STRONSAY FISH MART

As you may know, Stronsay Community Council hosted an informal meeting in the Community Centre on the evening of Monday 16th September. This was to give an update on the current situation with the Fish Mart Café and Hostel and to try to gauge the level of community support there was for business. It was explained that, after three years of providing a superb service, the previous operators had decided not to renew the lease of the premises. With little local interest at the time, the post was advertised further afield and, after much interest from all corners of the globe, 12 firm applications were received. This was eventually whittled down to a short list of two applicants who seemed to tick all the boxes and, after interview, the post was offered to one of the applicants, a couple with a young family, who accepted the post but were unable to start for some time. Unfortunately they later decided that the move from England to Stronsay was just too big a commitment for them as a family at this time and they withdrew from the post, so that was how things stood at the time of the meeting. It was also outlined that, due to the type of heating in the building, energy costs were quite high and the Community Council had been investigating alternative forms of heating. It was also felt that the viability of the business depended greatly on the Hostel side of the business being well utilised and it was pleasing to see that it had been very well used over the summer, although we were aware that much of this had been workmen involved in projects on the island and couldn't be relied on as a permanent source of income.

We were pleased to see a really good turnout at the meeting, with 38 locals in attendance, and really delighted that everyone was very supportive of the venture, saw it as a great asset to the island and hoped it could continue.

With the meeting then thrown open for any comments or suggestions, we were very appreciative of the many thoughts and ideas that came forward that could make the future of the facility more secure. Among the many great ideas that came forward there were several suggestions on how energy costs could be reduced, how the café could increase its profits, how the Hostel could be advertised and more people encouraged to use it and even a suggestion on how a change of name could well help business. There was also some strong local interest expressed on taking on the running of the Hostel and Café so I think things are looking very positive at the moment. These ideas have all been taken on board and will be considered in depth but we would still welcome any more thought that you may have, whether you were at the meeting and have since thought of something more or you weren't able to attend and have some ideas or suggestions you would be willing to share with us. If so, the Community Council would be delighted if you could pass your thoughts on, either to me at Steenysheed or to Colin at The Hill.

Thank you once again to all who attended the meeting last Monday and for showing your support for the Fish Mart. This has certainly given us a good steer on what to do and where to go now!

RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

Two adult Curlew Sandpipers were at the Bu Loch in late August for a few days (see photo), along with one or two Ruff and up to 50 Black-tailed Godwits, but the very wet period in late August and early September meant that all of the usual ‘muddy margins’ around the island were water-logged and unsuitable for wading species. The gardens however were absolutely full of colour and began to attract migrants towards the end of August – the first ‘rarity’ being a Barred Warbler (from the continent) found by Hazel in the garden at Airy on 28th. Also in the garden there, were a Pied Flycatcher and a Willow Warbler – also probably from across the North Sea. Airy was the place to be that day, Leah seeing two ‘ring-tail’ Hen Harriers having a brief ‘skirmish’ in and around the garden (both ‘brown’ birds - either adults or young males – or perhaps one of each!).

There was a big arrival of ‘large’ Wheatears at the end of August – almost certainly all ‘Greenland types’, and September began with a Willow Warbler at Helmsley, a Whinchat along the Airy Road (see photo), and a Wood Warbler in the Airy garden. A few Reed Buntings appeared around this time – probably local birds – and there were many Gannets diving for fish in Mill Bay during a windy spell on 4th.

Pied Wagtail numbers built up in early August as usual and there was a mixture of small migrants at the start of the second week – Chiffchaff at Holin Cottage and Pied Flycatcher at Harrowdale on 8th; Redstart at Airy on 9th (see photo), and best of all - what is a major rarity in the UK - a Booted Warbler along the fence towards Linksquoy on 10th. (The 4th record of the species on Stronsay).

In mid-September the NW winds brought the first skein of (38) Pink-footed Geese flying over towards the Scottish Mainland, wintering duck began to arrive here – mainly Wigeon. and a small party of Whooper Swans flew south over Dale at dusk on 17th. A party of 33 Pink-footed Geese flew over on 18th and a sign of many birds moving south was the drop in the number of sightings of several species here - Wheatears, Meadow Pipits and Swallows. A few Sand Martins were still around indicating a successful breeding season on the island.

The air was surprisingly warm around 18th-20th September and brought a few migrants from the continent once again, including a rather elusive juvenile male Red-backed Shrike at Sunnybank (see photo). There were several sightings of Red Admiral butterflies and Airy Cottage garden was the ‘star’ once more, with 3 migrants – Robin, Redstart (new bird) and Willow Warbler, whilst at Castle, Sue saw a male Blackcap from our kitchen window. A single Goldcrest (generally regarded as the ‘smallest’ UK species) was found very appropriately in what is probably the smallest island garden – Park Cottage, and perhaps the best and closest sighting of all was the Redstart which posed on the window-sill at Daisybank for a few seconds, delighting Kate, Sue and visitor Betty Winslow who had just finished sipping coffee in the kitchen! 100 Wigeon arrived on the Matpow Loch around this time.

