RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

Early Spring was cold, and bird migration very slow, with just a scattering of interesting sightings - two Wood Pigeons together at Osen; two Woodcock flying out of the Dale garden together on 4th April; a Lesser Whitethroat at Gesty Dishes on 23rd, and a few Siskins and Blackcaps. Best bird by far was the Sea Eagle - surrounded by a ring of crows - on the ground near Clestrain, seen by Raymond Dennison mid-month.

Only a few Sand Martins had arrived back by the end of the month, and Swallow numbers were low until well into May. A pair of Stonechats were seen by the Bu Links and may still be around (late May). A Green Sandpiper was seen (and photographed) by the Bu Loch on 10th May and other surprise finds in mid-month were yet another Wood Pigeon (big and obvious - but quite rare here!), 2 Lesser Whitethroats, one Common Whitethroat, 3-4 Sedge Warblers, a Mistle Thrush in the garden at Coweshouse, a male Pied Flycatcher at Scoulters, 2 Jackdaws opposite Windbreck, and a Cuckoo in the garden at Hescombe Cottage. Linnets had taken up residence among the island fuchsia hedges during May and a nest containing five eggs was found just below the living-room window at Castle by Sue whilst gardening on 15th. Sedge Warblers have been seen and heard singing in several areas of suitable habitat during the last few weeks, including the Mill Stream and Lower Dishes.

On the sea, a few Great Northern Divers in summer plumage have been seen by Anthony and Clare offshore near their house at Lower Dishes. Sadly, there have been no signs of Red-throated Divers in the Bomasty Bay area where the local Rothiesholm Moor pairs formerly fed in the evenings, throughout the breeding season.

The most unexpected sightings during the period were a Red-backed Shrike along the Airy road - found by visitor Betty Winslow on 13th – and a Hawfinch discovered later the same day, feeding with the sparrows outside the kitchen window at Castle. Another red-backed Shrike was discovered at Holin Cottage on 26th.

With winds from an easterly quarter forecast for much of the next two weeks, we should be in for a sack-full of uncommon migrants, particularly if the temperature gets up to the heady heights of 15c or more.

I may yet have to eat my words once again! Fingers crossed for warm SE winds!

Stop Press:

Not just yet – a female Red-breasted Flycatcher – first seen by Sue and regular visitor Steve Ricks – arrived in the Castle garden this morning 27th May. An island rarity – great timing!!

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

Informing you what your councillor is doing for you at OIC and beyond

As reported on pages 1, 2 & 3 in *The Orcadian* of the 3rd May, I am delighted and relieved to say that at the Mayday General Meeting my "notice of motion" succeeded in reversing the cut of £65,000 affecting additional support for learning. Although there were a couple of councillors who opposed the suspension of Standing Order 130 "Revoking Previous Decisions", it was not sufficient to prevent the "notice of motion" from being heard, and, in the event, it was carried *nem. con.* I am not convinced, though, that the outcome would have been quite so definite had it not been for the overwhelming public support. And my "notice of motion" would not even have been able to be lodged without the six countersignatures of my fellow councillors Sandy Cowie, David Dawson, Steven Heddle, John Richards, Gwenda Shearer and Magnus Thomson.

After the meeting, I was interviewed for *STV News*, but not having a telly, I don't know whether it was broadcast or not.

As pictured on page 3 of *The Orcadian* of the 26th April, I was one of the board directors present at Orkney Ferries to receive the petition calling for a fairer fares policy. I have long been aware of the social injustice inherent in the present system of books of discounted vouchers, and now that I am in a better position to do something about it, I am keen to get it improved.

I enjoyed an evening at the Picky listening to the youngsters performing in the Intermediate Instrumental Music Course concert. This demonstration of hard work, talent and ability is supported by the Council's policy of not charging for musical instrument tuition or for the loan of musical instruments to pupils, and I will continue to oppose any attempt to change this.

I flew to Inverness to attend a meeting of the UHI Foundation, for which I am OIC's representative. The University has reached a critical junction in its path of progression, with some of the larger academic partners (such as Inverness College and Moray College) discussing integration. This is leaving the smaller academic partners, such as Orkney College, in an uncertain position, which makes it all the more important that we have good representation on the UHI-wide bodies.

I went to Stronsay for the AGM of its parent council. I admire the support the Stronsay community gives to its school, and how the school is able to offer such a broad range of subjects and accommodate the exam wishes of its secondary pupils.

Unable to physically get to the meeting of the Highlands & Islands Science Skills Academy Leadership Board, I "attended" by *Skype* from School Place—not a very satisfactory substitute for the real thing, but at least Orkney's voice was heard.

