

### PLASTIC RECYCLING

The Stronsay Plastic Recycling Trial inaugurated in 2019 for a twelve-month period has come to an end. The container used for recycling types 1 (PET) and 2 (HDPE) plastic has been removed from the recycling area located in Whitehall Village and there are no plans for this to be returned at the present time.

The trial was run in conjunction with Orkney Islands Council, Stronsay Development Trust and Stronsay Community Council.

The results of the trial are not yet known and residents are advised that for the time being plastic items be deposited in the household waste for collection every Tuesday.

<u>Alternatively</u> these can be taken to the Hatston recycling centre where containers are available for recycling plastic items.

### **RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS**

As regards migration, this Autumn has been a bit of a flop! The east winds promised by the forecasters time after time did not materialise, and as a result, many of the smaller bird species normally recorded on the island at this time of year did not turn up. It has been a very similar Autumn to that of 1989 in this respect.

But as ever there were a few surprises and probably the best of these has been the most recent – Whooper Swans have arrived in big numbers. including a group of 40 birds on the Matpow Loch. Over 100 have been seen on the Lea Shun loch and a small number on the Meikle Water. Good numbers of duck have also arrived and the wintering waders are back in abundance in the pastureland – several hundreds of Golden Plover and Curlew – all in areas recently vacated by the Greylag Geese.

Don Peace and Julie both saw a Snowy Owl at Samsonslane/Bay on 29th September – 'As white as my geese.' in Don's words. And at the other end of the spectrum a party ('Funeral') of Ravens developed at Gesty around the same time. There were big arrivals of Robins from the continent which are now well-distributed around the farm-yards and gardens.

A mixture of finches began to arrive in early October including Siskins, Brambling and Chaffinches, and single Hawfinches were found feeding in gardens - at Cliffdale and Gesty Dishes (Clearly different birds – see photos). Amazingly single Water Rails were seen in both gardens later in the month! (See photo of Gesty Dishes bird).

Warblers were few and far between but there were half a dozen or so Yellowbroweds (See photo), and one or two Lesser Whitethroats and Chiffchaffs. A few Stonechats arrived in mid-October and 3-4 Ring Ouzels were seen – all briefly as usual! Two Red-backed Shrikes were seen – both in gardens – at Lower Millfield and Slap, but both were as ever very wary and difficult to photograph even from the confines of the car! (see photos).

Another encouraging sign has been the number of Hen Harrier sightings – daily – and at least three different birds have been present, including at least one adult male ('grey' bird).

Donald Omand saw a Common Crossbill at Lower Samsons in mid-October and a Little Grebe (Dabchick) and drake Pintail at the Matpow Loch on 22nd, by which time there were good numbers of thrushes arriving in the NE airflow – mostly Redwings, followed by mainly Fieldfares and Blackbirds.

And just in time - 4 Long-tailed Ducks in Mill Bay alongside the reserve on 25th! Thanks for all the calls. John & Sue.

Importantly, **the value of R depends on human behaviour**, hence my recent letters to the press condemning our Council Leader's reckless statements about the Covid-19 containment policy.

Westray Golf Course may claim to have the UK's longest hole (738 yards, par 6), but here at Sanday's West Manse we have what is believed to be Scotland's shortest golf course. Appropriately (or ironically), its sole hole is dedicated to Charles Russell Clayton Ross, Baron of Biggar, who once played it whilst visiting his aunt, the late Mrs Binkie Bell of West Langamay.



The tee to the first (and last) hole at midnight at the winter solstice In a seminar on Orkney's bus services, I advocated that Orkney Ferries (renamed "Transport for Orkney") take on the running of Orkney's buses as a first step towards achieving integrated transport for our islands. Although efficient integrated transport systems are normal all over the continent, it seems to be a step too far for the collective Orkney Islands Council mindset. (Continued on next page) Our Policy & Resources Committee (P&R) went on all day until nearly 6 pm! Reiterating my point that the North Isles Ward possesses 48% of the coastline of Orkney and therefore deserves 48% of Orkney's Crown Estate Scotland revenue funding (see July issue of my *Letter*), I did not support OIC's Climate Change Officer post being financed from this fund, but I did support £15,000 from that fund being awarded to Shapinsay Development Trust towards its Island Housing Project.

The Special General Meeting to appoint a new chief executive (for which we were suitably spaced-out in the New Phoenix Cinema) was the first meeting since "lockdown" that we have actually attended physically. It went on for even longer than the abovementioned P&R meeting—over 11 hours! And after due deliberation, we decided not to appoint any of the candidates.

It has taken two years, but at last, at the Monitoring & Audit Committee meeting, it was announced that my suggested new comments/complements/complaints card (see picture below) is soon going to be issued. I have managed to arrange that complaints will still be able to be made vie e-mail without the rigmarole of registering on "My Orkney" (although this option will be available too, along with phoning and writing), and also in person (once normal times return) at the island link offices.

At a Special General Meeting about the Islands Growth Deal, I expressed my extreme concern that the proposed Orkney-specific projects disproportionately benefit the Stromness & South Isles Ward (the Council Leader's ward)—a concern that was elaborated upon further by Cllr Heddle. Unfortunately, commercial confidentially limits what we are able to reveal publicly.

