<u>Relief Airfield Attendant, Rescue and Fire Fighting Crew</u> (Eday, North Ronaldsay, and Stronsay)

Hours are offered on an as and when required basis £14.46 / £14.87 per hour (including Distant Islands Allowance) A shift allowance will be paid for unsocial hours worked where appropriate

Applications are invited from self-motivated individuals who can provide, on a relief basis, cover for holiday and sickness absence when requested and available. A condition of this post is that you will be resident on Eday/North Ronaldsay/Stronsay (as applicable) as you will be required to respond at short notice and during evenings/weekends.

Duties will include airfield attendant, rescue and fire fighting services while receiving and dispatching flights to the Island Airfield. The service includes baggage handling, preparing and, if necessary, operating the fire tender, maintaining apron control, keeping the airfield building clean and tidy, operating the phone/radio transmitter and inspecting runways and the airfield in general. In an emergency you will provide rescue and fire fighting and first aid services as required.

Applicants should hold a full and current driving licence, to drive a car/small van in the UK or, where a full licence is not held, should have a current provisional licence and will be required to achieve a full licence within 2 years of appointment.



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ORKNEY FERRIES—REFIT TIMETABLE FOR ONE WEEK STARTING MON 4 NOVEMBER

An additional passenger service will operate between Sanday, Stronsay, Eday and Kirkwall whilst the MV Earl Sigurd is away to have a new crane fitted.

The North Isles vessel will go to Peterhead from 4-8 November for the works to be completed. During this period, an additional passenger service shall operate between the islands and Kirkwall with the MV Nordic Sea, subject to weather conditions.

The remaining North Isles vessels, MV Varagen and MV Earl Thorfinn, will operate the refit timetable during this period.

Chair of the Board of Orkney Ferries, Councillor Mellissa Thomson said: "The Board are acutely aware of the impacts to Sanday, Stronsay and Eday by removing one of the ferries from the service. The MV Nordic Sea will provide additional frequency for passengers during this short period of time. Usage of the passenger service will be monitored to determine if it is viable to consider further passenger sailings during the Outer North Isles refit period, subject to budget availability."

WANTED - USHERS

The Screen Machine is making a much welcome return visit to Stronsay. The films to be shown include Beetlejuice Beetlejuice, Joker: Foilie a Deux, Despicable Me 4, The Outrun, Since Yesterday, Lee+ Shadowplay (captioned) and The Room Next Door.

Ushers are required to support the Screen Machine which can offer a payment of $\pounds 12$ an hour but people can also usher on a voluntary basis if they prefer. Ushers are required for the following dates and times:

Saturday 16 November- 4.30pm and 7.30pm Sunday 17 November – 2pm, 5.30pm and 8.30pm Monday 18 November – 5.30pm and 8.30pm

One usher per screening is required. Here's what ushering involves -

- Be present at the Screen Machine 30 minutes before the start of each screening.
- Ensure that all audience members entering the cinema have a valid ticket and meet the appropriate age requirements for that screening unless instructed otherwise by the Screen Machine Operator
- Be present in the auditorium for the entire duration of all film screenings.
- Ensure that audience members behave in a responsible manner and do not disturb other cinemagoers. Any persistent misbehaviour or dangerous/unlawful activity, any incidents of actual assault, any incidents involving smoke/fire, any incidents of mechanical or structural failure must be reported to the Operator immediately.
- Ensure that all cigarettes, e-cigarettes, cigars and pipes are extinguished prior to entry.
- Ensure that alcoholic beverages are not consumed in the auditorium.
- Sit in an area close to the main entry/exit to assist patrons with the door and to ensure its closure after opening.
- Remain in the auditorium until all patrons have left at the end of the screening.
- Assist the Operator to bag litter after each screening.
- Follow emergency procedures as directed by the Operator, typically directing the audience to both emergency exits during any emergency situation/evacuation. However, the Operator will take all final decisions in the event of an emergency.

