150 EDITIONS!

This is the 150th edition of the Stronsay Limpet and it will be the 104th edition of the Limpet that I have edited. Yvonne & Heather created the Stronsay Limpet back in 2005 as a means to distribute information that was useful to the island's residents—notices of forthcoming events, reports of events that had taken place, sales & wants, greetings, etc., as well as articles & photographs that would be of interest to folk who had lived on Stronsay but had moved away. They used a standard deskjet printer to print the first few editions and hand-delivered them to every household on Stronsay.

However, thanks to generous support from various folk including the late Dr George McKay they soon acquired two laser printers (one for colour and the other for black & white) which could print on both sides of the paper, and distribution was through the good offices of Olivebank, Ebenezer Stores and what was then the Post Office.

The Limpet grew in size from 3 or 4 single-sided sheets to well over 10 double-sided sheets and it soon began to take up more and more of the two ladies' spare time. The Limpet almost ceased publication a few years ago but, being retired, I had spare time and I had a background in computing so I volunteered to take over the task—it was a steep learning curve! And I suspect that Malcolm & Paul may have had second thoughts about taking on the task of moving the two very heavy laser printers up the stairs to a spare bedroom at Claremont.

When the laser printers eventually failed the task of printing was passed to the Orcadian printshop. All that I have to do nowadays is to collate the information that is sent to me, squeeze it into an even number of pages and email it to the Orcadian printshop. When Jim Holland delivers the printed copies to Claremont I just count them out and hand them over to the Olivebank & Ebenezer Stores together with a distribution list, plus one copy to the waiting room at Geramount surgery.

I confess that sometimes I do "lean" on people to write something or ask if someone wants to use the Limpet's vast resources to advertise their event. Please remember that advertising in the Limpet is FREE for local businesses & for local charity events; and it's always a pleasure to receive a report (with photographs if possible) of an event that has been advertised in the Limpet.

The Limpet became available online a few years ago and nowadays it has its own website and Facebook page, readers can also sign up to receive occasional informative emails from the Limpet. One effect of making the Limpet available online and producing a brand new distribution list for printed copies this year has been to reduce the print run to just 70 including 2 postal subscribers, a far cry from the situation ten years ago when the print run was well over 200 (all printed at Claremont on those two laser printers!). This included over 40 postal subscriptions which had to be put into envelopes with a covering letter; the envelope then had to be sealed, and a return address label & postage stamp affixed, a task undertaken by my late wife along with careful proof-reading of the draft version.

Thank you to everyone who has contributed photographs, articles, poems or cartoons to the Limpet over the last 12 years and a special thank you to the Stronsay Development Trust who subsidise the Limpet's printing.

LATEST BIRD SIGHTINGS

With migration for most species over, November and December can be very quiet but there have been a few surprises as usual – a Snow Goose discovered by Kath and Norman on 24th November (possibly the same bird as the one seen last year several times around this time) and a Woodcock flying up from close to the road in front of Anthony and Clare between Sound and Lower Dishes on 28th. We were surprised to find the Blue Tit still coming to the feeders in our own garden (thanks to Hazel Norman for topping up the feeders while we were away) and it is still here as I write - Sun 17th.

The biggest surprise came on 2nd December! We were treated (?) at first light to the sight of a Merlin eating a Starling outside the kitchen window (see photo), and before lunch took Joyce from Park Cottage to try to find the elusive Snow Goose - and eventually we did! But even better was to come! Whilst driving home, Sue and I were startled by a large unfamiliar – Jay-sized – bird flying up from the short lawned area adjacent to the garage at Lower Millfield. We had excellent views for just 8-10 seconds as it first spring up from the short grass alongside us, over the hedge at Millburn Cottage and off towards Castle. We were completely stumped but certain it was a species neither of us had seen before. A bird springing up in that fashion here in winter is almost always either a Snipe or a Woodcock but this bird was less bulky than Woodcock and too big for Snipe and although the pattern on the upper-parts (including the inner-wing) were a similar 'blackbarred dark brown' its bill was far too short and its 'fanned, rounded-tipped tail' too long for Woodcock. The colour was clearly wrong for Jay but the size, wing-shape and proportions similar. The main feature however was the startling white rump - a square-sided rectangle - longer than it was broad - which positively gleamed at us and probably why our minds went immediately to Jay as it rose from the ground

We searched the internet but were finally pointed in the right direction by an old friend - Tony Hulls – who had lived in the United States for 12 years or so.'Sounds like a Northern Flicker to me' he suggested. Within a few seconds we had discovered page after page of photos of the species on the computer and there was now no doubt in our minds – it was a Northern Flicker!

A day or so later we popped in to Helmsley to tell Mike and Sheila of our sighting. Sheila's eyes lit up – 'Ah... the 'Flicker-bird' she smiled – 'I've seen those in our daughter's garden in North America! Not only that – she disappeared into a back room for a few seconds and when she emerged, presented me with a wing-feather of the species she had picked up whilst there some years ago!

