TEST & PROTECT: A STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE

Following these steps is vital to tackle coronavirus in Scotland





RECOGNISE SYMPTOMS

A new persistent cough, fever, or loss or change in sense of taste or smell means you should immediately begin household isolation. 2



REQUEST A TEST RIGHT AWAY

It is important to get a test as soon as possible. Visit NHSinform.scot/test-and-protect or call 0800 028 2816 if you cannot get online. 3



ISOLATE

Solate for 7 days from symptom start date, longer if fever continues and 48 hours after fever ends. Others you live with should isolate for 14 days.

4



GET TESTED

When isolating, you should only leave home to get tested. There are various ways of having this done. 5



GET RESULTS

They should be with you within 48 hours. 6



PROVIDE DETAILS

If you have coronavirus, NHS contact tracers will contact you to confidentially ask who you have had contact with recently. If you don't have the virus, you and your household can stop isolating.

7



NHS INFORMS CONTACTS

If you have coronavirus, the NHS will contact the people you have had close contact with. Your name will not be shared unless you give permission. All data will be held safely and securely. 8



CLOSE CONTACTS ISOLATE

They will be asked to isolate for 14 days from the last time they had contact with you. 9



HOUSEHOLD OF CLOSE CONTACT

If the close confact has no symptoms, others in their household don't need to isolate. If the close confact develops symptoms, they should follow this guide starting from step 1.

If you do not have community or family support and need essential help, call the National Assistance Helpline on 0800 111 4000 (Mon-Fri Sam-Spm) or via textphone on 0800 111 4114. The helpline is for those who cannot leave their home or get the help they need elsewhere.

Reporting on what your councillor is doing virtually and really as we emerge from "lockdown"



The Covid-19 flare-up in Aberdeen and the recent cluster of cases in Orkney demonstrate just how vulnerable to the disease we remain, and how important it is not to lower our guard until a vaccine is available.

During the recess, I continued to have the odd meeting, for example I was in attendance at a meeting of Papay Community Council, and I participated in a meeting between NHS Orkney and the North Ronaldsay Community Council about the recruitment of a resident advanced nurse practitioner for that island.

Once the recess was over, things didn't get back to "normal" straight away. At the first Special General Meeting, I experienced problems with "Teams" by being redirected to meetings where I was the only participant. Eventually I got into the correct "room". It was like some "Dungeons & Dragons" fantasy world. Then a seminar had to be post-poned on account of disruption caused by electric storms, the damage from which then seemed subsequently to make it difficult for some transport reps to call into the "Teams" Air Services and Ferry Services Consultative Forum meetings (the former has now been rescheduled).

Orkney Ferries increased its "timetable offering" in July, nevertheless, as well as adhering to government rules, the ferries have to be operated in a way to minimise an outbreak of Covid-19 among crewmembers. An infection could mean a whole crew being out of action for several weeks, which would be disastrous for the service. So please bear with any inconvenience.

To maintain my personal and professional integrity, I have resigned from the Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board.

<u>School Meals News</u>: the "Eat Out to Help Out" discount is being offered to pupils and staff in all our school canteens.

The goslings have been busy growing since my last *Letter*. Here they are a month later at the beginning of August.

RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

Many species of bird make themselves easy to observe, some can make observation rather difficult whilst others can make even a reasonable view of itself virtually impossible!

The Water Rail is a perfect example of the latter! The species is a bird of marshy areas and at least one or two pairs probably breed on Stronsay each year – the Matpow, Meikle Water and Bu Loch the most likely areas. A typical view would be of the rear end of a bird scuttling away through dense vegetation on its big feet and long legs - never to be seen again! So it has to be said that Brian and Christine at Cliffdale were extremely lucky not only to see one pecking for grubs etc. along the top of their garden wall, but also for the bird to stay and 'pose' for them right outside the conservatory window! The breeding success story of the year here on Stronsay seems to be the increase in Sand Martins throughout the summer – the two main colonies being in the sandy cliff-faces of Mill Bay and Bomasty Bay. Swallows too appear to have had a good season and it is hoped that Corncrakes are on the rise, as there were several birds calling this summer and 3 young birds were seen by Don Peace near the Airstrip around 20th August. One other success story was reported by Donald Omand at Lower Samsons, where Lesser Redpolls nested – the first breeding record on the island since 2015. A juvenile Robin was seen at Samsonslane in late summer but there had been no reported sightings of adult birds on the island in the breeding season.