Other meetings I have attended virtually this month include: a members' session with the Chief Executive; Eday CC; Papay CC; a meeting between councillors and our senior management team; Orkney Ferries Board; Westray CC; a ward meeting of the three North Isles councillors, and Stronsay CC. I was also interviewed on BBC Radio Orkney about the Island Games.

Community council meetings coming up: North Ronaldsay; Rousay, Egilsay, Wyre & Gairsay; Sanday, and Shapinsay.

Congratulations to Heather Woodbridge on her election. She has usurped me as the youngest of the North Isles councillors!

### Records of a bygone age The wreck of the Charlotte

On 2<sup>nd</sup> February 1883, the Bremen registered barque Charlotte left Antwerp bound for New York with a cargo of pig iron, steel wire and a large number of empty petroleum casks. The 1370 ton vessel, under the command of Ship's Master E Gutsmuths, was three days into her journey when a strong south-easterly gale blew up, with the resulting weather and sea conditions leading to poor visibility which in turn made navigation extremely difficult. Early in the morning of 6<sup>th</sup> February when, by the captain's reckoning, they should be making passage through the channel between Orkney and Fair Isle, a light was seen intermittently in the distance but it was found impossible to ascertain if this was on land or the lights of another vessel. Being unsure of his true position but suspecting that this could be Fair Isle, the captain took the fateful decision to alter course to pass this light on his starboard side. A few minutes later, land and breaking seas were seen dead ahead and, still under the impression this could be Fair Isle, (this must in all probability have been the point of Grice Ness on Stronsay, about 40 miles south west of his estimated position) the captain again altered course to port, but sadly only minutes later, around 4 o' clock in the morning, struck hard in the little bay known as the Sandy Geo on the north side of the Mill Bay, just a little south of the point of Grice Ness.

It was fortunate that the vessel grounded there, where the seabed was reasonably flat, and not to have taken bottom further north on the point of the promontory where jagged rocks rose steeply from the seabed and where the combination of dangerous rocks and the heavy seas running at the time would soon have caused her to break up completely, with little hope of the crew reaching safety. Having grounded at around low water, she was slowly driven further ashore as the tide rose, hammering on the rocks all the while, and by eight o' clock that morning the decision was made to cut away the foremast which, when done, carried part of the mainmast along with it. This cutting away of a mast was fairly standard practice to help stabilise the hull of a vessel which had taken shore and was aimed at reducing the risk of the ship rolling over.

With the ship in a perilous condition and in danger of breaking up at any time, the 25-

strong crew abandoned ship, all reaching shore safely. while the Captain made the decision to stay with his ship. The following evening, it was reported that the mate had decided to return to the vessel at low tide and was now back on board. Next morning. the 8th of February, he was to be seen standing on the foredeck waving flag as if for a assistance but, with a heavy sea still running. the weather was too severe for a boat to put out to him. The ship

was now rapidly breaking up, with the keel having parted from the rest of the ship and being driven well up the beach, while the rest of the ship could be seen to be cracked in three places.

By the 10<sup>th</sup> of February, the captain and mate had been taken off the vessel and, with the storm now eased, surveyors had an opportunity to inspect the Charlotte at close quarters. They noted that she was lying on rocks with seven feet of water alongside at low water, the hull was badly strained and that she was waterlogged between the fore and main masts. Their recommendation was that the vessel should be sold, as the expense to attempt to refloat and repair the ship would be more than her value. This recommendation was soon acted upon, with adverts placed in the local press offering her for sale by public auction:

#### SALE OF VALUABLE WRECK

To be sold by auction, on Wednesday, 28th March current, at Stronsay, Orkney, the HULL and MASTS of the ship Charlotte, 1,371 tons register, and her whole MATERIAL and OUTFIT, comprising Anchors, Chains, Spars, Sails, Ropes, Canvas, Water Tanks, Stores, Donkey Engine, Furniture, Boats and Provisions; also, a large quantity Dunnage Wood.

Ship believed to be built of Oak and Pitch Pine, fastened with yellow metal bolts below water line, and is sheathed with yellow metal about 23 feet up.

Steamer Orcadia leaves Kirkwall for Stronsay a.m. on the day of Sale. For further particulars, apply P. S. Heddle, Lloyd's agent, Kirkwall.

The 'yellow metal' referred to, an alloy of 60% copper and 40% zinc, was stronger and considerably cheaper than pure copper bolts and sheathing and was widely used in ship construction from the mid-1800s on. The fact that she was sheathed with this metal 'about 23 feet up' gives some indication of the sheer size of this vessel! Dunnage wood was apparently low value wood which was used to help store and secure the cargo in the hold or to fill any voids to help make up a full cargo.

It was reported the following week that "The hull of the German barque 'Charlotte', wrecked at Stronsay, Orkney, was sold by the underwriters on Thursday, and purchased by Provost Reid, Kirkwall, for £480."