Other meetings I've been involved in at School Place this month include: a meeting about the single authority model; a joint seminar between OIC and Orkney Housing Association Ltd; the Norwegian Constitution Day lunchtime reception; a seminar by Architecture & Design Scotland on design of buildings in the countryside; a seminar on the Regional Improvement Plan of the Northern Alliance (an educational partnership between the eight local authorities in the North of Scotland), and I just made it to the tail-end of the Youth Café open day before having to jump onto the ferry back to Sanday.

I shall be going to community council meetings in Westray on the 11th June and in Shapinsay on the 20th. The 20th June is also the day of this year's community council conference (which I shall be at), and I would encourage each of the North Isles community councils to send a representative along. It is a great opportunity to meet up with your counterparts from other communities and compare notes.

A FOLLOW-UP TO AN ARTICLE IN THE LIMPET IN 2010

The mother of Avril Souter, a lady living in Auckland, New Zealand, was born and raised in Lancashire but moved to New Zealand in 1958 and married a Kiwi. Avril's mother had spoken of her childhood holidays in Orkney to visit her uncle, James Bracewell, who salvaged shipwrecked ships but had died in a shipwreck involving a ship called the "*Nellie*" in 1941. Avril began a search to find out more about James Bracewell and came across an article in the March 2010 edition of the Stronsay Limpet entitled "Tragic loss of the *Nellie*". She emailed an enquiry to the Limpet's editor who passed it on to Bill Miller, the author of the article in the Limpet.

Avril and her husband Dereck visited Orkney in May 2018 and paid a visit to Bill Miller on mainland Orkney. Bill was able to provide a lot of information about the "*Nellie*", James Bracewell and his family. Avril & Dereck then visited Stronsay where they were chauffeured around by Julie Andrew and met several Stronsay residents who had first-hand stories concerning the loss of the *Nellie*. Avril & Dereck also called in at Claremont to thank the Limpet's editor for handling their initial enquiry before going to the Bay cemetery so that Avril could visit her great-uncle's grave.

The original article from the March 2010 edition of the Limpet is copied on the next two pages.

TRAGIC LOSS OF THE "NELLIE"

This account first appeared in edition 57 of the Limpet, March 2010 Bill Miller added an update in May 2018

Discovery of wreckage on the rocks at Grice Ness, Stronsay, on Tuesday, November 11th, 1941, provided a first hint of the fate of the "Nellie", a little salvage vessel, which, with seven men on board, had last been seen in the late afternoon of Wednesday, November 5th. Shortly after the finding of parts of the vessel, the body of George Oag, the skipper, was found on the same beach. The following day, the body of James Bracewell, the owner, was found. All seven crewmen had been lost. Five of them came from Blackburn, Lancashire. The victims of the disaster were:

• James Robert Bracewell, aged 45 years and unmarried, of "Briar Bank" Blackburn Road, Rishton, near Blackburn, proprietor of the Preston Salvage Company, Eachill Works, Rishton, near Blackburn. Mr Bracewell's body was recovered on Wednesday, November 12th on Papa Stronsay.

• George Oag, aged 69 years, skipper, of 11, Kinnard Street, Wick, whose body was found near the wreckage at Grice Ness, Stronsay, on Tuesday, November 11th. His remains were sent home to Wick for burial.

• William Henry Forrest, aged 55 years, a married man and a salvage worker, of 59, Helen Street, Blackburn. His body was found on 29th November, on Papa Stronsay. The following crewmen were never found:

• John Studholme, aged 36 years, a married man and an acetylene welder and H.G.V. Driver, of 22, Orange Street, Blackburn. • Stanley Forrest, aged 23 years and single, a salvage worker, and son of William Henry Forrest above, and of the same address.

• Harry Francis, aged 18 years and unmarried, an acetylene cutter, of 25, Moseley Street, Blackburn.

• William Clark, aged 37 years, the ship's cook and a married man from Orties, Burness, Sanday.

An eighth member of the usual working party, James Velzian, from Orkney, was home on holiday at the time of the disaster. Mr Bracewell had been operating marine salvage schemes, on a small scale, in the North for about six years. For a time he operated with a small craft called the "Alexandrina", but had later purchased the "Nellie", a converted Zulu fishing boat. Normally, Mr Bracewell suspended salvage operations each winter, and worked in the summer and autumn seasons.

On Nov. 5th. the little salvage vessel, loaded with salved scrap metal and gear, and carrying seven men, set off from the wrecked ship "Wanja" which they were cutting up at the back of Sanday, and headed for Stronsay harbour at the end of the day's work. The voyage to the boat's base was a short one, but the little vessel did not arrive at the usual time. At about 5.30 in the evening, it was reported that the "Nellie" had been seen to the east of Stronsay, some distance off its base and had been signalled to, but had not replied.

