IMPORTANCE OF VITAMIN D

From Geramount Surgery

You may know that vitamin D is important in supporting bone and muscle health. A small amount can be absorbed from our diet, but most of it comes from sunlight. Not so much in Scotland though – although 15-20 minutes of sunlight daily (equivalent of both arms from a t-shirt sleeve down) is enough to top up your stores, we only get the right 'type' of sunlight from April to September, mostly from 11am-3pm.

The Chief Medical Officer in Scotland advises that we should all consider taking a daily 10 microgram (400 units) vitamin D supplement, especially during the winter months (beginning of October to end of March inclusive): these can be bought over the counter in the chemist or a supermarket, or online - some places have 3 for 2 offers. Please do use them! (and don't forget to use sunblock once you've had your 20 minutes - sadly we can still burn even this far north!)

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place (actually from West Manse) Keeping the folk of the North Isles ward informed — with Orkney's only councillor newsletter

Success! Albeit I had to concede a year's extension to my deadline, but at the General Meeting on the 7th December, my Notice of Motion, now reading "That the Council install as soon as practicable, but not later than the end of 2023, a 20mph zone or speed limit on the roads in the vicinity of each of those schools in Orkney that still do not have one", received unanimous support. A potential source of finance for the project has been identified within OIC's "Renewable Energy, Redevelopment & Regeneration Fund". I wish to thank my counter-signatories, Councillors Richards, Sankey, Scott, Cowie, Heddle, Craigie and Dawson, and I am grateful for the support I have received from parent councils and from Police Scotland. The lead-up and conclusion was extensively reported on *BBC Radio Orkney* and (not particularly accurately) in *The Orcadian*. If I am reelected in May, I shall be working to ensure this deadline is met, so that Isles' pupils (North and South) will enjoy the same road-safety standards as are normal elsewhere.

We had a full-on Policy & Resources Committee agenda, necessitating an additional "special" meeting to get through all the business. It was heartening to hear about a proposed new waste facility that "will enable the collection of a greater range of materials from both the Mainland and island communities and assist to moving towards an equitable service to all areas of Orkney". I said I would be keeping an eye on things to ensure that commitment to island communities and an equitable service to all areas of Orkney is not forgotten. I am aware that island recycling facilities are currently not being emptied in a timely manner, and I have been speaking to officials about this. If you see that a unit is about to fill up, please contact the Council on 01856-873535 without delay, or e-mail customerservice@orkney.gov.uk .

I've had a couple of other "behind the scenes meetings" with officials. A meeting was arranged between me and the senior leisure staff to discuss the situation with the Isles' swimming pools, and I've met Kane Davidson, our new Airfield Manager. Kane is appealing to Eday folk to apply to become airfield attendants, because if fewer than 3 trained personnel are available for duty at the airfield, flight operations cannot take place, and extra staff are also needed to cover for sickness and holidays. *(continued on next page)*me.

I have been to two Christmas-tree lighting events. One was in Sanday and the other in Shapinsay, where the community council had invited me to speak. I told the crowd assembled outdoors about the origin of the Christmas tree, which goes back to AD 723 and the Devonian Saint Boniface, "Apostle to the Germans", who has a church dedicated to him on Papa Westray.

Also "made in Devon" (in AD 1973) is the *Golden Mariana*, which is back doing sterling service while her Norwegian replacement (built AD 2012), *Nordic Sea* undergoes repairs.

At a public ("Teams") meeting of the Dounreay Stakeholder Group, I asked the Stakeholder Manager of the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority whether he will be engaging with communities north of the Pentland Firth when it comes to distributing socioeconomic benefits. He said he will arrange a meeting with me.

Other meetings I have attended "virtually" this month include a Special Education, Leisure & Housing Committee meeting; a confidential meeting of members and the Chief Executive; and the community council meetings of Shapinsay, Stronsay, Eday, and Papa Westray.

We still have a few more meetings before the Christmas recess, the last being a Special General Meeting on 23rd December. After that, on 12th January, some of us will be gathering ("virtually") with community council transport reps at the Air Forum and Ferry Forum meetings, to set timetables for next winter, to discuss transport service problems, and to try to initiate improvements. I've already mentioned our new Airfield Manager; we also have a new Ferry Services Manager, Helen Inkster.

May I wish everyone in the North Isles a very merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year!

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Records of a bygone age The first S.S. Saint Rognvald – Part 3

A common theme in all the passengers' accounts of the grounding of the Rognvald and of their subsequent rescue was praise for the Twatt family of Odiness farm and the families of neighbouring farms, who had done everything humanly possible to attend to their welfare. One of many such notes of thanks was recorded in the Orkney Herald at the time, contained in a 'Letter to the Editor' from one of the Rognvald's passenger that night, a gentleman from the island of Whalsay:

A PASSENGER'S THANKS,

Dear Mr Editor,

Be pleased through the columns of your paper, to tender our sincere thanks to Mrs James Twatt and family, also the nearby farms, for their Christian Benevolence in attending to our wants, both inwardly and outwardly, on the morning of our ship wreck and stranding. Many of us were only half clad and some wet through.