OUTER NORTH ISLES TIMETABLE – SUMMER 2025

The Orkney Islands Council Service Manager – Transportation, has advised that unfortunately, the amendments proposed to the Outer North Isles timetable cannot be accommodated by Orkney Ferries Ltd at this time due to the implications this would have to the maintenance/training schedule, crewing hours and hours of work regulations. The Transportation Service and Orkney Ferries Ltd are currently looking at alternative ways to serve the Outer North Isles during Summer 2025, including the possibility of a passenger vessel, in preparation of the future trials by electric passenger vessel later in 2025. This proposal will be subject to crewing availability and budget. Further consultation with the relevant transport representatives and stakeholders will be undertaken prior to timetable setting for any proposed passenger service.

Background

The draft timetables in respect of ferry services to be operated by Orkney Ferries Limited during summer 2025 was presented to the Ferry Services Consultative Forum for consideration on 20 August 2024 following a period of consultation with communities. The draft timetables and feedback from the Ferry Services Consultative Forum was presented to the Board of Orkney Ferries on 5 September 2024.

The report and draft timetables will be considered by the Development and Infrastructure Committee on 12 November 2024.

Outer North Isles Timetable

For operational reasons, the Monday and Wednesday sailings to Westray have been amended to revert to 1035 from 1200. The later sailing was trialled during summer 2024 however the timetable change did not provide sufficient turnaround time for crew to carry out essential maintenance checks.

A request was made from the Westray Transport Representative to amend the sailings to 1300 as it was more suitable for the community. Following consideration by Orkney Ferries it was noted that this request could not be accommodated as it would have an impact to the timetable and crewing hours.

An amendment to the timetable was made on Friday mornings to give a more realistic arrival time to Kirkwall, noting that the arrival times are often delayed. This affected the Sanday arrival into Kirkwall due to delays on the loading of the Papa Westray vessel and only one linkspan.

It was noted by all North Isles Transport Representatives that the Friday timetable pushed the vessels to arrive later at Kirkwall which was not a preferred option. For example, the Stronsay/Eday vessel would arrive at 1120 instead of 1100.

It was noted that the loss of overnighting in the isles has meant the loss of early morning sailings on a Wednesday and Friday morning and due to crewing hours, it is not feasible to start the operating day earlier without pulling back the timetable elsewhere.

To address the comments received from members of the community about delays to Kirkwall and conflicts with appointment times, the summer 2024 timetable now better reflects the arrival times into Kirkwall, noting that earlier times cannot be achieved due to crewing hours.

A passenger service covering the Outer North Isles will be explored further with the view to implement during summer 2025 ahead of the ZEVI trial period. This service could potentially provide early morning connectivity which was lost following the loss of overnighting the vessels in the isles. This will be explored furthear by Orkney Ferries and will be subject to budget availability.

The Outer North Isles Sunday Excursion timetable will be finalised once all key dates are received back from communities.

Accompanying the above update is a DRAFT of the Summer 2025 Outer North Isles ferry timetable *(see next page)*.

HARVEST THANKSGIVING

Stronsay's kirk held its annual Harvest Thanksgiving service on Sunday 20 October 2024. Records of a Bygone Age Flag fences, ditches and dry-stone dykes Part 3 Squaring, ditching and draining

Last month we left Rev Simpson sitting comfortably in his new Manse and happily working his glebe land, the farming of which had been highlighted as an outstanding example of progressive agricultural practice.

Although apparently a good preacher and well enough liked by his congregation, it was thought by some that he spent too much time caring for his glebe land and not enough tending to his flock. This may have been part of the reason that members of Rev Simpson's Established Church congregation were gradually drifting away to the new Secession (later United Presbyterian) Church and, by the mid-1830s, it was reported that only around 30 were attending the Established Church while around 300 were attending the Secession Church.

The Manse continued to be the Established Church manse until their union with the United Free Church in 1929 and fell into disrepair soon after. It's great to see it recently fully restored into a lovely family home once more.