Yet another Redstart greeted us as we entered the drive on 21st – a male on the Lower Millfield garden wall ... and with SE winds forecast for much of the coming week we are surely in for plenty more surprises!

Have I ever said that before??? Fingers crossed.

STEPHEN CLACKSON'S LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

Reporting on the endeavours of your councillor on your behalf

Soon after we reconvened from the council recess, the council computer system was “reconfigured”. This means that councillor e-mail addresses have returned to what they used to be, in my case: stephen.clackson@orkney.gov.uk

Following a whole day's Special General Meeting to allow councillors, as the final stage of the recruitment process, to listen to candidates' presentations and interview them, Orkney Islands Council now has a new Executive Director of Education, Leisure & Housing, Mr James Wylie, replacing Mr Wilfred Weir, who is retiring. James is well known around Orkney schools, having latterly been OIC's Head of Education (Curriculum & Community Learning), and I wish him well in his new role.

At the first meeting of the new academic year of the Orkney College Management Council, community rep, Beverley Clubley was elected the new chair, to replace Cllr John Ross Scott, who failed to get re-elected onto the Management Council.

The draft annual statement of accounts for 2018/19 presented to the Monitoring & Audit Committee shows a Harbour Fund balance of £249,565,000. I asked if any of this was earmarked for the repairs, maintenance and improvement of marine assets, such as North Isles' linkspans. The Head of Finance replied that within this fund sits the Miscellaneous Piers Fund, which *is* earmarked for this purpose and currently stands at £6,879,000. I believe Sanday's linkspan is scheduled next.

I met with Council officials to discuss speed limits around Isles' schools, which are the only ones in Orkney (and much of the rest of the UK) still above 20mph. To progress this, it would be helpful if Isles' schools ensure they have up-to-date travel plans, and that parent councils and community councils make their wishes known to OIC (again!). I doubt anyone needs reminding that 90% of pedestrians hit by a vehicle travelling at 40mph will be killed, and 50% at 30mph, yet at 20mph 90% will survive—not to mention that at 20mph a driver has more time to take evasive action and avoid collision in the first place.

At the meeting of the Education, Leisure & Housing Committee, it was good to hear of the funding that North Ron and Papay have received through our Strategic Housing Investment Plan. As a corporate parent, I brought up the problem of what our care-experienced youngsters can do with their stuff when they leave their care home to go away to study. Without storage facilities back in Orkney, they have to schlep their entire worldly goods with them wherever they go. OIC is looking into this.

Along with a few other councillors, I met with members of Extinction Rebellion Orkney in the Council Chamber. We had a constructive dialogue, which demonstrated that our respective ecological aims are really not all that different.

Other meetings I have attended this month include: a members' political session, a meeting of the Sanday Community Council (twice!), planning training, a meeting of the Orkney Health & Care Committee (well done to Kalisgarth on their inspection results), the first meeting of the new Digital Strategy Consultative Group, and an Orkney Ferries' Board meeting. Following a decision we made at an earlier Board meeting, the period that multi-journey books of vouchers are valid for will be extended from 1 year to 500 days from the date of purchase. I'm sure this change will be welcomed by ferry users, especially those who in the past have ended up with vouchers left unused after the expiry date.

Assistance with travel costs to/from hospital may be claimed from the NHS by patients and escorts if the trip involves crossing 5 miles or more of sea, which means all residents of the outer North Isles are eligible. To claim, you submit a form (available from Balfour Hospital reception and island surgeries), which must be officially signed at your appointment, along with your receipts/tickets.

HOSPITAL TRAVEL COSTS SCHEME

Benefits eligible for refund of any reasonable amount spent on travel to receive treatment at an NHS Hospital.

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA (IB))
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA (IR))
- Pension Credit Guarantee Credit (must be guarantee credit, savings credit alone does not qualify)
- HC2 Certificate
- NHS Tax Credit Exemption Certificate/Card *(see note below)
- Universal Credit

Patients who are in receipt, or their partners are in receipt, of any of the above benefits are entitled to reimbursement of all reasonable travel expenses spent on travel to receive treatment at an NHS hospital.

This above does not cover travel expenses whilst attending any primary care appointments. ** See below for War Pensioners.

HIGHLANDS AND ISLANDS TRAVEL SCHEME

Should the journey involve the patient travelling over 30 miles by land or 5 miles by sea then the Highlands and Islands Travel Scheme will apply. Patients are entitled to reimbursement of all reasonable travel expenses, but must pay the first £10 of their travel costs. Patients who are in receipt of any of the benefits detailed under the Hospital Travel Costs Scheme are exempt from paying the first £10 of their travel costs.

Will be automatically sent a NHS Tax Credit Exemption Certificate/Card by the NHS awarding body and need not apply for it.

