BELLE EMBLETON OF SPRINGWELL, STRONSAY 1941-2013

My lovely wife Isabel (Belle) died in the Balfour Hospital on the 25th of April, as our eldest son and I each held her hands. She had taken ill suddenly in the early hours that morning and was flown to hospital. Neither she or my son and I had realised just how ill she was previous to that dreadful day, other than she was diagnosed with COPD, a lung problem that never seemed to bother her to the extent that she felt unable to function normally. Belle had took a bad turn though while in Kirkwall on the 9th of April (which was out of the norm for her) and was rushed to the Balfour, where she was treated for 7 days and released home with a change in medication after thorough checks on her condition. She was her happy normal self again for 9 days until that awful morning. We were stunned at the suddenness of her passing and the feeling of her loss is beyond words.

Belle and I had often talked though after reaching our seventies about what we wished, should either of us were to die suddenly, rather than a long illness. We agreed that in the case of the former, we preferred the children we had living south remembered us alive and not have the long journey and upheaval of travelling up, as we were to be cremated and not be having a funeral to attend. We were in touch via Skype & Facebook via computer so always interacting with each other otherwise. Our eldest son Billy lived up here and would see to our wishes should the worst happen to either of us suddenly.

Belle was cremated and a loving, well attended farewell service was held in the Moncur Memorial church Stronsay on the 11th May.

I and my son wish to sincerely thank everyone on and off island for their comforting cards of condolence and the lovely things said about Belle. Thank you also, all who helped organise and all who attended her friendly "Taraa Belle" service in the church and those who couldn't make it because of other commitments that day.

A synopsis of her life and how we met was read out at the service. Belle loved living at Springwell, loved Stronsay and loved the way of life here and all the friends she made. She would have been amazed at all the nice things said about her. The donations made to her favourite charities will be posted when I have them finalised.

You all did her proud. You all did me and my family proud too. Thank you from the bottom of my heart.

PLOT TO PLATE YOUTH GROUP

Since the end of April the children have been very busy. We have met weekly in either the greenhouse or in the school. In the greenhouse there has been all early vegetables planted and is now growing very well. We have even harvested some spinach, Rocket, Pea shoots, radishes and some other salads. There has been lots of work weeding and feeding the plants too. We also planted some berry bushes including blueberry and currant bushes. It will be very interesting to see how they do. For the blueberries we used special compost as the need to have a very low PH and peaty soil to thrive.

The children also raised their own herb seedlings from seeds and cuttings. They have since planted their own mini herb gardens which they will be taking home after the end of the project.

We are very lucky in that we have been able to use the home economics room in the school. This month we have made a delicious pie with Rhubarb and made our own Rhubarb Cordial and experimented with our own salads and made dressings. A big thank you to all at the Stronsay School for being so accommodating.

We also had a field trip to Eday where we joined the Eday ranger and their youth group. A great day was had by all. None of the children had been to Eday before so it gave them a great opportunity they wouldn't otherwise have had.. We walked the Eday heritage trail and saw lots of interesting things along the way. There was lots of tired feet at the end but they all did so well and were a great example for Stronsay.

For next month there is more garden work planned, a seaweed skills-foraging trip on Stronsay plus an end of project barbecue.

Say, 'Catching,' and everybody has to change places. We also sometimes make shapes out of our bodies. Some of these shapes were quite challenging. 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LATEST BIRD SIGHTINGS

Even in what has been an exceptionally cold spell, there have been a number of unexpected sightings during the last four weeks, including two Hawfinches and several Red -backed Shrikes. The first of the Hawfinches was found feeding by the roadside near Southbank on 3rd May, and the second was discovered next day by Butch & Flo at the feeders in their garden at Seaview in Whitehall Village (see photos). The second bird had soon moved on and was refound next day in the Castle garden where it was typically very wary and its visits to our own feeders very brief.

A few Blackcaps, Willow Warblers, and Chiffchaffs have been seen in island gardens and one or two Snow Buntings and Brambling along the island roads. A small fall on 10th May included Pied Flycatcher, Goldcrest, Song Thrush, and Robin - all in the garden at Airy. Dave Miller found another Blackcap at Coweshouse on 11th and the first Red-backed Shrike of the Spring arrived in the drive to Holin the same day (see photo).

Well above average numbers of Whimbrel have been seen in the grassy fields, the cold weather bringing their migration to the breeding grounds further north to an abrupt halt. There was one party of ten or so birds in the fields between the Mill and The Kirk for several days in early May.

A few Pied Flycatchers were recorded in the second week of May when 1-2 Whinchats were seen, but the most unexpected arrivals in what has been a very cold spell were a further 6 Red-backed Shrikes - a species which feeds almost exclusively on bees (See photos).