Yet another Short-eared Owl was found 'injured' by the roadside by Jim & Fran Miller and quickly taken into care, but after a quick transferal to ourselves and then Jean at Glenmanna it was given a 'once-over' and found to have no broken bones or other obvious injury. Since then there have been several more sightings of the species, including two together at the Matpow Loch. Perhaps they have nested on the island this year?

There have been very few small migrant waders this year during migration - the most unusual being a Green Sandpiper at the Bu loch.- but good numbers of Curlew, Golden Plover and Lapwing have been present – particularly in the fields of recently-cut grass.

One interesting sight has been here at Castle where a Skylark has taken up residence in the drive for the past two weeks or so. Skylarks are almost impossible to find in late Summer/early Autumn as they appear to moult their flight feathers during this period and become flightless for a time.

3 or 4 Wheatears have been seen in the last few days - a sure sign that Autumn is on the way. A brown 'ring-tail' (juvenile or female) Hen Harrier was seen by Sue on 19th.

Records of a bygone age "1st Orkney" - The Stronsay Boy Scouts Troop

As many of us will remember from history lessons at school, Lord Robert Baden-Powell was the founder of the Boy Scouts, a movement that has grown from its beginnings in 1907 with a camp for 20 boys being held on Brownsea Island near Poole, in Dorset, to an organisation with somewhere around 500,000 members in the UK and in excess of 30 million worldwide, these latest numbers now including girls as well as boys...

The movement expanded rapidly from its humble beginnings, reaching as far as Orkney by 1915 when the first troops were formed in the county. Information is fairly sketchy about the formation of these troops but, in an article in the 'Orkney Herald' of 21st April 1915 there is a report (shown below) of a display given by the Stronsay Troop on 16th April that year so it would seem the Troop must have been formed sometime before that.

STRONSAY - BOY SCOUTS DISPLAY

The Stronsay Boy Scouts gave a display in the Drill Hall on Friday, 16th April. Rev. G. Camphell, M.A., Acting Scoutmaster, presided. The following programme was submitted: Solo and chorus, "The Old Superb," R. Chalmers and patrol; Lantern, "Scouts and Scouting," Rev. G. Campbell; folk songs, choir from Junior Guild; recitation, "The Shirker," J. Burgess; sketch, "Three's Company", O. Corse, W. Williamson, F. Carlin; "Professor Puzzlem", H. McLaughlan; violin selections, Scotch and Irish airs, Miss Annie Clyne; solo and chorus, "The Poacher", R. Chalmers and patrol; folk songs, choir from Junior Guild; sketch, "A Helping Hand", R. Chalmers, L. Twatt, J. Burgess, W. Williamson; solo and chorus, "Inisfree", Rev. G. Campbell and patrol; ambulance sketch, patrol; Indian clubs display, patrol; song, "Rule Britanna", patrol; "God Save the King". At the close a number of recruits were enrolled. To Stronsay belongs the distinction of having formed the first troop of Boy Scouts in Orkney. Kirkwall has followed, and we hope this excellent movement will commend itself to other parishes.

The distinction of being first led to the Stronsay group being designated "1st Orkney" Scouts, with Kirkwall becoming "2nd Orkney" soon after and a number of other areas and islands joining up in the months that followed.