Some of the larger properties too were being improved and we can see that when the farm of Holland was advertised for sale in the John o' Groat's Journal in July 1838 it had already been much improved and enclosed, partly with newly built stone dykes. The going rate for dyke building around this time was around 4d a fathom for a dyke four feet high and uncoped. In today's terms that would be about 1.7p for 1.8m of dyke with a height of 1.2m before having the cope (what Orcadians would call ragstones) added.

Ist, FARM and LANDS of HOLLAND and DISHES, hying on the South side of the Island of Stronsay, comprehending Arable, Grass, and Pasture Land, beth Indeld and Outfield. This property has many advantages, being the finest in Orkney, and was for several years in the natural possession of the Proprietor, under an improved system of Husbandry, and brought into a high state of cultivation, and is now Let to a most respectable Tenant. The Feu Duties of Holland have been hought up, and those of Dishes are triffing. The Teinds are valued and exhausted. A new Manse was built only three years ago, and a new Church only a few years before, and the public burdens are of small amount.

The House and Offices are new and commodious, and the Dykes and Enclosures in good order and condition. Besides the Land Rent, the shores produce from 15 to 20 tons of Kelp annually, and the whole Island in which it is situated, is rapidly rising in value by the advancement of the Herring fighing, and increasing facilities of communication and access to Markets for disposal of produce. &c.

to Markets for disposal of produce, &c. The Farm is also well situated on the East side of the Bay of Roth'ssholm, and is near the peats. Any Purchaser wishing to extend his possessions in this quarter, will, in all likelihood, soon have an exportunity of acquiring one or two adjacent Farms, which, with this, would form one of the most compact and otherwise desirable properties in the County. The upset price will be only £4,400 stering.

This advert for the sale of Holland in the July 1838 John o'Groat's Journal paints a picture of a progressive farm already much improved

The reference to a new Church and Manse having been recently built as stated in the advert seems rather strange to us today but certainly had relevance at that time. With the ownership of heritable property in a parish went the obligation to pay the teinds (a form of tax, originally a tenth of total income), a part of which went to pay the minister's stipend and keep the parish church and manse in repair, so it would be of benefit to a prospective purchaser to know that they would be unlikely to have any major fees imposed for repairs to church or manse for some considerable time.

By now the speed of change was gathering momentum, with some of the lairds looking south to central Scotland to find experienced managers to put these new ideas into practice. These changes had been greatly assisted in 1831 by a 'planking' process similar to that carried out in the late 1700s (where the old 'runrigs' were merged into larger plots of land), but on a much more radical scale. To distinguish it from the earlier planking this process came to be commonly known as 'squaring' for reasons that will soon become apparent. The 'out-by' common grazing was nearly all taken in hand (with one notable exception being what was known as the 'Crofter's Hill' on the House-bay lands, where 12 crofts retained the right to grazing on common land) and each tenant or cottar was allocated an area of land in proportion to that previously farmed, all in one manageable block. The allocated area was then divided up into fields of what was believed to be a practical size. What was reckoned a practical size depended very much on the size of the farm and could vary from an acre or two on the smallest croft to 50 acres or more on the larger farms.

Although rotational cropping was being practised by some in a small way, this now became the basis of accepted practice, the necessity of which was often written into the farm lease. No longer was any cultivable land permanently sown to grain but instead was farmed on a five year rotation, with a field sown to grain (oats or bere) in year 1, neeps or tatties in year 2, oats in year 3 and then grass in years 4 and 5. This rotation did much to influence the differences in field sizes noted previously, as there needed to be a minimum of 5 fields of roughly equal size to enable this system to be put into practice.

The ideal field was set off as a square or rectangle if possible (hence the imaginatively named 'squaring) and, failing that, with at least two sides parallel to each other to make for easier cultivation. This ideal was often thwarted by farm boundaries, topography or coastline, with no option but to lay out some very oddly shaped fields indeed!

