The Waste Team at the Stronsay Recycling Centre have been working with OIC and Stronsay Community Council on a project that will enable us to be part of a 12-month Trial plastic skip Island collection

What can be recycled ?? Household Bottles Only!!

To make this trial a success we need your help in following some clear instructions when using the skip.

- 1. Please make sure your bottles are empty No liquids
- 2. Please make sure your bottles are rinsed
- 3. Please remove their tops and put those in the normal rubbish
- 4. There must be a number 1 or 2 on the bottom (HDPE or PET can be recycled)



The Skip will be located behind the current glass, metal, paper skip next to Ebenezer Stores.

The Waste team located at the Recycling Centre at Woods yard will be available for any questions or to offer any assistance and will be working with the Council to Monitor the Skips usage and Trial.

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THE PEEDIE LIBRARY (and coffee afternoon)

The Kirk's Peedie Library began when the mobile library van service was reduced from monthly to bi-monthly and has now been running very successfully for about 18 months. RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

A run around the island on 1st January produced both male and female Hen Harrier at Airy, a Merlin at Matpow, and Sanderling, Dunlin, Ringed Plover, Redshank, Curlew and Oystercatcher all on the beach at Bomasty. Ant saw a Snow Bunting on the Bu Sands on 2nd and Sue saw a flock of 12 Skylarks the same day.

Although there seems to be less 'small' birds over-wintering (excluding Starlings and House Sparrows!) there have been way above average sightings of birds of prey. At least two male Hen Harriers have been recorded along with at least two 'ringtails' (brown females or 1st winter males). At least two Merlins have been recorded and there have been sightings of both Kestrel and Sparrowhawk. So far there have been no sightings of Peregrine and no owls have been seen.

A few small groups of thrushes – Blackbirds Redwing and Fieldfares have been present throughout what has been a very mild winter, and the odd Song Thrush has been seen. Robins have taken up residence in many gardens across the island – one per garden, the birds are very territorial even in Winter – and all seem to be of the paler 'continental' types, all of which will return to the other side of the North Sea in early Spring to breed. A party of 30 or so Twite flew past Gesty Dishes on 6th Jan.

A few Oystercatchers have over-wintered and the flock of over 20 Whooper Swans have remained faithful to Jim and Fran's land at Banks for much of the Winter, giving excellent views from the Holland Road adj. the new Cemetery. There was a real surprise in the same field on 14th when two (male) Ruff were discovered among the Redshank flock there.

Sea-duck seem to be in short supply this winter – even the Eider numbers are low – but there is a definite increase in freshwater species on the lochs which have been taken over entirely by the Greylags in recent years. This has been most noticeable at Matpow, where several species - including 3 Pintail – have been seen regularly.

There have been 2-300 each of Curlew and Golden Plover present (less than 5% of pre-Greylag invasion numbers!) throughout the Winter, but Lapwings seem to have fared rather better and a few hundred have been present – mainly in the damp meadows.

A dark Common Buzzard has been seen on a few occasions in January, the most recent by Ant at Lower Dishes, shortly after finding a flock of 50-plus Bar-tailed Godwits during his regular walk along the shore of Holland bay. Other surprises were a female Chaffinch found by Sheila at Helmsley and a Song Thrush near the Kirk.

Other interesting sightings were of what may have been the same flock of 200 or so Cormorants in Holland Bay mid-month (Ant) and Mill Bay later the same day (JH). Both flocks were very 'mobile', flying low over the water in a long line and diving regularly as if searching for shoals of fish.

NORTH ISLES LANDSCAPE PARTNERSHIP SCHEME

At the start of the year, 3 new staff members were recruited to the North Isles Landscape Partnership Scheme. Valerie Dawson, Claire Wilson and Anne Bignall join project manager Andy Golightly to deliver the projects that make up the overall scheme.

The NILPS scheme focuses on the natural, cultural and built heritage of the Isles and includes a wide array of projects to achieve this. Among them are traditional skills training, the renovation of historic buildings, wildlife recording, maritime archaeology research, interpretation projects along with a host of others.

