Stronsay Community Fund

This will be the funds gifted annually for community use from Stronsay Renewable Energy (from the wind turbine).

The fund should be open by November 2012 and applications for grants can be received then. However, anyone with an idea for a project can complete an *Expression of Interest form* and start getting advice now.

What are the grants awarded for?

Grants may be awarded for anything that might benefit members of our community and so enhance the quality and/or sustainability of life on our island. The grants should be of direct benefit only to residents of Stronsay and Papa Stronsay.

Eligibility of applications from outwith the Stronsay community will be appraised on a case by case basis.

How will the applications be assessed?

The Development Trust has objectives which cover any projects that are to be of community benefit and for which charitable funds may be given. These objectives are the main criteria against which the application will be assessed.

The Development Trust Objectives are in the Memorandum of Association on the website – and will also be in the *Grant Application Guidance* (under construction).

We had hoped to set up a small voluntary awards committee, however only two people came forward and although we are very grateful for their support it has now been decided that the Development Trust staff will look at all applications and refer to a wide network of experts, if they need to, in order to make sure that the Trust board has all the information it needs in order to make a decision.

There is no limit to the amount that can be applied for although there will be a limit on available funds.

All decisions on grant applications will be agreed by the Development Trust board at their usual meetings.

Applications for grants over £50,000 will require a community mandate, the applicant(s) being responsible for presenting the proposal to the community and collecting evidence of support for the project.

Loans will not be offered at this stage.



Bu wind farm newsletter

Issue 1 - August/September 2012



Introduction

This is the first issue of a six-monthly newsletter that we are producing to help keep the Stronsay community informed about the following proposal.

SSE owns and operates Bu wind farm at Rothiesholm on Stronsay. The wind farm has been operational since 2002 and we acquired the site from I&H Brown in 2008. We are planning to 'repower' Bu wind farm and replace the existing three turbines with three new ones.

We will be holding a community meeting on Stronsay in October (details overleaf) in order to update islanders on the project and provide them with a chance to engage with the project team and ask any questions they may have.

We hope that you find these newsletters helpful and interesting, and that you are able to join us for our community meeting in October.

Site location

Bu wind farm is located at Rothiesholm on the southern tip of the south-west spur of Stronsay.

Project overview

The island has exceptionally good wind resource for power generation, yet the wind farm has not been performing well – as you may have noticed! This is because the existing turbines are no longer in production and it is becoming more difficult to get replacement parts in order to undertake repairs and routine maintenance.

Bu wind farm



We know that we can significantly improve the generation output of Bu by replacing the turbines and as such, we have decided to 'repower' the site. Should our planning application be consented, the new turbines will be easier to maintain and more suited to the excellent wind conditions on Stronsay, creating a much more efficient and reliable wind farm.

We are currently preparing the Environmental Statement (ES) which will accompany our planning application to Orkney Islands Council in the next few months.

New site details

Below is a comparison of the key changes that would occur, should the project be consented:

Planning process

As part of our planning application we are required to submit an Environmental Statement (ES) which assesses the environmental impact of the proposal.

Over the last 10 months we have undertaken a range of technical and environmental surveys to assess the work and ensure that there remain no significant impacts. We are now in the process of assessing the findings and finalising our ES.

We expect to submit the planning application to Orkney Islands Council around October/November this year.

Construction overview

Should we receive consent for the project, the key stages of construction are expected to be as follows:

Mobilise to site

Once appointed, our civil and turbine contractors will set up a site compound at the site. This will comprise of offices, welfare facilities, safety training areas, and storage areas for materials and equipment.

Substation works

The existing substation may be fitted out with new electrical equipment for the replacement turbines. In addition, a new welfare building will be constructed at the entrance to the wind farm. This work will run in parallel with the main construction works.

Main construction works

The main works will involve:

- . Upgrading the existing access tracks
- · Creating new turbine foundations
- . Dismantling the three existing turbines
- · Erecting the three new turbines
- · Installing underground electricity cables
- · Testing and commissioning the new site

o Junction modification works

Three junctions on the transport route from Whitehall pier to the site will require widening in order to help the movement of the turbines.

Overall, the construction works are expected to take around a year to complete.

Community meeting

We are keen to ensure that the community understand the works proposed. As such, we will be holding a community meeting in October (before we submit the planning application) to talk about the project in more detail:

The meeting will include a presentation from members of our project team, followed by the opportunity to meet the team and ask any questions that you may have. The Community Council meeting will follow on afterwards at 8pm.

ith virtually no winds from the East during the last three weeks or so our attention has been concentrated on wading birds on the beaches and lochs. The majority of these birds are returning south from the breeding grounds in Iceland and the High Arctic regions. Many Wheatears have arrived on the island in the last ten days - brought to the island by the favourable winds blowing from their own breeding grounds in Greenland.