HOLLAND'S FIRST TRACTOR DRIVEN BINDER

For hundreds of years the farming ritual of seedtime and harvest had remained relatively unchanged when, come harvest time, the oats and bere would have been cut with a sickle or a scythe then bound by hand into sheaves for storing and later threshing. Then, with the coming of the horse drawn reaper in the mid-1800s, the job became semi-mechanised where the crop was cut by machine but was still gathered and bound by hand. By the 1890s and early 1900s the horse drawn binder began to take over, with this new type of machine cutting the crop and automatically binding it into sheaves. As time moved on from the early to the mid-20th century, the horses drawing the binder and doing the many other tasks around the farm were gradually being replaced by tractors and the days of the horse, and indeed the horseman, were numbered.

With a difficult and frustrating harvest in Stronsay now nearing completion, I thought this would be an appropriate time to recount one of the many farming anecdotes that the late Jim Work of Holland and Daisybank had to tell. This is set around the time when the heavy horse, although still playing an important role on the farm, was gradually being replaced by the tractor and this is the tale of the coming of the first tractor driven binder to Holland – probably in the late 1940s or early 1950s.

As a bit of background information, the three Work brothers at Holland each had their individual passions with William being the shepherd and Jim very much the horseman while Robert, being the youngest of the three, took a great interest in all things mechanical. This is Jim's story:

“This particular harvest we had made a start to cutting the oats in a field out at the back of Holland. It was a fine standing crop and we were working away with the binder pulled by a team o' three horse. Before dinner, Robert had gone away down to the pier with the tractor to collect our first brand new tractor driven binder. He arrived back at the farm and came straight out to the field we were working in with the tractor and the new binder. I was working away with the binder cutting round and round the field, as you could do with a bonny standing crop, while Robert busied himself getting this new binder all set up and ready to go. Well, when he was ready to get started he came across to speak to me, telling me that was him all set to go and suggesting that, as he would be cutting a fair bit faster than me, I would maybe just pull out of the way every time that he came up behind me so that he could get past and I wouldn't hold him up.

Now as you ken, I liked my horses and that just niggled me a peedie bit as I felt that the horses were kindo being put down although I ken fine that wasn't Robert's intention. Anyway, to cut a long story short, we both set off cutting, me with the horse binder and Robert with the tractor driven one. I must admit that I made sure I kept the horses going fairly well all afternoon and he never managed to catch up with me that day! Right enough, the tractor and binder could cut far faster than me with the horse but, as we were going round and round the field, Robert had to stop at every corner and go and move some sheaves out of the way until he could reverse the tractor and binder far enough to start cutting down the next side of the field. I was able just to stop sharp at the corner, get the horses to come smartly around and then head off right away down the next strip. Come teatime, the horses knew fine they had put in a good day but I was some pleased wi' myself I can tell you!”

There are many things in life we can get by with only doing occasionally. But other things, such as eating and sleeping, we need to do regularly to remain healthy. In order to be spiritually healthy, it is important that we spend time learning, growing, and talking together. It is probably not enough for us to just do that on a Sunday morning once a week (if we even do that), we need more times of really growing together, sharing together, and pouring into each other's lives. A few months ago, some of the men from the church began to meet fortnightly for Bible study, prayer, tea, and fellowship.

From the very early days of the Church, as recorded in the book of Acts, importance has been laid on meeting regularly with others for prayer, study of the Bible, and personal growth. Frankly it is nearly impossible to bond and truly invest in one another's lives in something as public as the average church service where one person does most of the talking and others try and stay awake. Small groups lend themselves to being more comfortable and relaxed, there is no pressure to speak or do anything, you are perfectly free to come and just enjoy a cup of tea. They also encourage being honest and vulnerable, often in a church service it can feel like you have to appear "churchy" (though I hope you would not feel that way in our church services!) but meeting casually in a small group tends to break down walls as we get to know one another merely by spending time together. What generally happens is that you find out that none of us are perfect, we all need to learn together, and we are all certainly in need of prayer.

It is my hope that the men's group continues to grow. If you are a man and you have any interest in just coming along then please do, you can contact either myself or Mike Erdman to find out when and where we meet. It really is a very relaxed atmosphere; I can assure you that no one will "preach" at you. It is also my hope that other similar groups will spring up, there is discussion of a women's group forming for example. Recently I had a phone call from a man thinking about moving to the island, one of the questions he asked was about the "community spirit" and whether people got together often, I was happy to inform him that quite often people meet in groups such as the Spinners, the book club, and various other gatherings, societies, and organizations. It would be wonderful if we could meet to grow spiritually. The better we come to know one another the better we will be able to help care for one another and pray for one another. It has often been said that Christianity is not intended to be a religion but a relationship, and that is very true. Firstly, it is of course a relationship with God, but it is also a relationship with others, we were made to fellowship and grow, to teach one another and share about how to practically live out the things of God.