One of the main driving forces in starting up the Stronsay Scouts was James Sinclair Gorie, who was born at Clestrain in Stronsay in 1879 and was brought up there before serving as a soldier in the Boer War in South Africa, afterwards remaining there for some time, firstly as part of the newly formed South African Police Force. During his time there he met Lord Baden-Powell, who had also fought in the war and was instrumental in setting up the new Police Force there, and Jim was very impressed with Baden-Powell's ideas on scouting and fieldcraft. These impressions he conveyed by letter and also

carried back home to Stronsay with him when on leave and, as the Boy Scouts movement gathered momentum, it was Jim Gorie who, although by now enrolled with the South African

Union Forces and fighting in France and Flanders in the Great War, did much to encourage leaders and boys in Stronsay to join this new movement.

As a footnote to this, Jim Gorie spent much of his adult life in South Africa but returned to Hazelbank in Stronsay to retire. Not long after the outbreak of the Second World War, Mr Gorie was appointed commanding officer of the newly formed Local Defence Volunteers in Stronsay (later to become the Home Guard) until he moved to Kirkwall in October 1941. This would have been the third war in which he had played an active part.

There seems to be little information about the Scouts then until, in the 'Orcadian' of July 1925 there is a report of the Scouts' annual camp. This was held over a few days in a field at Samson's Lane in Stronsay where troops from Kirkwall, Sanday and Stronsay spent some nights 'under canvas'. It appears that the Stronsay scouts had only recently re-formed after a break and were now under the command of Captain George W G Sutherland of Mount Pleasant, who had himself been in South Africa at the same time as Lord Baden-Powell and Jim Gorie, assisted by Scoutmaster W Munro of Hazelbank. Numerous activities were held and judged during the camp, with the three troops competing for the 'Orkney Flag', which was awarded to what was judged to be the best troop at the camp. The criteria the troops were judged against included personal and camp tidiness, ambulance and first aid competence, signalling ability and a number of sporting events including flat races, long jump and shot putt. There was even a flat race for the troop leaders, where George Sutherland apparently showed the other leaders a clean pair of heels! A dance was held in the evening of their last day of camp where individual prizes were presented to competitors and the Sanday troop was awarded the much coveted County Flag for the best overall performance.

Mrs Nana Peace, who recently celebrated her 100th birthday, recalls that her brother Willie Rendall was in the Scouts around this time and looked very smart in his uniform. On leaving the Scouts he was allowed to keep his kilt, which was part of the uniform at that time. He had little notion to wear the kilt again so, on seeing all the material in the kilt, her mother unpicked it all and made a skirt each of Nana and her sister Maggie out of the cloth! She said she loved the skirt and wore it regularly for some time.

Moving into the 1930s, the Scouts continued to flourish, with up to thirty boys in the Stronsay troop taking part in all kinds of field work and activities and also putting on displays and concerts for the local folk. Oliver Stewart, an Irishman who had married a Stronsay lass and was Customs officer in the island, was the enthusiastic leader of the Scouts for a number of years ably assisted by local man Peter Lennie and teacher John D Mackay.

With the outbreak of war in 1939, Mr Stewart was called away to serve elsewhere and the Stronsay Scouts came to a stop for the duration of the war. It seems that, after the end of the war in 1945, few boys were interested in reforming and no leader could be found willing to take on this responsibility. Sadly, to date the Stronsay Scouts have never reformed but who knows what the future may bring and we may yet see 1st Orkney Scouts to the fore once more.

I only discovered recently that my late father Sam Cooper had been a Scout in the mid-1920s and had the distinction of winning the under 13s shot putt competition as well as coming second (along with Peter Jackson) in the three legged race during the Stronsay camp of 1925!

My late father in law Bob Chalmers was also a Scout, this time in the late 1930s, something he enjoyed very much, and he passed on some of this information to me, particularly regarding the involvement of Jim Gorie in the formation of the Scouts.

When we were clearing out Bob Chalmers' house after he passed away, his daughter came across a small compass attached to a 1937 thrupenny bit and wondered if this could have had something to do with his involvement in the Scouts. Has anyone seen something similar to this, or have any idea what this would have been or what significance it had? His family would love to know!

If anyone has more information about the Stronsay Scouts or photos of any of them I would be delighted to hear of it.