The last of these birds was discovered - complete with a Bee in its bill - by Wendy and Dennis from their sitting-room window at Linkshouse on 21st - an absolute picture among the flowering currant. The majority of Red-backed Shrikes seen here in Spring arrive at the end of May and early June by which time the temparature is generally around 14-15 degrees. 3 Spotted Flycatchers (which also rely almost entirely on 'flycatching' for insects) also arrived in the easterly winds mid-month.

The lone Whooper Swan is still in the Matpow area and although it spends virtually all its time grazing near the island cemetary, it can fly and does visit the Matpow Loch occasionally. There has been an unusual group of up to ten Mute Swans at the same site this year but no evidence of nest-building as yet.

Birds of prey have been conspicuous by their absence, the only sightings being of a male Hen Harrier on a few occasions until early May, and a single Peregrine flying over The Reserve mid-month.

LETTER FROM SCHOOL PLACE

I have now been a councillor for a whole year! It has been rewarding to help resolve problems brought to me by individual constituents, but I have been frustrated by some of the bigger issues.

Ferry timetables are a case in point. We held a workshop on next year's refit timetable for the outer North Isles, but no consensus was reached to pursue a radical rethink, apart from a change to the way Saturday sailings are timetabled. Whether the HITRANS study will ultimately lead to an improvement in the service, I do not know. I was not terribly impressed by Transport Scotland at their joint presentation with Serco NorthLink on matters associated with the breakdown of the Hamnavoe service. The former confirmed that "lifeline" neither has statutory authority nor carries any guarantees, and the latter refused to accept any blame for the situation and is clearly clueless about the concept of "contingency". Before leaving the subject of shipping, this photograph shows the display put on by the tug Einer at the opening of the Hatston pier extension. I am reliably informed that there now isn't a passenger liner in the world too big to berth there.



I spent a week in Kirkwall combining Council duties with looking after my two youngest so they could attend the Junior Instrumental Course at the Picky. OIC is one of the few local authorities to provide music tuition to its children free of charge, and Stage-coach kindly offered free bus travel to and from the course for participants resident on the Mainland, but for North Isles primary pupils, who have to stay in the town, it was a costly exercise, as I know first-hand. I intend to take this matter up and would appreciate comments, experiences, concerns and suggestions from other Isles' parents. With the smaller-capacity new hostel, next year accommodation will also be an issue for participating junior high school secondary pupils. We rounded off the week with the Longhope Swimming Gala. When the new Picky pool opens, there are potential issues here too over the number of swimming lanes available. I shall be looking into this to ensure there's hope for the Longhope Gala long continuing.

A delegation from the Faeroes, including some of their government ministers, gave us an informative presentation on their islands' autonomous relationship with Denmark. They seem to have managed to negotiate a best-of-all-worlds arrangement, whereby, for example, they remain outside the EU with all its regulations, yet have EU citizenship rights for all their inhabitants. It's food for thought for Orkney's future. I presented one of the delegates with a set of Sanday leaflets, and we are going to see if we can forge some cultural links between Sanday and Sandøy. (Sorry, they don't have an Edøy, Egilsøy, Stronsøy, Papøy, Rousøy, Westrøy). The delegate was intrigued to learn that we have a shellfish called the Faeroese Sunset (*Gari fervensis*). Does anyone know how it got its name?



At 1 hour 20 minutes, the latest Sanday Community Council meeting I was at must have been the shortest on record! I also attended my first community council meeting on Shapinsay, the AGM of the Stronsay Development Trust, and a meeting of the Sanday Community School Parent Council.

You may remember that the last election was entirely a postal one. There will be a review of polling arrangements this autumn, so if anyone has any comments, please pass them on to me.

SPECIAL COLLECTION OF BULKY ITEMS FROM DOMESTIC PROPERTIES ON STRONSAY 2013/14

The special collection dates for Stronsay up to 30 September 2013 are as follows:-Friday 24 May 2013 and 2 August 2013

Collection dates from 1 October 2013 will be set and advertised later in the year.

Revised charges have now been approved for special collection of bulky items from domestic properties with effect from 1 April 2013.

Charges from 1 April 2013 are as follows:-

Up to 5 items £13.50 plus VAT

6 items and above up to a full pick-up/equivalent load £56.50 plus VAT Lorry load £113.00 plus VAT

Special collection of certain exceptional/large items will be charged at actual cost and will be agreed in advance of collection.

If you wish to have domestic bulky items uplifted please contact Customer Services on telephone number 873535 as soon as possible prior to the collection dates. Please note that payment for collection is required before the uplift is carried out. Only items that are on the request form will be collected.

A verbal request to the local Refuse Collector is not sufficient. For information on disposal of commercial waste, including agricultural waste, please contact Development and Infrastructure on telephone number 886367.

POWER CUTS

If there's a prolonged power cut please ring 0800 300 999 (that's a Freephone number) and they will be have all the information about the likely duration of the cut. They will be able to tell you whether it's just you or your part of the island that's affected and if they don't already know about it they can take appropriate action. They will also ring back to make sure that everything is OK.