There have been 3 or 4 records of the species in the UK – all found dead on or near the shoreline (one in Caithness) and all idling in the category of 'ship-assisted' species. If our bird was ship-assisted it did at least make land-fall!



This Month's featured Area – the Bu Loch.

Yes – just 'the Bu Loch' this month, perhaps the best stretch of water in the whole of the UK for attracting unusual migrant 'wading birds' in late Summer and early Autumn. The water level is generally at its lowest at this time, when an amazing number may be found feeding around the water's edge. The water is often no more than three inches deep across the whole area. The lochside vegetation has also played host to a number of unusual nesting species including Garganey and Water Rail, and there is at least one historical record of Red-necked Phalaropes breeding.

In Winter the loch is generally full of water and is ideal for a whole range of ducks and geese, but it is the species total of trans-Atlantic and Siberian vagrants which have been recorded in late summer which catches the eye, and given the proximity of the two most favoured areas in which to feed – both alongside the public road – close views can be obtained with little effort! Leaving the car can have disastrous consequences for the observer!

The number of common waders builds up in late summer and these attract other species which may be flying over during migration. Some may visit the loch for a short time and others stay for several days, the latter very helpful, as occasional individuals may take some time to identify - including the Least Sandpiper of July this year! No doubt there are more to come.










STEPHEN CLACKSON'S LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

I have now received a reply from Mr Humza Yousaf, Scottish Minister for Transport & the Islands, to my letter about Orkney's place in the "fairer Scotland". In his reply he claims "the Scottish Government has treated local government very fairly" (sic), repeats that "responsibility for internal ferries remains with the local authority" and studiously avoids addressing my question about "where, exactly, we fit into your 'fairer' Scotland". As you will have heard through the media, a lot has been going on to try and secure the ferry funding we deserve. OIC has been in intensive negotiations. And our MSP, Liam McArthur, supported by Shetland MSP, Tavish Scott, moved a debate in the Scottish Parliament calling on the Scottish Government to set out how it intends to honour its "commitments in relation to Orkney and Shetland internal ferry services", at which Mr Yousaf's Government amendment was defeated, sending a clear message from the opposition parties declaring what they expect the ministers to do. As Conservative MSP, Jamie Halcro-Johnston said: "Those who live on the islands that make up the Northern Isles deserve reliable and sustainable ferry services." Tavish wound up the debate by saying something that has long needed voicing in public: "When a part of Scotland does not vote for the SNP, rejects independence, that is not a reason for political, economic or financial discrimination"! Nevertheless, in its draft budget, Government Scotland has stuck to its discriminatory policy. I am preparing a response to Mr Yousaf's reply to me, in which I shall make clear that, as Scottish Minister for Transport & the Islands, he is responsible for all Scottish islands, not only those in areas that have elected members of his own political party, and that such blatant discriminatory behaviour by a party in government is utterly unacceptable in a civilised, democratic society.

This month, I have been travelling a lot, representing OIC on various bodies they've appointed me to: to Inverness for a meeting of the Highlands & Islands Science Skills Academy Leadership Board, to Edinburgh for my first meeting of the Scottish Councils Committee on Radioactive Substances, to Thurso for a meeting of the Dounreay Stakeholder Group, and, on behalf of the Orkney College Management Council, back to Inverness for an all-day University of the Highlands & Islands strategy workshop. Whilst in Edinburgh, I took the opportunity to visit the Scottish Parliament:



In the chamber of the Scottish Parliament (flanked by my Caithnessian bodyguards)

Back in Orkney, I have attended a meeting of the Policy & Resources Committee (where I requested—as I have at meetings of the Education, Leisure & Housing and Orkney Health & Care committees—that recruitment & retention monitoring reports also include figures for non-permanent staff); the General Meeting rounding off the last committee cycle of 2017, and a chairing training session. I was also at a meeting with Police Scotland's new Area Commander for Orkney, Chief Inspector Matt Webb, at which I spoke about the challenges of policing in the Isles and stressed the importance of good community relations and active, friendly engagement with members of the Isles' public.

Now the National Union of Rail, Maritme and Transport Workers (RMT) has backed industrial action at Orkney Ferries, life will become much more difficult for everyone living in the Isles, but I doubt it will have any impact where it really matters—in Holyrood. Were they to call the Edinburgh bus and tram drivers out on strike, then maybe the message might get through!

Let us hope that 2018 will bring a resolution to our ferry problem. The alternative is too catastrophic to contemplate.

STRONSAY PORK

We are pleased to announce that Stronsay Outdoor reared Pork will be available mid to late January. Initially with tasty pork from Saddleback/Pietrain/Micro crosses that have had a happy outdoor life and plenty of back scratches and belly rubs.

The delicious pork is available as a whole pig for £5.50 per kg with the pork expected to weigh around 50kg, it will be butchered and by default it will be head, offal and trotter less. If you are interested in a whole pig please contact me as soon as possible. Half pigs will also be available.