Once these boundaries had been laid down, a great number of ditches were dug, partly to define boundaries but mainly to help water run off the fields. If the land was wet then a system of drains was also dug with the water from them feeding into the ditches, eventually finding an outfall into loch or sea.

In 1848 this drainage was encouraged by government loan assistance and was often, as in the case of the Airy Estate, part of the condition of lease, where a given amount of drains had to be dug annually, being inspected as work went on to make sure that they complied to specified width and depth specifications. These drains were mainly what was termed as 'coupled drains', with flat stones set on their edge and coupled together in an inverted 'V' shape to leave an open drainage channel between them before being backfilled with the spoil previously removed from the drain. This was a very labour intensive but extremely effective method of improving the land, costing the lairds little but the sweat of their tenant's (or more usually sub-tenant's brow) and making use of the island's greatest natural resource, the same natural resource that had been put into good but intermittent use since around the late 1700s to build the drystone dykes that were to become so much a feature of our island landscape.

As we move through the middle of the 19th century steel wire and wooden posts to erect stockproof fences were becoming more freely available but even here use was made of suitable large stones to form gateposts and straining posts at the end of these fences.

Although some of these new fences were being erected to control livestock and protect crops, the lairds were looking to establish more permanent boundaries in a climate where no hedges would grow. This resulted in thousands of metres of stone dykes being built, with many of the bigger farms being enclosed mainly by these dykes. Much of this building took place from the mid 1830s until around 1860, when farming was profitable and labour cheap and easily available. Much of the land on these bigger farms would have been mainly of the 'in-by land', easily cultivated and improved to make excellent farm land while a great number of the smaller farms were sited on the previously uncultivated common where reclaiming it would have been a long, hard slog and few had more than a small park next the farm enclosed by dykes. The possible reason for this is, I feel, described very well in a paper in the Orkney Archives titled 'A Journey from Serfdom' where author Ernest Marwick, after describing this lack of dyked enclosures, gives his poignant analysis:

'Such is the visual evidence. How is it to be interpreted? Roughly speaking, I think, in the following way. Where stone walls are common, it may be assumed that agricultural improvement began, and became general, at a comparatively early date, when it was still economically possible to erect long stretches of dry-stone dykes, owing to the fact that labour was cheap and plentiful. Many, perhaps most, of the more extensive enclosures date from a period prior to the general outburst of farming activity in Orkney. When the frenzy finally seized them, the peasant farmers were so busily occupied with the reclamation of the soil that they had no time to enclose the land so dourly won. At the same time the larger landowners were deprived of the source of labour which they had formerly exploited. When the farmers finally manged to straighten their backs, to survey the results of their toil, they found that time had passed them by, and that stone walls, no matter how desirable in a windswept region like Orkney, were luxuries which none could afford.'

Despite this analysis of the demise of building drystone dykes, it was apparent that over a relatively short space of time these measures of planking, squaring and enclosing had transformed the previous hotchpotch of strips of land and inadequate faelie dykes into first class farms, turning the island landscape into something quite similar to what we still see today.

The dykes separating one estate or farm from another tended to be the highest and most substantial, with one of the best examples of that being the 'march' (boundary) dyke which divided the original Housebay estate from the rest of the south end of the island.

Dykes varied considerably in height and width and, believe it or not, in the quality of the raw material! When building stones were quarried the first layers of stones were generally of poorer quality, less dense and more prone to deterioration through the effects of wind, rain and - in particular - frost where water trapped in minute seams in the stones could expand when frozen and gradually cause the stones to fracture. These top layers of stones often went to build dykes, with the deeper, better quality stone being used for the building of dwelling houses, outhouses and farm steadings.

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

-reaching out to North Isles' residents of all ages.



