STRONSAY COMMUNITY ART PROJECT

Talk with William Caithness



On Saturday March 5th, William Caithness spoke to the young people involved in the art project about life as a fisherman in modern times, and the life and work involved in fishing in Stronsay.

Drawing on 20 years experience as a fisherman, he touched on many aspects of fishing in Stronsay; from the beginnings of the herring fishing industry on the island in 1831, through to the present day and exploring possibilities for the future of the industry.

William emphasised the nature of the occupation of a fisherman as being that of a hunter and therefore unique; 'the last of the great hunters'. He spoke of the uncertainty that went with the work of fishing; sometimes the catch was plentiful, other times bringing back very little.

He described living conditions on a fishing boat; how important it is for crew members to get along, out on a boat together for long periods of time. He spoke of the nature of the work itself – out in all weather conditions, no sleep at all for many days on end while the catch was going strong. He also spoke about the mystique of being a fisherman; the mystery of life out at sea, and the legends that are associated with the fishing.

Interestingly, in connection some of the stories and folklore, such as descriptions of strange sea monsters were put down to the hallucinations that fishermen experience after long periods of sleeplessness whilst working out at sea.

William ended the talk by speculating on future prospects for the island as a whole. Asking the youngsters, 'What do I harvest now?', the answer was of course 'The wind'. He spoke about life working on the windmills, including the dangers of it, and the present and growing emphasis on renewable energies.

As to the future of fishing, William simply said 'Who knows?' Maybe the future lay in fish farming, along with the traditional way of fishing. 'All I know', he said, 'Is that fishing will always be on Stronsay'.

Thankyou William, for a lively, entertaining, and truly inspiring talk. Everyone responded with enthusiasm; and if there were no young fishermen in the making at the beginning of the session, there certainly were at the end.

STRONSAY ART TRIP



On Friday the 4th of March we got up before 7.00am to get the 8.15 ferry for an unusual school day. We were going on a day trip to the Pier Arts Centre to see the "Peedie Pier" exhibition, which we all had contributed artwork to. Some of us had never been there before and we were all excited to see our artwork in an exhibition.

It was a long, almost three-hour journey from Stronsay into town. When we finally arrived at the Kirkwall terminal where we met our Art Teacher, Miss Allan who accompanied us to Stromness. After we arrived at the Pier Arts Centre we met Carol Dunbar, the Education Officer, who would show us round and help us with any questions.

First we looked at the Permanent collection whilst doing a fact finding art activity. One of our favourite pieces was "Colour Spectrum Series" by Olafur Elliasson". Next we looked at the graduate exhibition. Our favourite pieces in this area included a sculpture with an animated face projected onto it and the fashion and costume design.

We then arrived at the schools exhibition, "Peedie pier", where we saw our own work and suddenly realised that it was in a proper exhibition. It really brought it home, seeing our work and the schools exhibition along side the work of professional artists. We admired the work by other pupils and thought it was interesting to see work created by our peers from other schools. We especially liked the pencil skull drawing by Georgia Leslie from Sanday and the light drawings by the Upper primary class from Orphir. We were impressed by the variety of media and styles used in the artwork.

After lunch, we had a printing workshop with Carol Dunbar where we learned new skills and techniques, which we will take forward in our Standard Grade work back at school with Miss Allan. We all used the same techniques in very different ways to experiment and create our individual prints.

We looked around the gift shop and some of us bought some souvenirs to remind us of the day. We had a really busy, fun day and unfortunately didn't even have time to stop for ice cream before we got the ferry home at 3.15.

It was a really enjoyable and educational experience and we all had a great time. We found the artwork in the gallery inspiring and interesting and would definitely like to go back again to see future exhibitions.

LOOKING FOR SOMEONE SPECIAL!

During my career, it has been my good fortune and privilege to travel to many remote parts of the Highlands and Islands, none more so than the North Isles of Orkney. The communities of the North Isles are fortunate not only to live in areas of remarkable beauty, history and wildlife, but also to be able to do so where the low crime rate per head of population negates the necessity of a full-time police presence.

However, incidents do occur which require officers to travel from the Orkney mainland. This can often result in lengthy delays before officers are able to attend at a scene. It is at these times that the police have relied heavily on members of the community who have given up their own time to assist in police investigations. Whilst the assistance of these people is necessary and very much appreciated, it is often the case that situations would benefit from the involvement of persons with a more detailed understanding of how police investigations are conducted.