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Despite the heavy seas in the area at the time, she was not in distress when last seen. When she didn't turn up, a widespread search by sea and aircraft was carried out but without success. During the night of 10th/11th November, my grandfather, Willie Rendall, late of Clayquoy, Stronsay, was on coastguard duties in the watch-hut on Burgh Hill, accompanied by Alan Fotheringhame, late of Old Schoolhouse, Stronsay, when he saw lights on a boat heading north towards Burgh Head. He reported the sighting to the coast-guards in Kirkwall, and attempted to keep sight of the boat but eventually the lights disappeared. A fierce south-easterly gale was blowing at this time. Nothing more was seen or heard of the craft until the morning of Tuesday, November 11th , when the discovery of wreckage at Grice Ness, on the sixth morning after the disappearance of the vessel, af-forded a first clue as to the fate of the craft and it's seven occupants.

It is believed that the men had survived the six nights' ordeal, at first being driven south in the North Sea, and then when the wind turned, being driven north, and had perished when the vessel was wrecked, by a coincidence, back near the base from which it had gone. About this time, Nana Peace, who was living at Housebay, found a round wooden bread-board on the seashore near Housebay, and the names of the "Nellie" crew were written in pencil on the board. Her husband, Stewart Peace immediately handed this over to the local Customs Officer, but never heard any more about this, and never really fathomed out why all the crew would write their names on it.

The tragedy created a painful sensation in the districts in which Mr. Bracewell and his men were best known, especially as Mr Bracewell was courting a local Stronsay lass. Highly esteemed as a man, Mr. Bracewell was admired for his enterprise in tackling various salvage jobs. For six years he had courageously schemed against the treacherous spells of weather which, even in the middle of summer, are so apt to occur in the area. However insignificant a part they may have been playing in marine salvage, and the war effort, from the wider national viewpoint, they had carried out a great deal of valuable work in the past six years. All who knew Mr. Bracewell and his comrades in their hazardous calling, expressed their deepest sympathy for their relatives.

The "Wanja" was a large Swedish cargo ship of which had run aground on the north side of Sanday, at Whitemill Point, in the district of Burness, loaded with phosphate, enroute from Boca Grande, Florida to Landskrona in Sweden. On 12th October, 1939, she was boarded by the crew of an English cruiser and was ordered to head for Kirkwall so that the cargo could be examined, as this was war time and foreign ships were often boarded to make sure they were not helping the enemy. On the morning of 14th October, 1939, due to poor navigation, she went aground on Sanday. This was the same day as the Royal Oak was torpedoed in Scapa Flow. Several attempts were made to tow the Wanja off the rocks but they were unsuccessful, and she became a total wreck. Parts of the hull can still be seen on the rocks where she went ashore.

Bracewell is buried in the Bay Cemetery on the left side as you enter the gate, and although the headstone states that the Nellie went down off Sanday, it was obvious from the location of the wreckage and the bodies, that she foundered on Grice Ness, Stronsay, the same location as the "Evangeline" in 1905.







The Chairman is elected from the members of their council on an annual basis and has responsibility to ensure the meetings of the council are properly conducted and for seeing that matters are decided so that subsequent action can be taken on the Community Council's instructions.

The Planning Representative is authorised to consult directly with the Planning Authority to obtain further information on applications for their area which they consider may be contentious, and once this information has been received, consult with other members of the Community Council.

The Transport Representative represents the views of fellow residents and Community Council members at the Air Services and Ferry Services Consultative Forums which meet regularly with representatives from Orkney Islands Council and the North Isles Community Councils.

A Clerk is employed by Orkney Islands Council to provide assistance and advice to the Community Council in addition to the more obvious administrative role. The Island Link Officer includes the duties undertaken by the Clerk.

The post of Island Link Officer, or ILO for short, operates under the auspices of Orkney Islands Council's Empowering Communities Project and helps improve the delivery and management of council services at a local level.

The Island Link Officer will be based in a purpose build room within the Fish Mart, independent of the Café and Hostel, and will be able to help with the following:

- providing access to and liaison with Orkney Islands Council officials and services
- providing information and forms available from Orkney Islands Council
- help in addressing and resolving any problems with council services or correspondence
- help in completing forms issued by or to be returned to the council photocopying

The Island Link Office is open between 10am and noon every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

If there is a Council funded service you would like to see on Stronsay, have ideas on how Council-run services can be improved, or would like to raise a concern or issue with the Community Council or apply for financial assistance, then please get in touch with any of the Stronsay Community Councillors or with Colin McAlpine, Island Link Officer.