An important aspiration of the scheme is to encourage and appreciate connectivity between the isles as well as recognising diversity and the unique identity of each island. With this in mind, some of the projects are aimed at linking the isles – for example, the creation of a visitor trail across the North Isles highlighting industrial heritage sites on different islands. Others focus on heritage that is specific to a particular island, such as wildlife recording initiatives that look at species that are special to certain islands.

For Stronsay, one of the largest projects involves renovation work on selected historic buildings and structures in the village and assisting in the development of Stronsay's new heritage centre. We'll also be looking at signage, interpretation and works on the network of footpaths on Stronsay.

There will also be lots of opportunity to get involved in projects, courses, training days and other activities associated with a variety of subjects including oral history, traditional skills and wildlife recording.

One of the first things that will be available is the North Isles Landscape Partnership Heritage Grants. Groups and organisations can apply for grants of up to £2000 to support projects, activities and events in the Isles that contribute to the aims and objectives of the NILPS Programme.

As particular projects come to the fore, we will provide more information on how to have input and get involved.

A little more about the project team....

Andrew Golightly (Programme manager)

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THE WRECK OF THE 'A.C.W. 11'

As the ferry comes in to Whitehall harbour or if you chance to look out toward Huip Ness from the highroad in the North end of Stronsay, the remains of a ship hard aground are to be seen lying in the Bay of Franks. This ship, known locally as the 'coal barge' or the 'coal hulk', is one of the last, and one of the most visible, of the relics of Stronsay's past role as a busy herring fishing port.

Bearing the unpretentious name of 'A.C.W. 11', she was built at the instruction of the War Office by J W Stewart of Brentford, London in 1918. Designed as a lighter barge and with a flat bottom, she was registered as 358 gross tons and was 151' long with a beam of 24½' and a draught of 12'. She had no means of propulsion of her own, neither sail nor steam, and perhaps one of the more interesting facts about her is that she was constructed of concrete, this concrete being poured around a steel reinforcing mesh contained in a wooden mould. By the end of the Great War, steel was in short supply and alternatives to



steel for shipbuilding were being sought where possible. This process of steel reinforced concrete, or ferro-concrete, was still very much in the experimental stage in 1918 but it is testimony to this process and the skill of the builders that she is still pretty much intact 100 years later! According to Lloyd's Register, she was certificated "For English Channel and coasting service from Thames to Milford Haven, subject to annual survey - experimental", with the last recorded survey being carried out in October 1924.

During the herring fishing in Stronsay, a number of ships (usually older ships no longer fit for the high seas but performing their last duty before heading to the breaker's yard) were put to use as 'coaling hulks' – basically huge floating coal bunkers. There would have been as many as five or six of these hulks anchored in Papa Sound at the height of the herring fishing season, still in reasonably deep water but out of the main shipping channel. Coasters carrying coals from the coalfields of central Scotland and northern England arrived at Stronsay on a regular basis to fill and refill the holds of these hulks with coal, with literally hundreds of steam drifters then hauling alongside the hulks in an afternoon or evening to fill up their own bunkers before heading out eastwards for another night at the herring fishing grounds.

But to go back to the story of the A.C.W. 11, and again looking at Lloyd's Register, she was owned by Thornley Binders Ltd in the 1920s. (Thornley Binders had a seaweed processing factory in Stromness during the 1920s and, following the grounding of the 390 feet cargo vessel 'Hastings County' on Auskerry in June 1926, they offered the use of an 'ideally suited' concrete lighter to help convey salvaged cargo from the grounded ship to Kirkwall. but, after close examination by divers, she was deemed unsuitable. This lighter was almost certainly the A.C.W. 11.)

