familiar garden bird elsewhere in the UK. An injured Short-eared Owl was discovered by Sheila at Helmsley on 31st. It had a broken wing and after a quick examination and a trip to show the bird to the schoolchildren we handed it over to Jean and Paul at Glenmanna. (The bird is still thriving, being fed mainly on donated dead mice etc etc).

The Blue Tit had soon found the feeders in our garden at Castle and thanks to Hazel and Norman's regular feeding whilst we were away between 8th and 24th November, the bird is still making regular – if erratic visits. (See photo)

Other interesting sightings in early November were a Barnacle Goose at Gesty, a Sparrowhawk near Haygam, a Buzzard seen by David at Osen, a Greenfinch seen by Clare at Gesty Dishes, a Woodcock seen by Norman at Dale, and a Peregrine at Castle. There have also been several sightings of Hen Harriers and a few of Merlin.

There have been two amazing sightings while we were away – a male Snowy Owl seen by Pato Denison on 19th (and later by daughter Elaine) at Hundi (Odiness Road), and a Snow Goose seen by Kath and Norman at Dale on 24th. We must learn to take our holidays at a more sensible time of year!

Just seen today (26th): Clare and Ant (Gesty Dishes) have reported seeing a Snow Bunting on the beach below Banks. There must be others elsewhere!

SAIL INTO THE NEW YEAR WITH AN OLD CALENDAR

Remember the halcyon days when governments were willing to fund vessels for Orkney's internal ferry fleet? Did you save a 1990 calendar to commemorate the arrival of the new *Earl Sigurd* and *Earl Thorfinn* and the departure of the old *Orcadia*? Or, indeed, did you save a calendar to celebrate the *Orcadia* coming into service in 1962? If you did, never mind that the current Scottish Government refuses to cough up the cash for new ferries, because at least you won't be needing to cough up any cash for a new calendar for 2018.

King George V was the first British monarch to send congratulatory telegrams to centenarians, as he surely will have to Barbara Peace in 1923 (born Wilson at Skaill in Sanday). She celebrated her 100th birthday in England, so maybe the relatives remaining in Orkney retained that year's calendar as a consolation. If they still have it, it can be a consolation again, as they won't now need to purchase a 2018 one.

The King started this telegram tradition in 1917, the same year as he came to Orkney to view the British Grand Fleet in Scapa Flow—an event worthy of preserving a calendar for. Hang it on the wall in 2018 to commemorate the centenary of the interning in Scapa Flow of the German High Seas Fleet.

If it's the Second World War you are more interested in, the 1945 calendar stored among your "victory" memorabilia can be brought back into use again in 2018. So can the souvenir 1951 "Festival of Britain" calendar.

Suffering from Brexit blues? Then find the 1973 calendar you put away to mark the UK's accession to the EEC. We may be leaving now, but that calendar will be good for 2018.

Calendars from the last year of the 19th century (1900) and the first year of the 21st (2001) can adorn the sideboard in 2018, as can calendars from 1906, 1934 and 2007 (which anyone heeding my advice back then will have kept).

1979 was the year Orkney overwhelmingly voted against a Scottish Assembly. Given that UK governments have been more generous with funding our ferries than Scottish ones, maybe you want to put that calendar back on display in the New Year.

Don't forget to hang onto your 2017 calendar for reuse in 2023.

Scottish Fuel Poverty Statement.

The definition of fuel poverty in Scotland is: 'A household is in fuel poverty if, in order to maintain a satisfactory heating regime, it would be required to spend more than 10% of its income (including Housing Benefit or Income Support for Mortgage Interest) on all household fuel use

The Stronsay Development Trust wishes to help relieve poverty by providing financial assistance towards home electricity costs with a grant of £150 paid directly to the domestic electricity provider via the account or key card.

Under the restrictions placed on the trust by charity laws, grants will not be available for businesses, second homes or holiday lets.