There will also be an assortment of different joints at different weights. I unfortunately will not know the weights of the different joints until they are butchered:

- Tenderloin at £9 per kg
- Spare ribs at £4 per kg
- Shank at £5.50 per kg
- Belly Pork £8 per kg
- Leg joints at £7 per kg
- Shoulder Joints at £7 per kg
- Trotters at £3 per kg
- Loin chops or Joints (order in advance) at £7 per kg
- Liver at £3 per kg

Other joints and cuts may be available.

They will be slaughtered and butchered in Kirkwall and will be brought over to the island in refrigerated boxes and can be collected from us that evening or the next day. Or delivered to your house that evening or the next day for with a 50p charge for purchases under £20. After that it will be frozen and some joints will still be available for the next few months.

Happy Christmas and New Year to all our customers and friends

Free Pattern NB: you can use any yarn as size is not critical

Materials:

- 1 skein Caron International's Simply Soft yarn in Green
- · 1 skein Caron International's Simply Soft yarn in Red
- DMC Gold Glitter thread in Dark Sage (MC), Autumn Red (CC), and Gold (held together with CC) (optional)
- US 8 (5 mm) knitting needles or size to obtain gauge
- Yam Needle
- Split-ring stitch marker or safety pin
- 14" Pillow Form
- 3 buttons 3/4" diameter
- 1/2 yard dark green fabric, for lining pillow cover (optional)

Abbreviations and Stitches Used:

- k1-f/b (increase): Knit next st, then knit it through the back loop.
- k2tog (decrease): Knit 2 sts together through the front loops.
- Stockinette stitch (St st): Knit on RS, purl on WS.
- Seed stitch (Seed st): Row 1 (RS): *K1, p1; repeat from * across. Row 2: Knit the
 purl sts and purl the knit sts as they face you. Repeat Row 2 for Seed st.

Instructions:

Pillow measures approximately 14"

Pillow cover is worked using MC in Stockinette stitch, and lined (if desired); Bow and Sash are worked separately in Seed stitch, using CC and a strand of gold Glitter held together. Pillow Cover (Make 2)

- 1 Using MC, cast on 50 sts.
- 2 (RS) Begin St st; work even until piece measures 14" from beginning.
- 3. Bind off all sts.
- 4. With RS's of Pillow pieces facing each other, sew pieces together along 3 sides.
- Lining (optional): Cut 2 pieces of fabric 15" square, or size to fit Pillow Cover pieces plus 1/2" on all sides for seam allowance. With RS's of Lining pieces facing each

- other, sew pieces together along 3 sides. Insert Lining into Pillow Cover, with WS's facing each other.
- 6 Pillow Form: Insert form into Pillow cover; turn under seam allowance on lining, sew edge. Sew remaining edge of Pillow cover neatly together.

Ribbon Sash

- 1 Using CC (and Gold Glitter, if desired), cast on 32 sts.
- 2 Begin Seed st; work even for 2 rows.
- Buttonhole Rows: (RS)Continuing in Seed st, work 3 button holes across, having 5 sts at beginning and end of row as follows: Work 5 sts, bind off 3, work 6 sts, bind off 3, work 7 sts, bind off 3, work to end.
- 4 (WS) Work across in Seed st, casting on 3 sts over bound off sts.
- 5 Continuing in Seed st, work even until piece measures 28" from beginning.
- 6 Bind off all sts loosely in pattern.

Bow

When working Bow, place a marker (pm) at beginning of RS rows, to indicate which edge is being shaped.

- 1 Using CC (and Gold Glitter, if desired), cast on 2 sts.(RS) [k1-f/b] twice—4 sts.
- 2 Begin Seed st; work 1 row even; pm at beginning of next row to indicate edge being shaped.
- 3 Shape Side: (RS) Beginning this row, increase 1 st (k1-f/b) at beginning of every other row 28 times, working increased sts in Seed st—32 sts; keep marker in place after last increase row.
- 4 Work even in Seed st until piece measures 41" from marker (last increase row), end with a WS row.
- 5 Shape Side: (RS) Beginning this row, decrease 1 st at end of every other row until 1 st remains, as follows: Work across to last 2 sts, k2tog. Note: The shaping is being worked at the opposite edge of the Bow piece.
- 6 Fasten off.

Finishing


- 1 Using yarn needle, weave in ends.
- 2 Sew buttons opposite buttonholes on sash; wrap sash around pillow and button in place.
- 3 Bow: Tie Bow piece in large bow (see photo); attach to Front of Pillow.

If you wish to dispose of a scrap car please:-

- Request a Verification Form from the Island Link Officer Island Link Office open between 10am and noon on a Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday;
- Complete the Verification Form and arrange for Jim Holland (haulier) to collect the car for delivery to the scrapyard;
- Pass the completed Verification Form to Jim Holland when the vehicle is collected for disposal;
- Make the necessary arrangement to have the car(s) lifted on the lorry;
 and
- Complete all necessary documentation to meet DVLA and scrapyard requirements.

A separate Verification Form will be required for <u>each separate delivery of</u> cars to the scrapyard