A.I., Whalsay, Shetland

The following month, on the 8^{th} of May, the wreck of the St Rognvald was offered for sale by public auction at Kirkwall. As she was now completely underwater in a difficult location and also badly holed, bidding was slow and she was eventually bought by Kirkwall merchant James Tait for £79. It was reported that some other articles which had been salvaged off the wreck, including some furnishings, realised good prices.

Mr Tait later employed the services of a diver and also engaged a salvage steamer to see if it was possible firstly to refloat the St Rognvald, which seemed highly unlikely, and secondly to try to salvage as much of the vessel as possible. It did indeed prove impossible to refloat the vessel and I can find no record of how much was salvaged but, although she is now badly broken up, much of the wreckage can still be seen by those diving in the area. The largest section is about 40m long and the engine, the boiler and some of the other larger parts of the ship are apparently still clearly visible in 6-8 metres of water, which makes it a good and popular dive site.

A Board of Trade inquiry into the wreck of the St Rognvald opened at Aberdeen on 29th of May that year. Giving evidence at the enquiry John Masson, the captain of the Rognvald at the time of the incident, gave evidence, saying that the first mate James Leask was in charge of the ship at the time she ran ashore. He was unable to say whether there was enough fog at the time to affect visibility to the extent that land couldn't be seen and also stated that he couldn't understand why the ship should have been so far off course. He also said that he had been in command of vessels on the same voyage for 41 years and had never found his course affected to such an extent. The first and second mates were then questioned regarding the course they had steered but neither of them could account for her going ashore. At the end of the enquiry the Board of Trade's findings were that the St Rognvald had been navigated at too great a speed considering the state of the weather and the circumstances of the locality. It also found that the first officer in charge of the vessel had failed to navigate her in a proper manner. *(continued on next page)*

The loss of the vessel was attributed to James Leask, the first mate, and his certificate was suspended for three months, while no blame was attached to the captain, John Masson.

Very soon after the St Rognvald was wrecked, the North of Scotland Orkney and Shetland Steam Navigation Company, to give them their full name once again, approached the Aberdeen Steam Navigation company seeking to charter a temporary replacement for the St Rognvald on the North run. The vessel that was agreed short-term was the steamship Ban-Righ and she carried out the service for a number of weeks until she was replaced by the steamship City of Aberdeen, which was to continue the service for several months.

The North Company were by now looking to build a replacement for the St Rognvald; this new vessel was to be 10 feet shorter, have 3 feet more beam and be of less draft than the old Rognvald, but able to carry more cargo. Her specifications included all the most recent improvements in hull and engine design, with extensive accommodation for first and second class passengers. About 20 shipbuilders in the United Kingdom tendered for the vessel but the successful company was again Hall, Russell and Company of Aberdeen who had built the old St Rognvald. Little more than a year after the St Rognvald met her end on Burgh Head, the new ship was ready, being launched in Aberdeen in May 1901 and being given the honour of carrying on the name of St Rognvald, a name that two more of this ship's successors were also to carry.

Part of the aft deckhouse of the St Rognvald was one of a number of items salvaged from the wreck and it was later erected in the garden of a house in Dundas Crescent in Kirkwall. This house had been built by George Robertson, who was the founder and later manager of the Orkney Steam Navigation Company Ltd, later to become the Orkney Islands Shipping Company, the forerunner of today's Orkney Ferries. George and the Company's vessels were heavily involved in salvage operations and it may well have been through his connections with this that he acquired the part of the deckhouse known as the Smoking Room. When this house was sold, the deck house was included in the title deeds as follows: 'the dwelling house and other buildings erected thereon including the small wooden house known as the Smoking Room in the garden forming part of the subject hereby disponed.'

Sadly, when the current owners bought the house, it was found that the deckhouse had suffered too many years of neglect and was beyond repair so it had to be dismantled and disposed of. Many thanks to Erlend Johnston for the information and photo regarding this relic of the past.

Another, and possibly the last, visible reminder of the St Rognvald is a charming little summer house in another Kirkwall garden, this time in Willow Road, and I was delighted to be allowed to take some photos and to hear a little of its history from the owner.

It too had fallen into disrepair but had still been in good enough condition to enable it to be renovated, which had been done to great effect. The roof of the summerhouse consisted of skylights with a lovely etched glass design which could all have been swung open on brass sliders while the side windows, also of patterned glass, were protected by removable wooden shutters with brass rails, presumably to protect the glass from heavy seas. On studying photos of the old St Rognvald, I think this may well have been the ventilation housing off the top of the deckhouse and is a fascinating reminder of a proud old ship in her glory days.