Applicants must be the bill payer and a full-time resident of Stronsay and there can only be one application per bill payer.

You will not be asked for any personal financial details other than the name of your domestic electricity supplier, together with your ref/account number, but you will need to sign the declaration confirming that you are in fuel poverty.

Application Forms will be available at the Post Office, and online via the SDT website and the Limpet

All applications should be returned to the Trust registered office by 14th December 2017

Work Continues on getting the Enterprise Zone ready for its grand opening with Planning and organising of the Heritage Centre still underway.

An invitation is still open to all those interested in the Island's heritage to get in touch to discuss being part of this ongoing project, I would also like to ask for feedback and suggestions as to what people would like to see in the heritage centre.

I am looking for volunteers who would like to be part of the cataloguing of artefacts currently in storage so please let me know if this is of interest.

I will also be holding regular drop in days for anyone wishing to come along help catalogue, have a chat about life on Stronsay and enjoy a cuppa. Look out for updates on when these will take place in the new year.

I previously spoke about a project that was run with researchers from the University of Aberdeen who were conducting a radio workshop with kids from the school and community groups. What a great activity, I have finally received the completed podcasts which are great and you should be very proud of the children on Stronsay, we will hopefully soon have dates for us to listen to them on Orkney radio but For now you can find them at the following link: https://soundcloud.com/media-education/sets/unheard-of

Further work has been done on the **Housing Needs Project** and this should be ready for community consultation in early 2018.



STEPHEN CLACKSON'S LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

In regard to his statements about not funding our ferries (contradictory to his claim to "believe in a fairer Scotland"), I wrote to the Scottish Minister for Transport and the Islands, Mr Humza Yousaf, copying the letter (see below) to each of the political party leaders in the Scottish Parliament and to our own MSP and MP, among others. This was reported in the 9th November issue of *The Orcadian* (page 3), following my interview on the subject with BBC Radio Orkney broadcast on "Around Orkney" on the 7th.



Although I have received acknowledgements from the offices of some of the party leaders, and a substantive response from Alistair Carmichael MP, I have yet to hear from the Minister himself. I would urge members of the North Isles' public to write their own letters to Mr Yousaf, because the situation for us in the North Isles is going to become dire without the same level of financial support that the Scottish Government is generous enough to lavish on other island groups in their so-called "fairer" Scotland. Agriculture, commerce, food supplies, healthcare, education—all depend on our life-line ferry service.

I have found the last month somewhat "education rich", with me attending meetings of the Orkney College Management Council (including a self-evaluation workshop); the College Management Council Quality Sub-Group (to which I was recently appointed); the Education, Leisure & Housing Committee, plus a meeting with the Director of the Highlands & Islands Science Skills Academy (in my role as OIC's representative on its leadership board). At the University of the Highlands & Islands Foundation, I enquired, now the University has been granted research-degree-awarding powers, whether academic dress has been designed for the new degrees (e.g. doctorates). I was informed it has been, and my suggestion that an academic-dress identification leaflet be produced for those attending graduation ceremonies was met with enthusiasm.

Other meetings I have been to include: members' sessions (including a political session with our constituency MSP, Liam McArthur); a briefing session on the *Islands Deal*; a seminar on general data protection; a meeting of the Orkney Health & Care Committee, and a meeting of the Monitoring & Audit Committee which concluded its business in only 4 minutes!

It was good to get back into the swing of community council meetings again with attendance at both Sanday's and Shapinsay's, and I was in Stronsay for the AGM of their development trust. In Sanday, I was also involved in the HMIE inspection of Community Learning and Development.

Scottish Natural Heritage gave councillors a presentation on the Orkney Native Wildlife Project, which is concerned with the eradication of stoats from Orkney. On the 20th November, I was featured in *Holyrood* magazine's "Politicians & their Pets" with our pet polecat ferret, Haze. She is kept safely indoors, well away from the native wildlife and non-native poultry (though, actually, she prefers to eat pork!).