Much of the cargo had been salvaged, presumably by J&W Tait's of Kirkwall who carried out salvage work at that time and who advertised the cargo for sale:

FOR SALE, about 150 Tons of BLACK STEEL WIRE salved from the "Charlotte" of Bremen, stranded at Stronsay, Orkney Islands. Said Wire is suitable for Fencing and other purposes, and will be exposed for Sale by Public Roup on Wednesday the 16th day of May current (weather permitting) at 1 o' clock P.M. in one or in such other lots as may be fixed on at the sale.

For further information apply to Messrs J. & W. TAIT, Merchants, Broad Street, Kirkwall; or to Mr WILLIAM COWPER, Victoria Street, there.

With much of the farmland of Orkney still to be partitioned off into fields as we see them today, I'm left wondering just how much local demand there would have been for 150 tons of black fencing wire which had been immersed in salt water for some considerable time!

The empty petroleum barrels were also successfully salvaged but this too wasn't without its problems as, on 28<sup>th</sup> August that same year, the cargo ship SS Queen from Aberdeen, on its way to pick up the salvaged casks, grounded on a shoal close to Whitehall Pier while coming into the harbour under the guidance of a pilot. She was got off without damage, loading the next day before heading south complete with a cargo of 2000 empty barrels.

At 1370 tons, the Charlotte was a large ship, not dissimilar in size to the Edenmore which was wrecked on Papa Stronsay 26 years later but, unlike the Edenmore, there seems to be no local folklore attached to this vessel or its salvage. The only local snippet that I believe could be relevant to the Charlotte came from Ingram Shearer of Airy as related to him by the late Bill Miller, who told of his father and another local fisherman discovering a quantity of

pig iron 'in the ebb' at the back of the Village, some of which they picked up and used as ballast for their fishing boats. As there was no mention of the pig iron the Charlotte was carrying being salvaged, there is a strong possibility this could have been some of her cargo which may not have been worth the effort of salvaging at the time. We'll likely never know now, but it would be interesting to go down there some day to have a 'rake about in the ebb' to see what can be found!



At the General Meeting of Stronsay Community Council held on Monday 19 October 2020, the attached list details the names and contact details of the Community Council office bearers for 2020/21, in addition to details of the other Community Council members.

The role of a Community Councillor is to ensure that they work for the best interests of the whole community and remain representative of, and accountable to, the represented community.

The Chairman is elected from the members of their council on an annual basis and has responsibility to ensure the meetings of the council are properly conducted and for seeing that matters are decided so that subsequent action can be taken on the Community Council's instructions.

Community Councils are asked to establish a Transport Representative and a Planning Representative.

The Transport Representative represents the views of fellow residents and Community Council members at the Air Services and Ferry Services Consultative Forums which meet regularly with representatives from Orkney Islands Council and the North Isles Community Councils.

The Planning Representative is authorised to consult directly with the Planning Authority to obtain further information on applications for their area which they consider may be contentious, and once this information has been received, consult with other members of the Community Council.

A Clerk is employed by Orkney Islands Council to provide assistance and advice to the Community Council in addition to the more obvious administrative role. The Island Link Officer role includes the duties undertaken by the Clerk.

The post of Island Link Officer operates under the auspices of Orkney Islands Council's Empowering Communities Project, to assist in the delivery and management of council services at a local level.

If there is a Council funded service you would like to see on Stronsay, have any ideas on how Council-run services can be improved, or would like to raise a concern or issue with the Community Council, then please do not hesitate to contact any of the Community Council members.

I can order goods via email from the island's well-stocked shops and pay via BACS after the goods are delivered to my door - I am particularly thankful for this as I've been "shielding" during coronavirus.

I have good neighbours who collect my prescriptions and give me lifts to/from the ferry when necessary.

The medical team at Geramount make house calls and always go the extra mile in handling problems with my long-term illnesses.

Specialists at Balfour Hospital provide advice and treatment as necessary.

Orkney Ferries provide me with safe transport to/from mainland.

Craigie's taxis provide me with a reliable service between the ferry and Balfour Hospital. Castlehill Construction will turn out at all hours and in all weathers to deal with emergencies such as a burst water tank or a blocked drain.

SSE will make every effort to provide a continuous supply of electricity, carrying out repairs in all sorts of weather and providing generators if supply interruptions are lengthy.

I am sure that I have missed out other things for which I should be thankful but I think that is a representative list.

We are grateful for the way Viv kept the shop going. That she continued to keep as much stock as possible - even though we know there were shortages. The orders were made up promptly - despite the fact that payment was delayed. She went the extra mile.

To Jim for keeping things going - bringing in goods so we could fill our time. We know he had precious little time in Kirkwall and that everything was a rush

To Tara and John for making, and delivering, meals to those that were shielding.

And, of course, to the posties, the first responders, to everyone who's played a part in keeping things as 'normal' as possible - in these extraordinary times.

It's been a different sort of year with Covid 19 restrictions being a major feature. Of course, the rest of the natural world is taking no notice and the seasons come and pass regardless. I have enjoyed working with nature growing vegetables and being able to supply several individuals and the Peedie Larder project. Ironically, where the economy is taking a terrible hit, my plants have grown well and, in many cases, better than predicted.