Since my last Letter, I've been present at both ends of Orkney's educational spectrum, from attending the UH/ Orkney Graduation & Celebration of Achievement at St Magnus' Cathedral as a member of the UHI Orkney Stakeholder Group (photo below left---with my worthy auld pai, Clir John Ross Scott), to accepting an invitation (accompanied by Clir Thomson) to Shapinsay School to talk to the primary pupils about Orkney Islands Council and being a councilior. Whilst there, we enjoyed a World School Milk Day lunch (photo above), and the pupils showed me around their playpark and demonstrated their gymnastic skills on the climbing frame. I would welcome invitations from other schools to meet with and talk to their pupils.

At our Policy & Resources Committee meeting, the investigation of the feasibility of a visitor levy was discussed. I brought up some of the potential challenges that accommodation providers have already made me aware of, and I also sought reassurance that it would be possible for Orkney residents travelling within Orkney to be exempted from paying such a levy.

I've also been to a Monitoring & Audit Committee meeting, yet another budget & finance seminar, and a General Meeting, and we welcomed colleagues from Shetland Islands Council to meetings of the Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board. I was one of a group of councillors selected to meet His Majesty's inspectors of Education carrying out a "thematic" inspection on local authority approaches to supporting school improvement. At short notice, I attended a GovScoVOpenreach drop-in on the R100 fibre rollout in the North Isles. Work is advancing rapidly in the larger islands, and I've been apprised of how superfast broadband is being implemented in Papay, but I don't see much progress on bringing it to North Ronaldsay, Egilisay or Wyre.

If you keep poultry (or most other birds) and have not already registered them, the deadline is the end of November.

Finally, well done to my son Wulfric, who has cycled all the way from Sanday to Land's End in Cornwall via John O' Groats. He's been present at both ends of the island of Great Britain. So I must add another photograph (below right).

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The Digital Phone Switchover



What you need to know

What is the digital phone switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and January 2027 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines over to new upgraded landline services using digital technology. This means services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones, telecare and health devices will need to be compatible.

How will it affect me/what do I need to do?

The good news is – your landline isn't going anywhere and for most consumers and businesses, this change will be straightforward. In fact, many customers are already making the switch when they upgrade to fibre broadband.

Your telecoms provider (for

example, Vodafone or BT) should contact you before the switchover to check in and discuss what you need to do to make sure any reliant services you may have aren't affected. However, we're encouraging everyone to know what to expect. The change may be as simple as plugging your phone into a broadband router rather than the phone socket on the wall, or you may be given a new router to do this.

Please note that your provider will move you to a digital service before January 2027. If you care for a vulnerable person, please keep an eye out for correspondence notifying of a switch over date.



If you have any concerns or questions, please contact your telecoms provider directly.

What you need to know

Other Devices

If you have other devices connected to your phone line that you may have purchased, such as alarm systems, you might need to upgrade your device to make sure it is compatible.

If you are unsure about how a device in

your home or business might be affected, it is recommended you contact the equipment supplier or device manufacturer to find out whether it will remain functional on a digital phone line.

People who use health monitoring or

telecare devices should check if the switchover will affect how they work.

Key Points To Remember

If you have any queries or have no means of making emergency calls you need to contact your communications provider.

If you have a telecare alarm please contact the telecare team at Orkney Islands Council: 01856 873 535 Extension: 2635

Check with the appropriate equipment manufacturers if you have any other devices supported by your existing telephone line (such as intruder alarms) to check it will work digitally.

Most telecare alarm providers will have upgrade plans, if your phone line has or is due to an upgraded by your communication provider let them know.

In a Power Outage


Digital landlines cannot carry an electrical power connection, so in the event of a power cut they will not work. If you have a mobile phone this can still be used, but if you've no other means of calling the emergency services your telecoms provider will offer a solution to allow calls to be made to emergency services.

You should tell your telecoms provider now if you have no other way of making emergency calls.

Scams

There have been incidents reported of scammers contacting vulnerable users in relation to digital migration. Communication providers or telecare services will never call you to ask for money.

Contact is usually by letter and charges are only applied to normal invoices. If you are in any doubt as to the authenticity of a caller, just hang up and call your communications or telecare provider to report the incident, using a trusted phone number, such as the one on the bill.