The probable Solitary Sandpiper of last month could not be refound but there were plenty of close

sightings of waders at a number of sites: day-trippers Karen and Adrian from Eltham took the attached photograph of a Turnstone opposite Strynie shortly after arriving on the ferry; regular visitor Ken Barclay came across a Curlew Sandpiper at the edge of a tiny loch at Huip, and at Fingeo, Matthew found an injured Golden Plover which was kept overnight and later successfully released back into a nearby field. Golden Plover are now very numerous and it is safe to say that any flock of over 200 medium-sized

birds seen flying over the island in Autumn and Winter will be of this species. Flocks of 800 or so are not uncommon during this time of year when several thousand individuals of the species are usually present.

Black-tailed Godwits have been recorded regularly at Bu and Matpow, and Snipe are now very numerous although often hard to see. Many of both species seen here in Winter almost certainly come from Iceland. The most numerous wader along our sandy beaches for much of the year is the Sanderling. Flocks of these can be seen rushing up and down the beach to avoid the inrushing tide as

they search for food. The attached photo of a single bird - quite unusual for this gregarious species - was taken at Bomasty where parties of Sanderling may be seen from time to time. Outside the breeding season the species is ever-present in St Catherine's Bay and Holland Bay.

The fence across The Matpow Loch often provides us with the opportunity to study terns and gulls - a perfect aid for identification purposes - and as can be seen in the attached photo, several species may be present at the same time there. Common,

Arctic, and Sandwich Tern were all perched together when we took the attached photo in late Summer 2011 and we have enjoyed similar combinations throughtout this year's summer.

Duck numbers are now increasing rapidly, the majority being Wigeon and Teal - and once again all probably from Iceland, having hitched a ride on the favourable winds. Two parties of Pink-footed Geese have been seen flying south recently - one by Kath at Dale, and the other flying high over Castle, all no doubt from Iceland and probably heading for Eastern Scotland where huge numbers spend the winter.

Very few small migrants have been seen in the last month - just a single of both Redstart and Willow Warbler at Castle, and a few rather late Swifts. Several Hen Harriers have been seen - including two different males - and Pato at Odiness and Hazel at Airy saw two 'ring-tail' (brown, females or young birds) hunting together on 29th August. Both male and ring-tail Hen Harriers have also been seen by Andy and Shirley Whiteman from the windows at St John's - another reminder of how exciting birdwatching can be from indoors on the island! A large female Sparrowhawk has been seen at several sites recently and an elusive Red-footed Falcon was seen briefly on three occasions by visitors George and Betty Winslow from Monikie on 5th September. Seawatching at Bomasty recently produced single Manx and Sooty Shearwaters, with Gannets passing by in good numbers during the high winds.

Paul Miller telephoned from Mainland Orkney recently to say that he had seen a Blackbird with a single white feather on each side of its tail. Although part-albinism is not uncommon in Blackbirds (the majority of these birds have white head/body feathers) it is amazing that Paul's own sighting is exactly the same as a bird recorded on Stronsay several years ago (different individuals no doubt), since when we have also seen two individuals here—with just one white outer-tail feather. A few full albinos have been seen on Stronsay in the last 25 years, including Blackbird (Breck), House Sparrow (Sound), Redshank (Bu), and Shag (Odiness Bay and Whitehall). The Blackbird, discovered by Alison at Breck was in the same field as an almost totally albino Fieldfare.

At last there seems to be a reduction in Greylag Geese numbers on the island - a big relief for the other bird species they have displaced in increasing numbers over the last 20 years. When we arrived on the island in the late eighties Greylag Geese were only seen flying over on migration here (a few did land for a short while in poor weather conditions) but after a slow build-up of wintering birds around the Meikle Water in the early nineties, numbers suddenly mushroomed and a substantial breeding population rapidly built up. The off-spring of these have no instinct to migrate and, unlike the fly-over migrants seen pre-1990s, do not fly north in Spring to the traditional breeding-grounds in Iceland. The species now nests all over the island, ousting many of what were the traditional breeding species here, and in Winter the huge numbers present have replaced the 100 plus Whooper Swans which formerly wintered on the island and were a joy to watch.

show up and predictions that we are heading for an early winter appear to be correct. The recent gales and rain have reminded me to keep waterproofs and my silly hat ready at all times.

Winter will be a good time to find garden tools which have disappeared; I am hoping that a favourite hoe will give up hiding and trip me up one day soon. Even the dog has lost enthusiasm for escaping and, now I have oil restored to the tank, we can all enjoy hibernating for the next 6 months.




The future