She was subsequently sold to Adam Bros Ltd before eventually being purchased by the Peterhead Coal Co Ltd around 1933. I can find no record of how long she provided her services as a coaling hulk but these duties sadly came to an end on 22nd February 1936 when she broke free of her moorings during a gale and ran hard aground in the Bay of Franks. Unfortunately she was badly holed on a large rock and couldn't be re-floated so still sits today where she ran aground more than 80 years ago.



There are tales told of locals in small boats visiting the ship at the dead of night and dredging a few bags of coal from her bunkers to help keep the home fires burning and, for many years afterwards, some more of the cargo would, on occasion, be washed out of her during subsequent storms.

I can remember local folk going out with a bucket and beachcombing for lumps of this coal when it washed ashore. This coal they called 'steam coal' as it was of a higher grade than the normal household coal, burnt much hotter and lasted longer. It was said it

had to be used sparingly and mixed in with ordinary coal because of the very real danger of actually melting the cast iron coal basket of the fire!

In the 1980s some enterprising local lobster fishermen considered the possibility of using the holds of the barge as holding ponds for lobsters when prices were poor, storing them until such time as prices rose and they could be sold to advantage. It was eventually decided that this enterprise in open water had too many risks involved and lobster holding ponds were constructed on land instead, actually converting an old herring processing building for the purpose.

The barge originally had two short stubby wooden masts for operating her derricks but both are now gone, the last one not so many years ago. These derricks were operated by steam powered winches and, as can be seen in the photos, they still look in remarkably good condition, with the hawser on the winch reel still clearly visible. At spring high tides there is little of the ship to be seen above water but, as the tide recedes, she can still be seen standing out as a sad but still proud reminder of the boom days of fishing for the 'Silver Darlings'.

STEPHEN CLACKSON'S LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

Reporting on the work of your councillor in Orkney and beyond

In my February 2018 *Letter*, I reported on the additional funding Government Scotland had kindly provided for Orkney's inter-island ferry service for the 2018/19 financial year. I also expressed the hope that this financial settlement was not something that would happen only once in a blue blood super moon—a celestial event that occurred on the 31st January 2018. Well, early in the morning of the 21st day of this January, we were treated to the sight of a super blood wolf moon, yet we are still waiting for Government Scotland to treat us to adequate funding for our ferries for 2019/20. This year, £6.8 million are needed to run the Orkney Ferries fleet. We are in urgent need of a long-term solution for our ferry revenue funding and, of course, capital funding for a ferry-replacement programme, because the costs involved are astronomical.

My 2019 council work got underway with some travelling about my ward. I flew to Papa Westray for a meeting of their community council, and the next night took the ferry to Eday for theirs. The one advantage of the refit timetable is that I was able to sail directly back to Sanday the following morning.

Held in Kirkwall, but of direct relevance to the ward, was a meeting with Shapinsay Community Council members and OIC officials to discuss options for The Smithy in Balfour Village. And I was on the selection panel for Sanday Community School's new head teacher.

I attended a meeting of the Orkney College Management Council (CMC), which was the first for the College's new principal, Professor Edward (Eddie) Abbott-Halpin. Eddie was formerly a professor at Leeds Beckett University in the Department of Computing, Creative Technology and Engineering. He has over 20 years of experience in further education and has worked in both Sri Lanka and Iraq. We also have a new student representative, Kaila Sheppard, who is reading archaeology. As I mentioned in my November 2018 *Letter*, I am pushing for more student accommodation in Orkney, in the first instance for students from the Isles needing to attend college courses during the week. This has been formalised (under "Areas for development") in the *Orkney College UHI Evaluative Report and Enhancement Plan*, which has now been endorsed by Education Scotland and the Scottish Funding Council.





At the start of the year I spent time thinking about what is important, what should take priority in my life. Since I am here to serve the church and the community of Stronsay, this led me to thinking what can the church provide for the community? I don't intend to go overly deep or into great detail as there is much that could be written and this merely intended to be short piece for the wonderful Limpet, put in somewhere after the interesting articles, poems, fascinating accounts of birds spotted, delicious sounding menus, and so on.