These individuals are better known as 'Special Constables'. Although they might occasionally be asked to attend incidents, the main focus for a 'Special' in the North Isles would be to provide a local point of contact between the police and the community. The police would provide training and maintain regular contact with these individuals so that they would be better prepared to manage situations that may come to their notice.

During the times that I have worked in Orkney, both in the early 90's and again from 2003 till the present day, I can not speak more highly of the individuals, past and present, who have carried out the role of 'Special Constables' on the Orkney mainland, but particularly so in the North Isles. They are occasionally asked to perform duties of a particularly sensitive and personal nature. As such, it is vitally important for the communities that the 'Right People' are identified.

Do you think that you would be up for the challenge ?

Do you know of anyone else that you would consider to be an ideal candidate ?

At first, the application process might appear quite daunting but guidance and assistance would be made available to anyone interested in this position.

END OF POWERDOWN COFFEE MORNING

This was held in the Fishmart on Saturday 19th March. It was very pleasing to see such a great turnout and everyone seemed to enjoy their cuppa and a chat. A total of 30 questionnaires were filled in answering questions about home improvements, recycling, the community greenhouse and Eco club. A big thank you to all who participated!

From the results of this survey (taken from a small cross-section of the community) 30 residents reported having received a total of 63 home energy improvements. These were either carried out between 2009-11 or will be completed by the end of 2011. 37 of these home improvements were carried out by Scottish Government schemes such as Home Insulation Scheme or Energy Assistance Package, 10 were carried out by Orkney Islands Council schemes such as Keep Orkney Warm and 16 were carried out privately at the individual's own expense. If this small sample is any reflection of the rest of the island households, it looks like quite a lot of folk maybe got some benefit out of the government's efforts to improve energy efficiency.

A 2 day horticultural training course was held March 11th and 12th. This was the last of the funded training courses taught by Norman Stephen from SAC and Audrey Litterick of Earthcare. 16 keen Stronsay residents attended and learned about everything from how to deal with and identify pests and diseases in plants to recognising what composts are most suitable for propagation. Norman and Audrey also visited the Greenhouse to which they commented that it was one of the nicest growing community projects that they had ever visited. It was very nice indeed getting such high praise but it can only be due to the enthusiasm and commitment of all those involved and the support of the community in general. Hopefully we will see Norman and Audrey again as they have enjoyed their visits to Stronsay immensely. Would also like to thank the Games Club for accommodating us on the Friday night. Thank you!

The Powerdown project ends on 31st March. Marion Macleod was the Powerdown Officer from 2009 to October 2010. Her main success being sourcing the funding for the Green Island project which included the Community Greenhouse, Eco club and the 2 day Green festival event. The Community Greenhouse and Eco club will continue to operate thanks to the support and enthusiasm of their members. Simone Kirk took on the Powerdown Officer post during Marion's maternity leave from November 2010 to March 2011.

Marion and Simone would like to thank Julia Crocker and Malcolm Addison for their help and support and the Stronsay Development Trust which was instrumental in applying for the funding for Powerdown. They would also like to thank all those members of the community who helped with all the various events and projects – we couldn't have done it without you.



LOVE FOOD HATE WASTE

Love Bakery and Fruit

£90 million of bakery waste and £70 million of fresh fruit waste is thrown away by Scottish households every year.

Bread that may seem slightly past its best can be revived by sprinkling with water and warming in the oven or toasting. Most fruits will stay fresher for longer if kept in the fridge. Bananas and pineapples are best stored at room temperature. Once a pineapple has been cut from the plant it will no longer ripen, so no excuses for leaving it sitting in your fruit bowl!

This is good straight from the oven and also makes great toast as the sugars in the bread slightly caramelise. You can also freeze it.

Recipe – Banana Bread by Neil Nelson

Ingredients

225g self-raising flour, 100g softened butter or marg., 100g sugar, 450g really ripe bananas, peeled & mashed, ½ tsp salt, few drops of vanilla essence, 2 eggs.

Method

Pre-heat oven to 180C. In a large bowl mix all ingredients together. Spoon mixture into a non-stick loaf tin and bake it for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours. The bread should be golden on top and a skewer when pushed into the middle should come out clean.




